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About this document

Dell Technologies XC650 system overview

The XC650 is a 1U server that supports:

- Up to two 3rd Generation Intel Xeon Scalable processors, with up to 40 cores per processor
- 32 DIMM slots
- Two redundant AC power supply units
- 10 x 2.5-inch drives (with two or four universal slots to support optional NVMe drives) or 10x 2.5-inch NVMe drives only.

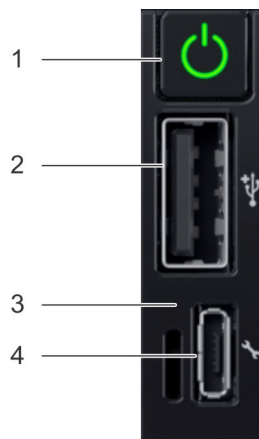





Figure 2. Right control panel

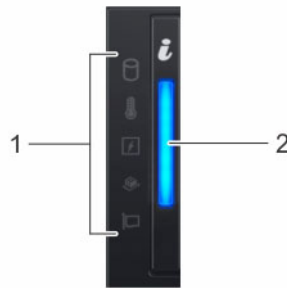


Figure 3. Left control panel without optional iDRAC Quick Sync 2.0 indicator

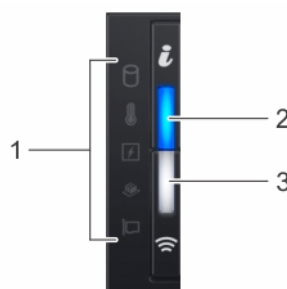



