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Information about the Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell

The Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell provides an extension of the Cisco Nexus switch fabric to the Dell blade servers.

The Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extenders behave as remote line cards for a parent Cisco Nexus switch. The Fabric Extenders are essentially extensions of the parent Cisco Nexus switch fabric, with the Fabric Extenders and the parent Cisco Nexus switch together forming a distributed modular system. The Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell support is limited to the Cisco Nexus 5500 series of switches.

Each Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender connects via 10-Gigabit Ethernet for 16 servers within a Dell BladeEnclosure and contains 8 10-Gigabit Ethernet fabric uplinks towards the parent Cisco Nexus switch. Multiple low cost options are available for fabric connections between the Cisco Nexus B22 and the parent Cisco Nexus switch. Low-cost connections up to 10 meters can be made with copper Twin-ax cables, and longer connections up to 100 meters can use the Fabric Extender Transceiver. Other standard 10 Gigabit Ethernet optics such as 10GBASE-SR, 10GBASE-LR, and 10GBASE-ER are also supported for these fabric connections.



The Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell has the following features:

- Sixteen internal 10-Gigabit Ethernet KR ports to the blade servers
- Eight External 10-Gigabit Ethernet SFP+ ports
- One Bicolor LED (Green/Amber) for external up link ports and no LED's for internal ports.
- Thermal monitoring
- Thermal management provided by the M1000e Blade Enclosure
- Hot pluggable
- 12V power from chassis

Shipping Box Contents


The Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell shipping box contains:

Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell, with 16 internal host ports and 8 external network ports.

The shipping box is available with or without the Fabric Extender Transceiver (FET). The product ID of the bundle with the Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender and the Fabric Extender Tranceiver is N2K-B22DELL-F (Dell part number 4PTY0) and contains 16 Fabric Extender Transceivers.

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Figure 1 shows the Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell.





1	Eight External 10-Gigabit SFP+ ports	2	Power LED (Left) and Health (LED Right)

Figure 2 shows the rear view of the blade chassis, in which you install the switch module.

Consider these prerequisites before you install the switch module:

- Fill any unoccupied interconnect bays or any unoccupied power module bays in the blade chassis with blanks.
- The switch module should be installed into the I/O slot that corresponds to the I/O fabric (A, B, or C) where a 10GE KR Ethernet Adapter, or 10GE Converged Network Adapter (CNA), within the blade server, is appropriately installed. The Chassis Management Controller (CMC) GUI can

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be used to view the location of network adapters installed in the Blade servers. Browse to the CMC IP address and login, then under **Server Overview**, click on the servers to determine which I/O fabric contains the 10GE adapters.

- For complete instructions for installing a switch module into the blade server enclosure, refer to the section on installing an I/O module in the *Dell PowerEdge M1000e Enclosure Owner's Manual*.

M1000e I/O Module Port Mapping

Full-Height Blades

Full height blades support up to 2 LOM or bNDC adapters, with at least 2 port connections each. For a full-height blade in bay n:

- Adapter1, port 1 connects to I/O module A1, port n.
- Adapter1, port 2 connects to I/O module A2, port n.
- Adapter2, port 1 connects to I/O module A1, port n+8.
- Adapter2, port 2 connects to I/O module A2, port n+8.

Full-height blades support four mezzanine cards, with 2 port connections each:

• Slot Mezz1_Fabric_C supports Fabric C

Mezz1 Port 1 to I/O Module C1, port n

Mezz1 Port 2 to I/O Module C2, port n

• Slot Mezz2_Fabric_B supports Fabric B, port n.

Mezz2 Port 1 to I/O Module B1, port n

Mezz2 Port 2 to I/O Module B2, port n

• Slot Mezz3_Fabric_C supports Fabric C, port n+8.

Mezz3 Port 1 to I/O Module C1, port n+8

Mezz3 Port 2 to I/O Module C2, port n+8

• Slot Mezz4_Fabric_B supports Fabric B, port n+8.

