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Safety Instructions

Use the following safety guidelines to help protect yourself and your computer. For comfort and efficiency, observe the ergonomic guidelines in "Sitting Comfortably at Your Computer" in the *Tell Me How* help file.

When Using Your Computer



A CAUTION: Do not operate your portable computer for an extended period of time with the base resting directly on your body. With extended operation, heat can potentially build up in the base. Allowing sustained contact with the skin could cause discomfort or, eventually, a burn.

- Do not attempt to service the computer yourself. Always follow installation instructions closely.
- Do not carry a battery in your pocket, purse, or other container where metal objects (such as car keys) could short-circuit the battery terminals. The resulting excessive current flow can cause extremely high temperatures and may result in damage from burns.
- Be sure that nothing rests on your AC adapter's power cable and that the cable is not located where it can be tripped over or stepped on.
- Place the AC adapter in a ventilated area, such as a desk top or on the floor, when you use it to run the computer or to charge the battery. Do not cover the AC adapter with papers or other items that will reduce cooling; also, do not use the AC adapter while it is inside a carrying case.
- Do not use your computer in a wet environment, for example, near a bath tub, sink, or swimming pool or in a wet basement.
- Do not push objects into air vents or openings of your computer. Doing so can cause fire or electric shock by shorting out interior components.
- Use only the AC adapter and batteries that are approved for use with this computer as indicated in this document. Use of another type of battery or AC adapter may risk fire or explosion.

- Before you connect the computer to a power source, ensure that the voltage rating of the AC adapter matches that of the available power source:
 - 115 V/60 Hz in most of North and South America and some Far Eastern countries such as South Korea and Taiwan
 - 100 V/50 Hz in eastern Japan and 100 V/60 Hz in western Japan
 - 230 V/50 Hz in most of Europe, the Middle East, and the Far East
- To help prevent electric shock, plug the AC adapter and external device power cables into properly grounded power sources. These cables are equipped with 3-prong plugs to help ensure proper grounding. Do not use adapter plugs or remove the grounding prong from a cable. If you must use an extension cable, use a 3-wire cable with properly grounded plugs.
- If you use an extension cable with your AC adapter, ensure that the total ampere rating of the products plugged in to the extension cable does not exceed the ampere rating of the extension cable.
- To remove power from the computer, turn it off, remove the battery, and disconnect the AC adapter from the electrical outlet.
- If your computer includes an integrated or optional (PC Card) modem, disconnect the modem cable during an electrical storm to avoid the remote risk of electric shock from lightning via the telephone line.
- To help avoid the potential hazard of electric shock, do not connect or disconnect any cables or perform maintenance or reconfiguration of this product during an electrical storm.
- PC Cards may become very warm during normal operation. Use care when removing PC Cards after their continuous operation.
- Do not dispose of batteries in a fire. They may explode. Check with local authorities for disposal instructions.
- When setting up the computer for work, place it on a level surface.
- When traveling, do not check the computer as baggage. You can put your computer through an X-ray security machine, but never put your computer through a metal detector. If you have the computer checked by hand, be sure to have a charged battery available in case you are asked to turn on the computer.

- When traveling with the hard drive removed from the computer, wrap the drive in a nonconducting material, such as cloth or paper. If you have the drive checked by hand, be ready to install the drive in the computer. You can put the hard drive through an X-ray security machine, but *never* put the drive through a metal detector.
- When traveling, do not place the computer in overhead storage compartments where it could slide around. Do not drop your computer or subject it to other mechanical shocks.
- Protect your computer, battery, and hard drive from environmental hazards such as dirt, dust, food, liquids, temperature extremes, and overexposure to sunlight.
- When you move your computer between environments with very different temperature and/or humidity ranges, condensation may form on or within the computer. To avoid damaging the computer, allow sufficient time for the moisture to evaporate before using the computer.
- NOTICE: When taking the computer from low-temperature conditions into a warmer environment or from high-temperature conditions into a cooler environment, allow the computer to acclimate to room temperature before turning on power.
- When you disconnect a cable, pull on its connector or on its strainrelief loop, not on the cable itself. As you pull out the connector, keep it evenly aligned to avoid bending any connector pins. Also, before you connect a cable make sure both connectors are correctly oriented and aligned.
- Handle components with care. Hold a component such as a memory module by its edges, not its pins.
- When removing a memory module from the system board or disconnecting an external device from the computer, wait 5 seconds after turning off the computer before removing the memory module or disconnecting the device to help avoid possible damage to the system board.
- Before you clean your computer, turn it off, unplug it from its power source, and remove the battery.
- Clean your computer with a soft cloth dampened with water rather than with liquid or aerosol cleaners.