Figure 4. Left control panel with optional iDRAC Quick Sync 2.0 indicator

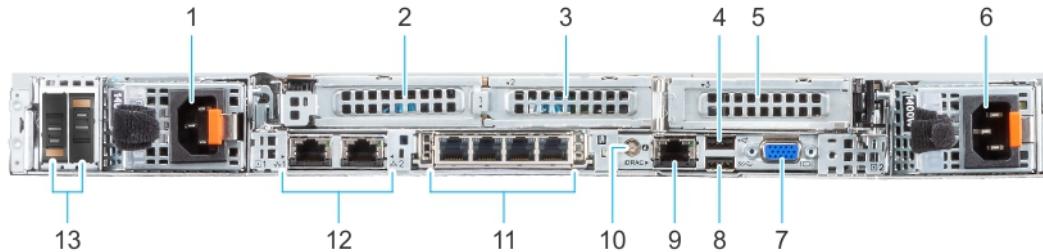


Figure 5. Rear view of the system with 3 x LP PCIe slots

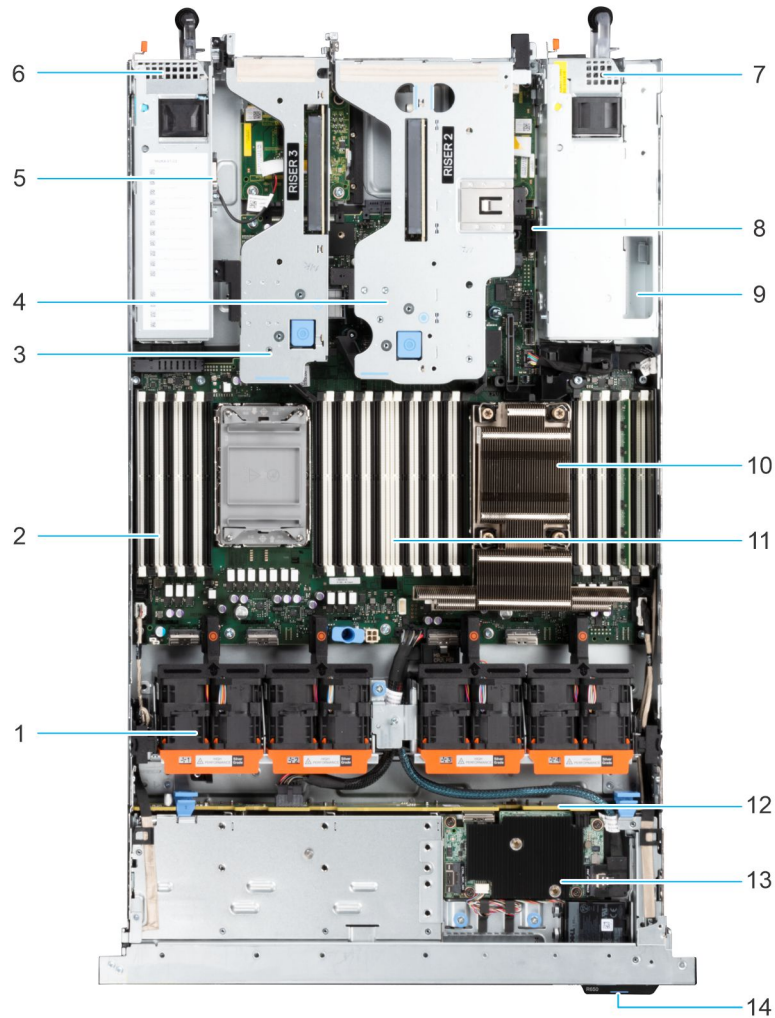


Figure 6. Inside the system with front mounting fPERC

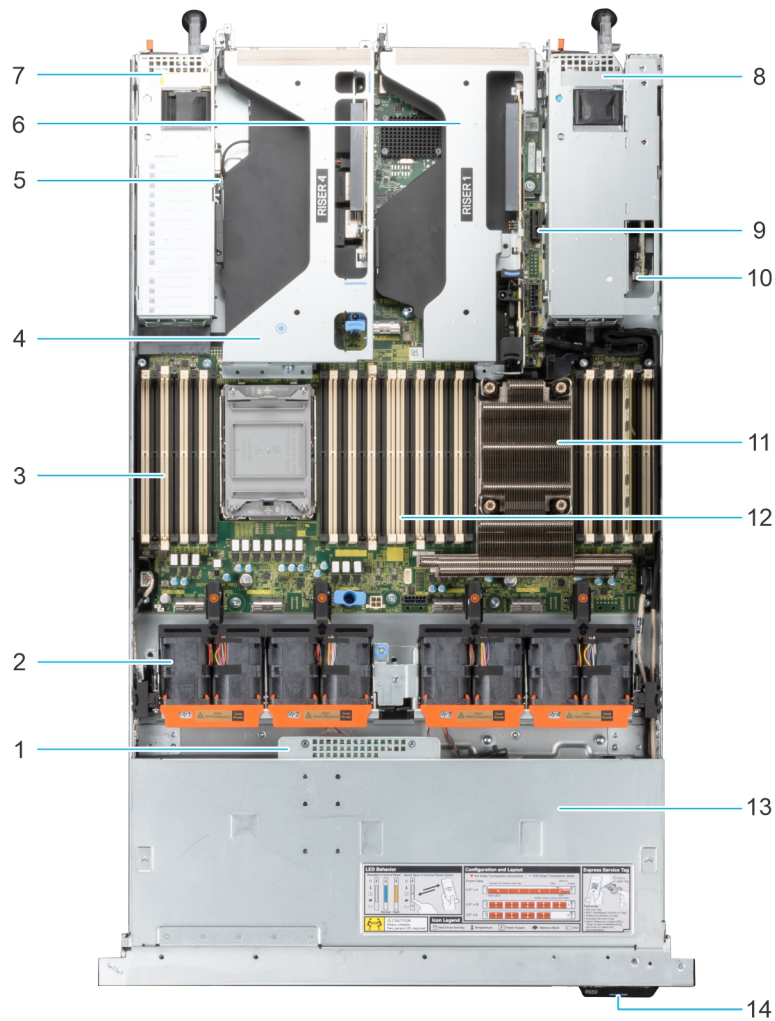


Figure 7. Inside the system with rear mounting fPERC

Locating the Express Service Code and Service Tag

The unique Express Service Code and Service Tag are used to identify the system.

The information tag is located on the front of the system that includes system information such as Service Tag, Express Service Code, Manufacture date, NIC, MAC address, QRL label, and so on.