Mezz4 Port 1 to I/O Module B1, port n+8

Mezz4 Port 2 to I/O Module B2, port n+8

Mezzanine card type must match the fabric type of the I/O modules installed in corresponding I/O module slots.

Half-Height Blades

Half-height blades support a LOM or bNDC adapter, with at least 2 port connections.

For a half-height blade in bay n:

• Adapter port 1 connects to I/O module A1, port n.

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• Adapter port 2 connects to I/O module A2, port n.

Half-height blades support two mezzanine cards:

Slot Mezz1_Fabric_C supports Fabric C

Mezz1 Port 1 to I/O Module C1, port n

- Mezz1 Port 2 to I/O Module C2, port n
- Slot Mezz2_Fabric_B supports Fabric B, port n.

Mezz2 Port 1 to I/O Module B1, port n

Mezz2 Port 2 to I/O Module B2, port n

Mezzanine card type must match the fabric type of the I/O modules installed in corresponding I/O module slots.

Quarter-Height Blades

Quarter-height blades, 4 within a sleeve (Blade a, b, c and d), each support a LOM, with 2 port connections (the second port connection is only available to I/O modules with 32 ports).

I/O modules with 16 internal ports require populating both A1 and A2 in order to connect to all Quarter Height Blade positions within a sleeve.

For a full height sleeve in enclosure slot n(n=1-8):

- Blade a LOM port 1 connects to I/O module A1, port n.
- Blade b LOM port 1 connects to I/O module A2, port n.
- Blade c LOM port 1 connects to I/O module A1, port (n+8).
- Blade d LOM port 1 connects to I/O module A2, port (n+8).

Second adapter port requires a 32 port I/O Module:

- Blade a LOM port 2 connects to I/O module A2, port (n+16).
- Blade b LOM port 2 connects to I/O module A1, port (n+16).
- Blade c LOM port 2 connects to I/O module A2, port (n+24).
- Blade d LOM port 2 connects to I/O module A1, port (n+24).

A quarter-height blade supports a single mezzanine card slot:

The mezzanine card slot Fabric supported (B or C) depends on the position in the sleeve where the blade is installed. Each mezzanine card has two port connections. Population of four cards (B1, B2, C1, C2) will provide dual connections to all 32 quarter height servers.

For a ful height sleeve in enclosure slot n(n=1 - 8):

• Blade a Mezzanine card supports Fabric C

Mezz Port 1 to I/O Module C1, port n

Mezz Port 2 to I/O Module C2, port n

Blade b Mezzanine card supports Fabric B

Mezz Port 1 to I/O Module B1, port n

Mezz Port 2 to I/O Module B2, port n

• Blade c Mezzanine card supports Fabric C

Mezz Port 1 to I/O Module C1, port n+8

Mezz Port 2 to I/O Module C2, port n+8

• Blade d Mezzanine card supports Fabric B

Mezz Port 1 to I/O Module B1, port n+8

Mezz Port 2 to I/O Module B2, port n+8

Mezzanine card type must match the fabric type of the I/O modules installed in corresponding I/O module slots.

Dell FEX LEDs

Installing the Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell



Properly ground yourself before handling the Fabric Extender.

Populate all the chassis interconnect bays with a fabric blade or one of the blank panels provided with the chassis.

To install the Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell in the chassis:

- 1. Locate the appropriate interconnect bay at the rear of the chassis. See the setup and installation guide provided with the chassis.
- 2. Press the handle latch to release the handle.



The Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell is a hot-pluggable device. The chassis may be on or off during installation.

- **3.** Align the Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell with the appropriate interconnect bay, according to the specific configuration for the chassis. Push the switch firmly into the interconnect bay.
- 4. Press the installation handle into the latch to lock the switch into place.
- 5. Connect the cables.
- 6. Configure the parent Cisco Nexus switch to recognize and boot up the Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell.

Updating NX-OS

To achieve the best performance, Dell recommends updating to the latest NX-OS software version.