- Clean the display with a soft, clean cloth and commercial window cleaner that does not contain wax or abrasives. Apply the cleaner to the cloth; then stroke the cloth across the display in one direction, moving from the top of the display to the bottom. If the display contains grease or some other contaminant, use isopropyl alcohol instead of commercial window cleaner.
- If your computer gets wet, see page 40 for instructions. If you drop or damage the computer, see page 41. If, after following these procedures, you confirm that your computer is not operating properly, contact Dell (see page 71).

When Removing or Installing Memory Modules

Before you remove or install memory modules, perform the following steps in the sequence indicated.

- **NOTICE:** The only time you should ever access the inside of your computer is when you are installing memory modules.
- NOTICE: Wait 5 seconds after turning off the computer before disconnecting an external device or removing a memory module to help prevent possible damage to the system board.
- 1 Turn off your computer and all attached devices.
- 2 Disconnect your computer and external devices from their electrical outlets to reduce the potential for personal injury or shock. Also, disconnect any telephone or telecommunication lines from the computer.
- 3 Remove the battery from the battery bay and, if present, the secondary battery from the media bay.
- 4 Ground yourself by touching an unpainted metal surface at the back of the computer before touching anything inside your computer.
 - While you work, periodically touch an unpainted metal surface on the computer to dissipate any static electricity that might harm internal components.

In addition, take note of these safety guidelines when appropriate:

When you disconnect a cable, pull on its connector, not on the cable itself. As you pull connectors apart, keep them evenly aligned to avoid bending any pins. Also, before you connect a cable, make sure that both connectors are correctly oriented and aligned.

Handle memory modules with care. Don't touch the components on a module. Hold a module by its edges.



A CAUTION: There is a danger of a new battery exploding if it is incorrectly installed. Replace the battery only with the same or equivalent type recommended by the manufacturer. Discard used batteries according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Protecting Against Electrostatic Discharge

To prevent static damage, discharge static electricity from your body before you touch anything inside your computer and periodically while you work inside the computer. You can do so by touching an unpainted metal surface on the back of the computer.

You can also take the following steps to prevent static damage:

- Do not remove items from their antistatic packing material until you are ready to install them in your computer. Just before unwrapping the antistatic packaging, be sure to discharge static electricity from your body.
- When transporting a sensitive component, first place it in an antistatic container or packaging.

Connecting a Printer

See the documentation that came with the printer for any recommended preparation procedures, such as:

- Removing the packaging
- Installing the toner or ink cartridge
- Loading paper

Then follow the instructions that came with the printer to connect it to the computer. If no information is provided, see the following sections.

Installing the Printer Driver


Dell installs drivers for some new printers. Click the **Start** button, point to **Settings**, and then click **Printers**. If your printer is listed in the **Printers** window, the printer is ready to use.


If you need to install a printer driver, insert the installation CD into the CD or DVD drive. Then follow the prompts on the screen using the instructions that came with the printer.

If your printer installation CD does not automatically run, click the Start button on the Microsoft® Windows® desktop, click Run, and type x:\setup.exe (where x is the letter of your CD or DVD drive [usually drive D]). Then click **OK** and follow the prompts on your screen.