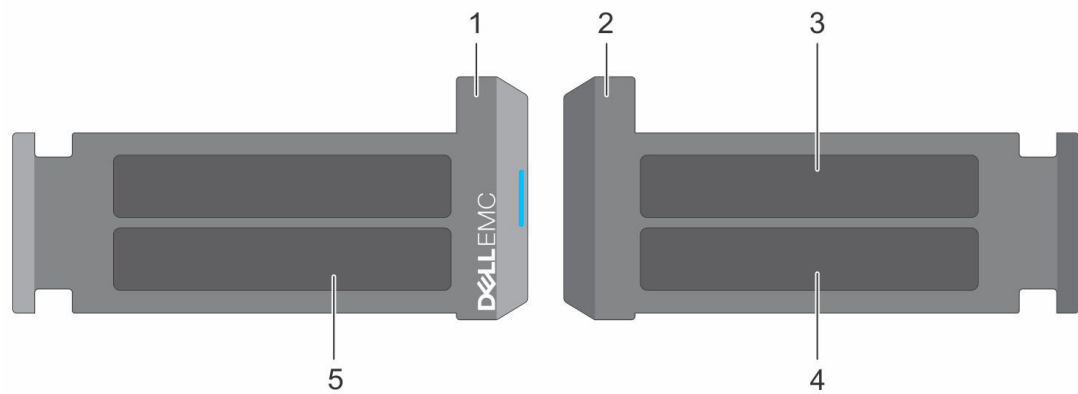


Figure 8. Locating the Express Service Code and Service tag

The Mini Enterprise Service Tag (MEST) label is located on the rear of the system that includes Service Tag (ST), Express Service Code (Exp Svc Code), and Manufacture Date (Mfg. Date). The Exp Svc Code is used by Dell EMC to route support calls to the appropriate personnel.

Alternatively, the Service Tag information is located on a label on the left wall of the chassis.

The system information label is located on back side of the system cover.