Note

The minimum version of NX-OS is 5.2(1)N1(3) The minimum CMC firmware versions is: M1000e CMC Firmware Version 4.3

The Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell downloads the necessary firmware from the connected Cisco Nexus switch. You can update the Cisco Nexus Switch without any disruptions using the **install all** command. Contact the company from whom your Cisco Nexus Switch was purchased.

The Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell is managed by its parent Cisco Nexus switch over the fabric interfaces through a zero-touch configuration model. You upgrade the Fabric Extender by upgrading the software on the parent Cisco Nexus switch.

When a Fabric Extender is properly associated with a parent switch, the following upgrade operations are performed:

- The switch checks the software image compatibility and upgrades the Fabric Extender if necessary.
- The switch pushes the configuration data to the fabric extender. The Fabric Extender does not store any configuration locally.
- The Fabric Extender updates the switch with its operational status. All fabric extender information
 is displayed using the switch commands for monitoring and troubleshooting.

In-Service Software Upgrades (ISSUs) are supported on the parent Cisco Nexus switches. An ISSU can update the software images on your device without disrupting data traffic. An ISSU updates the Kickstart, System, and Fabric Extender image.

The **install all** command triggers the ISSU on the parent Cisco Nexus switches and the Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell. The command provides the following benefits:

- You can upgrade the parent Cisco Nexus switches and the Cisco Nexus B22 Fabric Extender for Dell using just one command.
- You can receive descriptive information about the intended changes to your system before you continue with the installation. For example, it identifies potential disruptive upgrades.

- You can continue or cancel the upgrade when you see this question (the default is no):
 Do you want to continue (y/n) [n] : y
- You can upgrade the Cisco NX-OS software using a nondisruptive procedure.
- The command automatically checks the image integrity, which includes the running kickstart and system images. The command sets the kickstart and system boot variables.
- The command performs a platform validity check to verify that a wrong image is not used.
- The Ctrl-c escape sequence gracefully ends the **install all** command. The command sequence completes the update step in progress and returns to the EXEC prompt.
- After issuing the **install all** command, if any step in the sequence fails, the upgrade ends.
- The following message appears to warn you about the impact of upgrading the power sequencer:

Warning: please do not remove or power off the module at this time. Note: Power-seq upgrade needs a power-cycle to take into effect. On success of power-seq upgrade, SWITCH OFF THE POWER to the system and then, power it up.

• You can force a disruptive upgrade.

Associating a Fabric Extender to a Fabric Interface

A Fabric Extender is connected to the switch through physical Ethernet interfaces or an EtherChannel. By default, the switch does not allow the attached Fabric Extender to connect until it has been assigned a chassis ID and is associated with the connected interface.

Note

The Fabric Extender may connect to the switch through a number of separate physical Ethernet interfaces or at most one EtherChannel interface.

Associating a Fabric Extender to an Ethernet Interface

To associate the Fabric Extender to an Ethernet interface, perform this task:

	Command	Purpose
Step 1	switch# configure terminal	Enters configuration mode.
Step 2	<pre>switch(config)# interface ethernet slot/port</pre>	Specifies an Ethernet interface to configure.
Step 3	<pre>switch(config-if) # switchport mode fex-fabric</pre>	Sets the interface to support an external Fabric Extender.
Step 4	<pre>switch(config-if)# fex associate FEX Number</pre>	Associates the chassis ID to the Fabric Extender unit attached to the interface. The range of the chassis ID is from 100 to 199.
Step 5	<pre>switch# show interface ethernet port/slot fex-intf</pre>	(Optional) Displays the association of a Fabric Extender to an Ethernet interface.

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This example shows how to associate the Fabric Extender to an Ethernet interface on the switch:

Associating a Fabric Extender to an EtherChannel

To associate the Fabric Extender to an EtherChannel, perform this task:

Command	Purpose
switch# configure terminal	Enters configuration mode.
<pre>switch(config)# interface port-channel channel</pre>	Specifies an EtherChannel to configure.
<pre>switch(config-if)# switchport mode fex-fabric</pre>	Sets the EtherChannel to support an external Fabric Extender.
switch(config-if)# fex associate FEX Number	Associates the FEX Number to the Fabric Extender unit attached to the interface. The range of the FEX Number is from 100 to 199.
switch# show interface port-channel channel fex-intf	(Optional) Displays the association of a Fabric Extender to an EtherChannel interface.