Parallel Printer

- 1 Turn off the computer (see page 16).
- NOTICE: Use only a standard IEEE parallel cable measuring 3 m (10 ft) or less to connect the printer to the computer. Use of a nonstandard cable may prevent the printer from working.
 - 2 Attach the parallel printer cable to the parallel port connector on the computer and tighten the two screws. Attach the cable to the parallel connector on the printer and snap the two clips into the two notches.







- Turn on the printer and then turn on the computer. If the Add New Hardware Wizard window appears, click Cancel.
- Install the printer driver if necessary (see page 14).

USB Printer

- 1 Install the printer driver if necessary (see page 14).
- Attach the USB printer cable to the USB port connector on the computer and the printer. The USB connectors fit only one way.





Turning Off the Computer

NOTICE: To prevent data loss, you must perform the Windows shutdown procedure to turn off your computer.

Windows Millennium Edition (Me) and Windows 2000

- Save and close any open files and exit any open programs.
- 2 Click the **Start** button and then click **Shut Down**.
- 3 Click the pull-down menu under What do you want the computer to do?.
- 4 Click **Shut down** and then click **OK**.

The computer automatically turns off after the shutdown process finishes.

Windows 98

- Save and close any open files and exit any open programs.
- 2 Click the **Start** button and then click **Shut Down**.

3 In the Shut Down Windows window, click Shut down and then click OK.

The computer automatically turns off after the shutdown process finishes.

Using the Media Bay


Dell ships your computer with a floppy drive installed in the media bay. The media bay also supports the following devices:

- CD drive
- CD-RW drive
- DVD drive
- Zip drive
- Second hard drive
- Second battery
- Dell TravelLite[™] module
- NOTICE: To prevent irreparable damage to the docking connector, do not remove or replace devices while the computer is connected to an advanced port replicator (APR).

Swapping Devices While the Computer Is Turned Off

- 1 Save and close any open files, exit any open programs, and shut down the computer (see page 16).
- 2 If the computer is connected (docked) to an APR, undock it (see page 54).
- 3 Close the display and turn the computer over.
- Slide and hold the latch release, and pull the device out of the media bay.
- NOTICE: To prevent damage, place devices in a travel case when they are not inserted in the computer. Store devices in a dry, safe place, and avoid placing heavy objects on top of them.

- NOTICE: Insert devices before you dock and turn on the computer.
- 5 Insert the new device into the bay, and push it until you hear a click.
- 6 Turn on the computer.

Swapping Devices While Windows Is Running

NOTICE: To prevent irreparable damage to the docking connector, do not replace devices while the computer is connected to an APR.

In Microsoft Windows Me or Windows 98

- 1 Right-click the **Softex BayManager** icon on the Microsoft Windows taskbar.
- 2 Click Remove/Swap.
- 3 Keep the display open, and tilt the computer back so that you can access the bottom of the computer.
- 4 Slide and hold the latch release, and pull the device out of the media bay.
- 5 Insert the new device into the bay, and push it until you hear a click.
- Click **OK**. Then click **OK** again to close the **Softex BayManager** window.

In Microsoft Windows 2000

- 1 Double-click the **Unplug or Eject Hardware** icon on the Microsoft Windows taskbar.
- Click the device you want to eject and then click **Stop**.
- 3 Click **OK**, and wait until the device you want to eject is cleared from the list of devices in the Unplug or Eject Hardware window.
- Keep the display open, and tilt the computer back so that you can access the bottom of the computer.
- Slide and hold the latch release, and pull the device out of the media bay.
- 6 Insert the new device into the bay, and push it until you hear a click.
- 7 When Windows recognizes the new device, click **Close**.



HINT: A network adapter is also referred to as a network interface controller (NIC).

Setting Up the APR to Connect to a Network



NOTICE: Do not install a network adapter or a network adapter/modem combination PC Card until you complete the advanced port replicator (APR) setup.