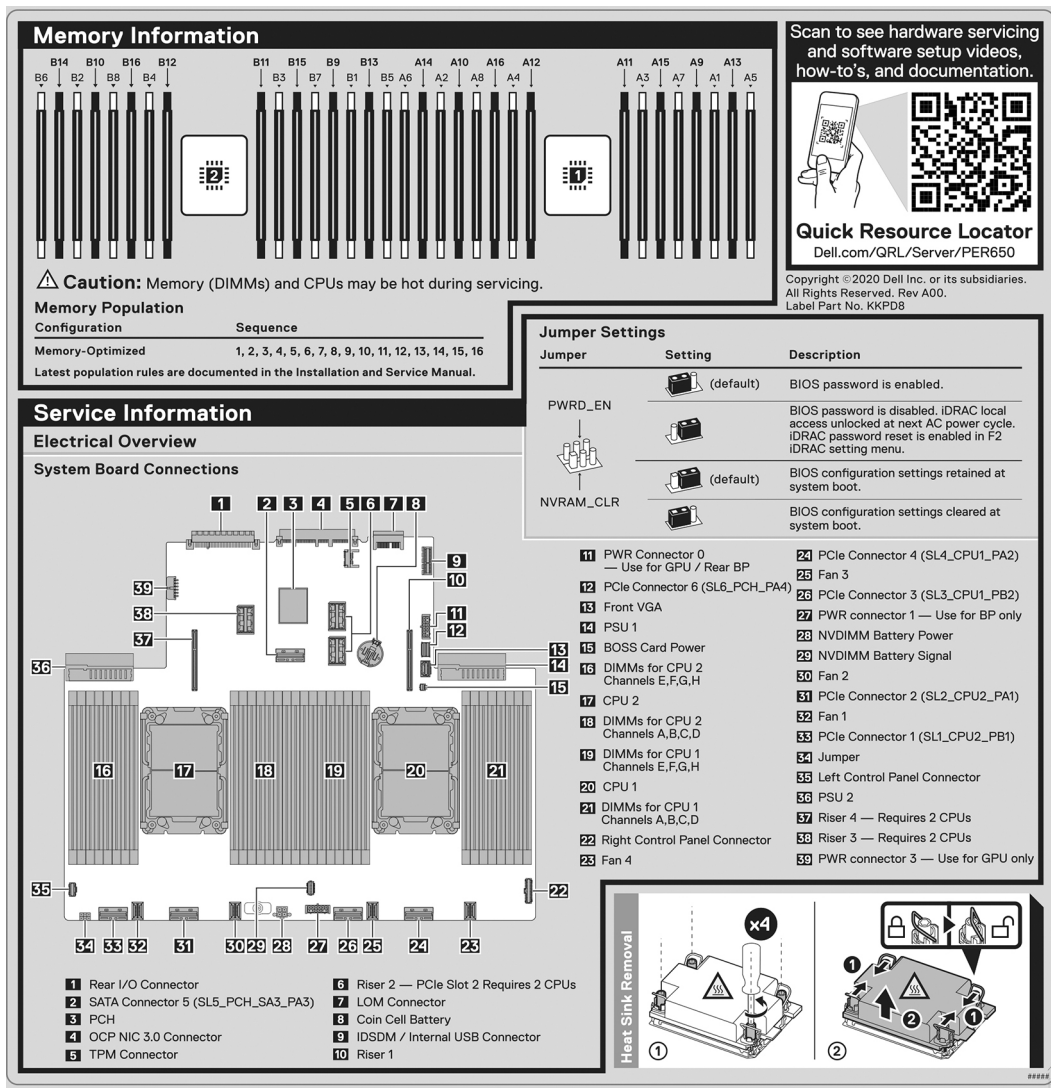


Figure 10. Memory information and system board connectors

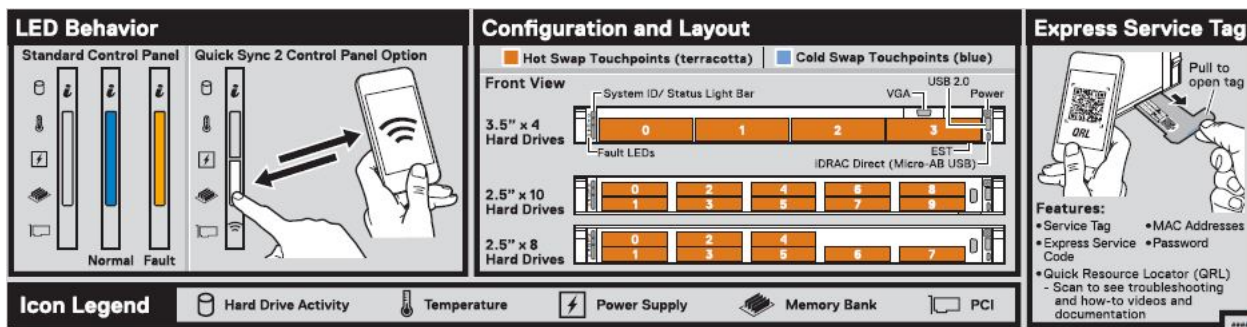


Figure 11. LED behavior, configuration and layout, express service tag

iDRAC configuration

The Integrated Dell Remote Access Controller (iDRAC) is designed to make you more productive as a system administrator and improve the overall availability of Dell EMC servers. iDRAC alerts you to system issues, helps you to perform remote management, and reduces the need for physical access to the system.

Options to set up iDRAC IP address

To enable communication between your system and iDRAC, you must first configure the network settings based on your network infrastructure. The network settings option is set to **DHCP**, by default.

 **NOTE:** For static IP configuration, you must request for the settings at the time of purchase.

NOTE: To access iDRAC, ensure that you connect the ethernet cable to the iDRAC dedicated network port or use iDRAC Direct port by using the USB cable. You can also access iDRAC through the shared LOM mode, if you have opted for a system that has the shared LOM mode enabled.

Options to log in to iDRAC

To log in into the iDRAC Web User Interface, open a browser and enter the IP address.

In the login screen displayed, if you have opted for secure default access to iDRAC, enter the iDRAC secure default password available on back of the Information Tag. If you have not opted for secure default access to iDRAC, enter the default user name and password – `root` and `calvin`. You can also log in by using your Single Sign-On or Smart Card.

NOTE: Ensure that you change the default username and password after setting up the iDRAC IP address.

Minimum configuration to POST

The components listed below are the minimum configuration to POST:

- One processor (CPU) in socket processor 1
- One memory module (DIMM) in socket A1
- One power supply unit
- System board + LOM card + RIO card

Configuration validation

The new generation of XC Core systems have added interconnect flexibility and advanced iDRAC management features to collect precise system configuration information and report configuration errors.

The Portfolio Platform Configuration Matrix (PPCM) configuration table aligns with the qualified configurations at the time of iDRAC release.

When the system is powered on, information about installed cables, risers, backplanes, floating devices (like PERC adapter PERC, BOSS), and processor is obtained from the CPLD and backplane memory maps. This information forms a unique configuration, which is compared with one of the qualified configurations stored in a table maintained by iDRAC.

One or more sensors are assigned to each of the configuration elements. During POST, any configuration validation error is logged in the System Event Log (SEL)/LifeCycle (LC) log. The reported events are categorized in the configuration validation error table.

- Key to the bezel lock. The key is required only if your system includes a bezel.
- Phillips #1 screwdriver
- Phillips #2 screwdriver
- Torx #T20 screwdriver
- Torx #T30 screwdriver
- 5 mm hex nut screwdriver
- Plastic scribe
- 1/4-inch flat blade screwdriver

- Wrist grounding strap connected to the ground
- ESD mat

You need the following tools to assemble the cables for a DC power supply unit:

- AMP 90871-1 hand-crimping tool or equivalent
- Tyco Electronics 58433-3 or equivalent
- Wire-stripper pliers to remove insulation from size 10 AWG solid or stranded, insulated copper wire

NOTE: Use alpha wire part number 3080 or equivalent (65/30 stranding).