This example shows how to associate the Fabric Extender to an EtherChannel interface on the switch:

Disassociating a Fabric Extender from an Interface

To disassociate the Fabric Extender from an interface, perform this task:

Command	Purpose
<pre>switch(config-if)# no fex associate</pre>	Disassociates the Fabric Extender unit attached to the interface.

Configuring the Fabric Extender

To configure global features for a Fabric Extender, perform this tasks:

Command	Purpose		
switch# configure terminal	Enters configuration mode.		
switch(config)# fex FEX Number	Enters configuration mode for the specified Fabric Extender FEX Number. The range of the FEX Number is from 100 to 199.		
<pre>switch(config-fex)# description desc</pre>	Specifies the description. The default is the string FEX <i>xxxx</i> where <i>xxxx</i> is the FEX Number. If the FEX Number is 123, the description is FEX0123.		
<pre>switch(config-fex)# no description</pre>	Deletes the description.		
switch(config-fex)# pinning max-links uplinks	Defines the number of uplinks. The default is 1. The range is from 1 to 8.		
	This command is only applicable if the Fabric Extender is connected to its parent switch using one or more statically pinned fabric interfaces. There ca only be one EtherChannel connection.		
<pre>switch(config-fex) # no pinning max-links</pre>	Resets the number of uplinks to the default.		
switch(config-fex)# serial serial	Defines a serial number string. If this command is configured, then a switch will only allow the corresponding FEX Number to associate (using the fex associate command) if the Fabric Extender reports a matching serial number string.		
	Configuring a serial number other than that of the given Fabric Extender will force the Fabric Extender offline.		
switch(config-fex)# no serial	Deletes the serial number string.		

Caution

Changing the number of uplinks with the **pinning max-links** command or the **no pinning max-links** command disrupts all the host interface ports of the Fabric Extender.

Redistributing the Links

When you provision the Fabric Extender with statically pinned interfaces, the downlink host interfaces on the Fabric Extender are pinned to the fabric interfaces in the order they were initially configured. If you want to maintain a specific relationship of host interfaces to fabric interface across reboots, you should re-pin the links.



The ports are distributed across the number specified in the pinning max-links section. So if you only have 4 uplinks, you do not want to have max 8 since it will leave half your internal ports unmapped.

You may want to perform this function in these two situations:

- A change in the max-links configuration.
- If you need to maintain the pinning order of host interfaces to fabric interfaces.

Changing the Number of Links

If you initially configured port 19 on the parent switch as your only fabric interface, all 16 host interfaces are pinned to this port. If you provision another port, for example 20, then you must enter the **pinning max-links 2** command to redistribute the host interfaces. All host interfaces are brought down and host interfaces 1 to 8 are pinned to fabric interface 19 and host interfaces 9 to 16 are pinned to fabric interface 20.

Maintaining the Pinning Order

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The pinning order of the host interfaces is initially determined by the order in which the fabric interfaces were configured. In this example, four fabric interfaces were configured in the following order:

The next time that you reboot the Fabric Extender, the configured fabric interfaces are pinned to the host interfaces in an ascending order by port number of the fabric interface. If you want to configure the same fixed distribution of host interfaces without restarting the Fabric Extender, enter the **fex pinning redistribute** command.

To redistribute the host interfaces on the Fabric Extender, perform this task:

Command	Purpose
	Redistributes the host connections. The range of the FEX number is from 100 to 199.

This example shows how to redistribute the host interfaces on a Fabric Extender:

switch# fex pinning redistribute 100

Caution

The fex pinning redistribute command disrupts all the host interface ports of the Fabric Extender.

Displaying Configuration Information

To display configuration information about the defined interfaces, perform one of these tasks:

<pre>switch# show interface type number fex-intf</pre>	Displays the Fabric Extender ports pinned to a specific switch interface.