If you purchased the APR with an integrated network adapter, you must first configure the computer to use the APR with a network.

Setting Up the APR for Windows Me and Windows 98

- If the computer is on, shut down the operating system and turn off the computer (see page 16).
- 2 Disconnect all external devices from the APR.
- 3 Connect the AC adapter to the APR and an electrical outlet.
- 4 Insert the computer into the APR.
- Turn on the computer.
 - The computer automatically detects the network adapter and begins the software installation.
- 6 At the Add New Hardware Wizard window, click Automatic search for a better driver (Recommended) and then click Next.
- Click **Finish** when Windows displays a message that the driver is installed.
- Click **Yes** to restart the computer.
 - After the computer restarts, Windows modifies settings, creates a Dock 1 configuration, and then displays a Setup is complete message.
- Click OK.
- 10 If the Updated display settings message appears, click OK.
- If necessary, consult your network administrator for instructions on configuring the network adapter settings.

Setting Up the APR for Windows 2000

- NOTICE: Do not install the drivers from the CD that is shipped with the APR. The network adapter will not work if they are installed.
 - If the computer is on, shut down the operating system and turn off the computer (see page 16).
 - Disconnect all external devices from the APR.
 - Insert the computer into the APR.
 - Attach the network cable and the AC adapter to the APR.
 - Turn on the computer. 5
 - Log on as a user with administrative privileges.
 - Make sure that **3Com PCI Ethernet Adapter (10/100)** appears in the Found New Hardware window.

Windows 2000 automatically installs the network adapter drivers.





Accessing Help Files

TO ACCESS THE TELL ME HOW HELP FILE

1 Click the Start button, point to Programs, point to User's Guides, and then click Tell Me How.

TO ACCESS WINDOWS 2000 HELP

- 1 Click the **Start** button and then click **Help**.
- 2 Click the **Search** tab.
- 3 Type a word or phrase that describes your problem and then click **List Topics**.
- 4 Click the topic that describes your problem and then click **Display**.
- 5 Follow the instructions shown on the screen.

TO ACCESS WINDOWS ME HELP

- 1 Click the **Start** button and then click **Help**.
- 2 Type a word or phrase that describes your problem in the Search box and then click Go.
- 3 Click the topic that describes your problem and then click **Display**.
- 4 Follow the instructions shown on the screen.

TO ACCESS WINDOWS 98 SE HELP

- 1 Click the **Start** button and then click **Help**.

- 4 Follow the instructions shown on the screen.

Power Problems

HINT: See the *Tell Me* How help file for information on standby mode.

CHECK THE POWER LIGHT— When the power light is lit or blinking, the computer has power. If the power light is blinking, the computer is in standby mode—press the power button to resume from standby mode. If the power light is off, press the power button.

CHECK THE BATTERY— If you are using a battery to power your computer, the battery charge may be depleted. Connect the computer to an electrical outlet using the AC adapter, and turn on the computer.

TEST THE ELECTRICAL OUTLET— Ensure that the electrical outlet is working by testing it with another device, such as a lamp.

CHECK THE AC ADAPTER—Be sure that the power cable is firmly inserted into the electrical outlet and the green light on the AC adapter is on.

CONNECT THE COMPUTER DIRECTLY TO AN ELECTRICAL OUTLET-

Bypass power protection devices, power strips, and the extension cable to verify that the computer turns on.

CHECK FOR INTERFERENCE— Electrical appliances on the same circuit or operating near the computer can cause interference. Other causes of interference: power extension cables, too many devices on a power strip, or multiple power strips connected to the same electrical outlet.

ADJUST THE POWER PROPERTIES—See the Tell Me How help file or search for the keyword standby in Windows Help. To access help files, see page 26.

RESEAT THE MEMORY MODULES—If your computer power light turns on but the display remains blank, you may need to reseat the memory modules (see page 55).

Start-Up Error Messages

OPERATING SYSTEM NOT FOUND—Call Dell for technical assistance (see page 71).

INSERT BOOTABLE MEDIA— The operating system is trying to boot to a nonbootable floppy disk or CD. Insert a bootable floppy disk or CD.

NON-SYSTEM DISK ERROR—A floppy disk is in the floppy drive. Remove the floppy disk and restart the computer.

Video and Display Problems

If the display is blank

CHECK THE POWER LIGHT— When the power light is blinking, the computer has power. If the power light is blinking, the computer is in standby mode—press the power button to resume from standby mode. If the power light is off, press the power button.

CHECK THE BATTERY—If you are using a battery to power your computer, the battery charge may be depleted. Connect the computer to an electrical outlet using the AC adapter, and turn on the computer.

TEST THE ELECTRICAL OUTLET— Ensure that the electrical outlet is working by testing it with another device, such as a lamp.

CHECK THE AC ADAPTER—Be sure that the power cable is firmly inserted into the electrical outlet and the green light on the AC adapter is on.

ADJUST THE POWER PROPERTIES—Search for the keyword standby in Windows Help. To access help files, see page 26.

If the display is difficult to read

ADJUST THE BRIGHTNESS—See the *Tell Me How* help file (see page 26) for instructions on adjusting the brightness.

MOVE THE SUBWOOFER AWAY FROM THE COMPUTER OR MONITOR-IF your external speaker system includes a subwoofer, ensure that the subwoofer is at least 60 cm (2 ft) away from the computer or external monitor.

ELIMINATE POSSIBLE INTERFERENCE—Turn off nearby fans, fluorescent lights, or halogen lamps to check for interference.

ROTATE THE COMPUTER TO FACE A DIFFERENT DIRECTION—Eliminate sunlight glare, which can cause poor picture quality.

RESTORE THE RECOMMENDED SETTINGS—Restore the original resolution and refresh rate settings. See the Tell Me How help file for instructions. To access help files, see page 26.

ADJUST THE WINDOWS DISPLAY SETTINGS-

- 1 Click the **Start** button, point to **Settings**, and then click **Control Panel**.
- 2 Double-click the **Display** icon and then click the **Settings** tab.
- 3 Try different settings for Colors and Screen area.

Sound and Speaker Problems

Integrated Speakers

ADJUST THE WINDOWS VOLUME CONTROL—Double-click the yellow speaker icon in the lower-right corner of your screen. Be sure that the volume is turned up and that the sound is not muted.

CHECK THE VOLUME CONTROL BUTTONS—Press both volume control buttons simultaneously or press < Fn> < End> to disable (mute) or reenable the integrated speakers.

REINSTALL THE SOUND (AUDIO) DRIVER—See page 42.



HINT: The volume control in some MP3 players overrides the Windows volume setting. If you have been listening to MP3 songs, make sure that you did not turn the player volume down or off.

External Speakers

VERIFY THE SPEAKER CABLE CONNECTIONS—Ensure that the speakers are connected as shown on the setup diagram supplied with the speakers.

TEST THE ELECTRICAL OUTLET— Ensure that the electrical outlet is working by testing it with another device, such as a lamp.

ENSURE THAT THE SPEAKERS ARE TURNED ON—See the setup diagram supplied with the speakers.

ADJUST THE SPEAKER CONTROLS—Adjust the volume, bass, or treble controls to eliminate distortion.

ADJUST THE WINDOWS VOLUME CONTROL—Double-click the yellow speaker icon in the lower-right corner of your screen. Be sure that the volume is turned up and that the sound is not muted.

TEST THE SPEAKERS— Plug the speaker audio cable into the headphone connector on the side of the computer. Ensure that the headphone volume control is turned up. Play a music CD.

RUN THE SPEAKER SELF-TEST—Some speaker systems have a self-test button on the subwoofer. See the speaker documentation for self-test instructions.

Move the subwoofer away from the computer or monitor—If your external speaker system includes a subwoofer, ensure that the subwoofer is at least 60 m (2 ft) away from the computer or external monitor.

ELIMINATE POSSIBLE INTERFERENCE—Turn off nearby fans, fluorescent lights, or halogen lamps to check for interference.

REINSTALL THE SOUND (AUDIO) DRIVER—See page 42.

Printer Problems

If you cannot print to a parallel port printer

VERIFY THE PRINTER CABLE CONNECTIONS—Ensure that the printer cable is connected as described on page 14.

TEST THE ELECTRICAL OUTLET— Ensure that the electrical outlet is working by testing it with another device, such as a lamp.

ENSURE THAT THE PRINTER IS TURNED ON—See the documentation supplied with the printer.

VERIFY THAT THE PRINTER IS RECOGNIZED BY WINDOWS

- 1 Click the Start button, point to Settings, and then click Printers. If the printer is listed, right-click the printer icon, click **Properties**, and then select the **Details** tab.
- 2 Ensure that the **Print to the following port:** setting is **LPT1 (Printer Port)**.

REINSTALL THE PRINTER DRIVER— See page 14.

If you cannot print to a USB printer

VERIFY THE PRINTER CABLE CONNECTIONS—Ensure that the printer cable is connected as described on page 15.

TEST THE ELECTRICAL OUTLET— Ensure that the electrical outlet is working by testing it with another device, such as a lamp.

ENSURE THAT THE PRINTER IS TURNED ON—See the documentation supplied with the printer.

VERIFY THAT THE PRINTER IS RECOGNIZED BY WINDOWS-

- 1 Click the **Start** button, point to **Settings**, and then click **Printers**. If the printer is listed, right-click the printer icon, click **Properties**, and then select the **Details** tab.
- 2 Ensure that the **Print to the following port:** setting is **USB**.

REINSTALL THE PRINTER DRIVER— See page 14.

Modem Problems

NOTICE: Connect the modem to an analog telephone wall jack only. Connecting the modem to a digital telephone network damages the modem.

CHECK THE TELEPHONE JACK—Disconnect the telephone line from the modem and connect it to a telephone. Listen for a dial tone.

CONNECT THE MODEM DIRECTLY TO THE TELEPHONE WALL JACK-If you have other telephone devices sharing the line, such as an answering machine, fax machine, surge protector, or line splitter, then bypass them and connect the modem directly to the telephone wall jack with the telephone line.

CHECK THE CONNECTION— Verify that the telephone line is connected to the modem.

CHECK THE TELEPHONE LINE—Try using a different telephone line. If you are using a line that is 3 m (10 ft) or more in length, try a shorter one.

VERIFY THAT THE MODEM IS COMMUNICATING WITH WINDOWS

- 1 Click the Start button, point to Settings, and click Control Panel.
- 2 In the Control Panel window, double-click Modems.

If there are multiple entries for the same modem or modems listed that are not installed, delete the entries and restart the computer.

- 3 Click the **Diagnostics** tab.
- 4 Click the COM port for your modem.
- 5 Click **More Info** to verify that the modem is communicating with Windows. If all commands receive responses, the modem is operating properly.

Scanner Problems

CHECK THE POWER CABLE CONNECTION— Ensure that the scanner power cable is firmly connected to a working electrical power source and that the scanner is turned on.

CHECK THE SCANNER CABLE CONNECTION—Ensure that the scanner cable is firmly connected to the computer and to the scanner.

UNLOCK THE SCANNER—Ensure that your scanner is unlocked if it has a locking tab or button.

REINSTALL THE SCANNER DRIVER—See the scanner documentation for instructions.

Touch Pad Problems

CHECK THE TOUCH PAD SETTINGS—Click the Start button, point to Settings, click Control Panel, and then double-click the Mouse icon. Try adjusting the settings.

External Keyboard Problems

DISCONNECT THE KEYBOARD CABLE—Shut down the computer (see page 16). Disconnect the keyboard cable and check the cable connector for bent or broken pins.

Unexpected Characters

DISABLE THE NUMERIC KEYPAD—Press the < Num Lk> key to disable the numeric keypad. Verify that the numbers lock light is not lit.

Drive Problems


If you cannot save a file to a floppy disk

ENSURE THAT WINDOWS RECOGNIZES THE DRIVE—Double-click the My Computer icon. If the floppy drive is not listed, perform a full scan with your antivirus software to check for and remove viruses. Viruses can sometimes prevent Windows from recognizing the drive.

CANNOT SAVE FILES TO A FLOPPY DISK—Ensure that the floppy disk is not full or write-protected (locked). See the following illustration.

TEST THE DRIVE WITH ANOTHER FLOPPY DISK—Insert another floppy disk to eliminate the possibility that the original floppy disk is defective.

CHECK THE CONNECTION ON THE CABLES—If the floppy drive is connected externally, ensure that the cables are securely connected (see page 61).



If you cannot play a music CD or install a program from a CD

ENSURE THAT A CD DRIVE IS INSTALLED IN THE MEDIA BAY - To use the CD drive, it must be installed in the media bay. It cannot be used as an external device with the floppy drive cable. The floppy drive cable is for connecting external floppy drives only.

ADJUST THE WINDOWS VOLUME CONTROL—Double-click the yellow speaker icon in the lower-right corner of your screen. Be sure that the volume is turned up and that the sound is not muted.

If you cannot play a DVD movie

Ensure that a DVD drive is installed in the media bay—To use the DVD drive, it must be installed in the media bay. It cannot be used as an external device with the floppy drive cable. The floppy drive cable is for connecting external floppy drives only.

ENSURE THAT WINDOWS RECOGNIZES THE DRIVE—Double-click the My Computer icon. If the DVD drive is not listed, perform a full scan with your antivirus software to check for and remove viruses. Viruses can sometimes prevent Windows from recognizing the drive.

TEST THE DRIVE WITH ANOTHER DVD—Insert another DVD to eliminate the possibility that the original DVD is defective.



HINT: High-speed CD drive vibration is normal and may cause noise. This noise does not indicate a defect in the drive or the CD.



HINT: Because of different worldwide file types, not all DVD titles work in all DVD drives.

CHANGE THE WRITE SPEED TO A SLOWER RATE—The CD-RW drive must receive a steady stream of data when writing. If the stream is interrupted, an error occurs. Closing all programs before writing to the CD-RW may also alleviate the problem.

Network Problems

CHECK THE NETWORK CABLE CONNECTOR—Ensure that the network cable connector is firmly connected to the PC Card network adapter or port replicator and to the network wall jack.

CHECK THE NETWORK LIGHTS ON THE NETWORK CONNECTOR—Green indicates that the network connection is active. If the status light is not green, try replacing the network cable. Amber indicates that the network card driver is loaded and the card is detecting activity.

RESTART THE COMPUTER— Try to log on to the network again.

CONTACT YOUR NETWORK ADMINISTRATOR—Verify that your network settings are correct and that the network is functioning.

Windows Error Messages

X:\ IS NOT ACCESSIBLE. THE DEVICE IS NOT READY—Insert a disk into the drive and try again.

A FILENAME CANNOT CONTAIN ANY OF THE FOLLOWING filenames.

NOT ENOUGH MEMORY OR RESOURCES. CLOSE SOME PROGRAMS AND TRY AGAIN— You have too many programs open. Close all windows and open the program that you want to use.

THE FILE BEING COPIED IS TOO LARGE FOR THE DESTINATION **DRIVE**— The file that you are trying to copy is too large to fit on the disk, or the disk is too full. Try copying the file to a different disk or use a larger capacity disk.

A REQUIRED .DLL FILE WAS NOT FOUND—The program that you are trying to open is missing an essential file. To remove and then reinstall the program:

A program crashes

SEE THE SOFTWARE DOCUMENTATION— Many software manufacturers maintain websites with information that may help you to solve the problem.

A program stops responding

PRESS < CTRL > < ALT > < DEL > — In the Close Program window, select the program that is no longer responding. Then click End Task.

A solid blue screen appears

TURN THE COMPUTER OFF—If the computer does not respond to a keystroke or a proper shutdown (see page 16), press the power button until the computer turns off. Press the power button again to restart the computer. The solid blue screen appears because you were not able to perform a proper Windows shutdown. ScanDisk will automatically run during the start-up process. Follow the instructions on the screen.

TURN OFF CALL WAITING (CATCH-PHONE)—See your telephone directory for instructions on deactivating this feature. Then adjust the dial-up networking connection properties:

16 If the **Date/Time Properties** window appears, adjust the date and time properties, click Apply, and then click OK.








Docking the Computer

NOTICE: Before you initially connect your computer to the APR, you must complete the operating system setup. When you see the Windows desktop on your screen, the operating system setup is complete.


You dock your computer when you connect it to an APR. You must connect the AC adapter to the APR before you dock and turn on the computer. The AC adapter powers the APR and the computer at the same time. Any battery installed in the computer charges while you use the APR.


- NOTICE: Always use the Dell AC adapter that came with the APR. If you use any other commercially available AC adapter—or the AC adapter from other Dell computers—you may damage the APR or the computer.
- 1 Save and close all open files, exit all open programs, and shut down the computer (see page 16).

- 2 Disconnect any external devices, and remove any PC Cards from the computer.
- 3 Connect the AC adapter to the connector on the APR, and connect the AC power cable to an electrical outlet.
- 4 Horizontally center the computer on the APR base, with the back of the computer facing the APR docking connector.
- 5 Slide the computer toward the connector until you feel the grooves on the bottom of the computer engage with the alignment rails.
- NOTICE: If you attempt to push the computer all the way into the APR without engaging the alignment rails, you may irreparably damage the docking connector on the computer. If you have a monitor stand installed, you will not be able to see the alignment rails or the docking connector.
- **6** Gently push the computer forward until the docking connector is fully engaged.
- 7 Slide the eject/locking lever towards the back of the APR to the locked position.




- 1 Save and close all open files and exit all open programs.

Monitor Stand

HINT: Be sure that the back legs on the monitor stand engage the slots on either side of the APR base.

NOTICE: The stand supports monitors that weigh up to 45.3 kg (100 lb). Heavier monitors may damage the stand, computer, and APR.



Adding Memory

You can increase your computer memory by installing memory modules on the system board. See page 65 for information on the type of memory supported by your computer.

Your computer has two memory module sockets labeled "DIMM A" and "DIMM B." You can install all sizes of memory modules you purchase from Dell (but which Dell does not install), except the 192-MB memory module, in either socket. If you purchase a non-Dell-installed 192-MB memory module, you must install it in the "DIMM B" socket.



CAUTION: Before working inside your computer, read the "Safety Instructions" at the front of this guide (see page 7).




NOTICE: Do not install or remove a memory module when the computer is turned on, in standby mode, or in hibernate mode.


Replacing a Hard Drive

- NOTICE: Hard drives are extremely fragile and must be handled carefully. Even a slight bump can damage the drive.
- CAUTION: If you remove the hard drive from the computer when the drive is hot, do not touch the metal housing of the hard drive.






Attaching the Composite TV-Out **Adapter Čable**

Your computer has an S-video TV-out connector for connecting a television to the computer. To connect a television:

- 2 *If the television has an S-video cable*, connect the S-video cable from the TV to the computer's S-video TV-out connector.

If the television has only a composite video cable connector, plug the composite TV-out adapter cable that came with your computer into the S-video TV-out connector on the computer. Connect the other end of the composite TV-out adapter cable to the television's composite video cable, and then plug the composite video cable into the TV.