Optional front bezel

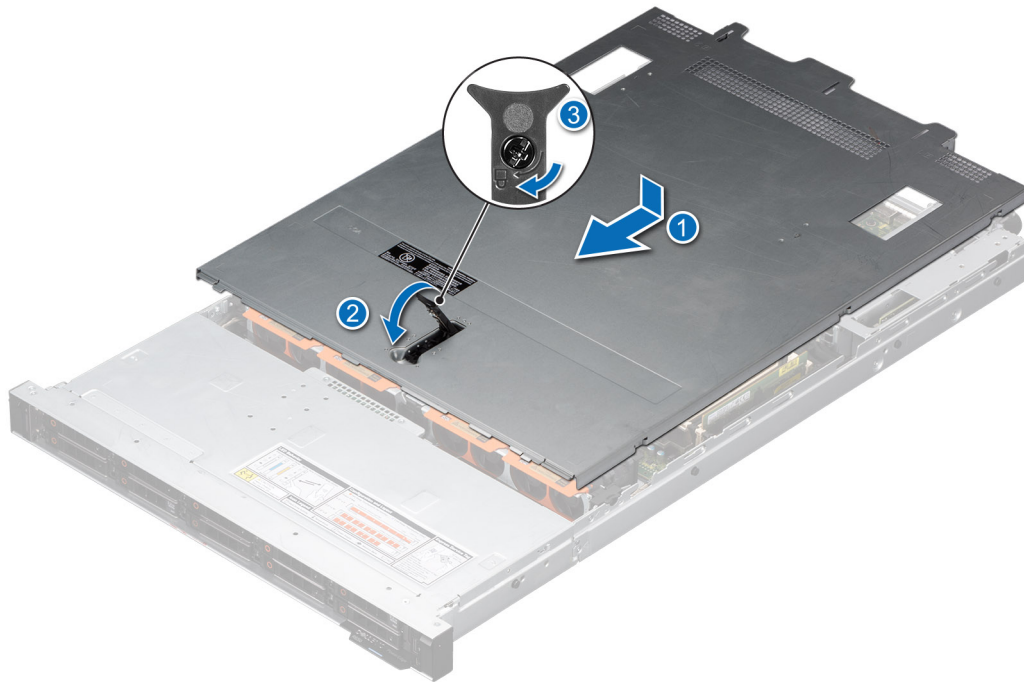


Figure 15. Installing the system cover

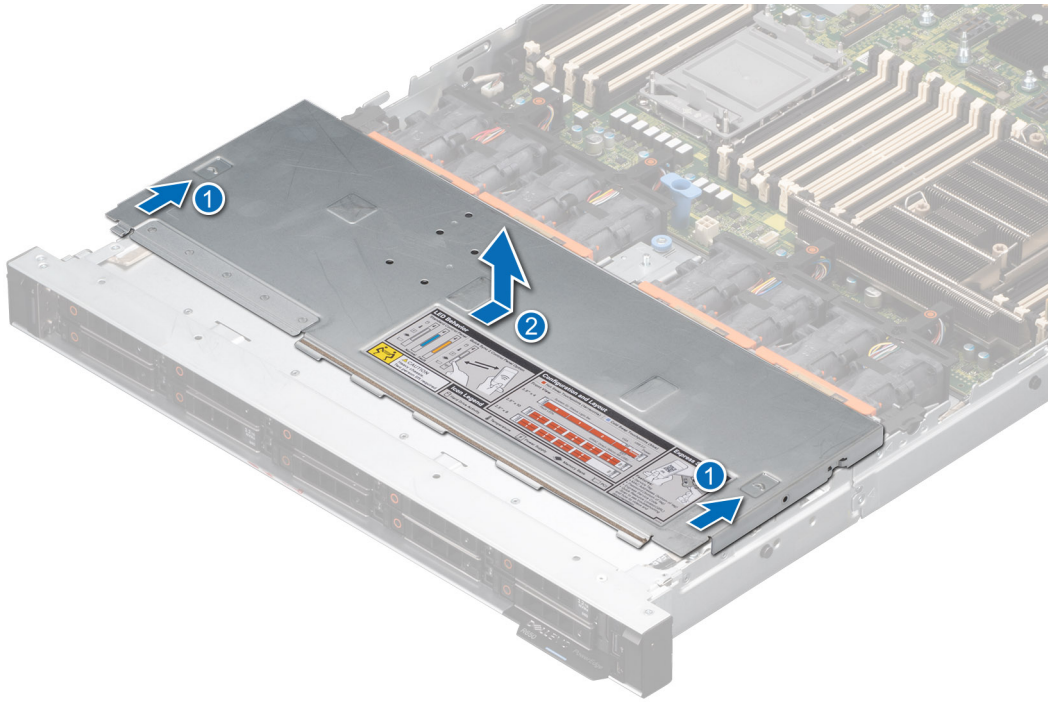


Figure 16. Removing the drive backplane cover

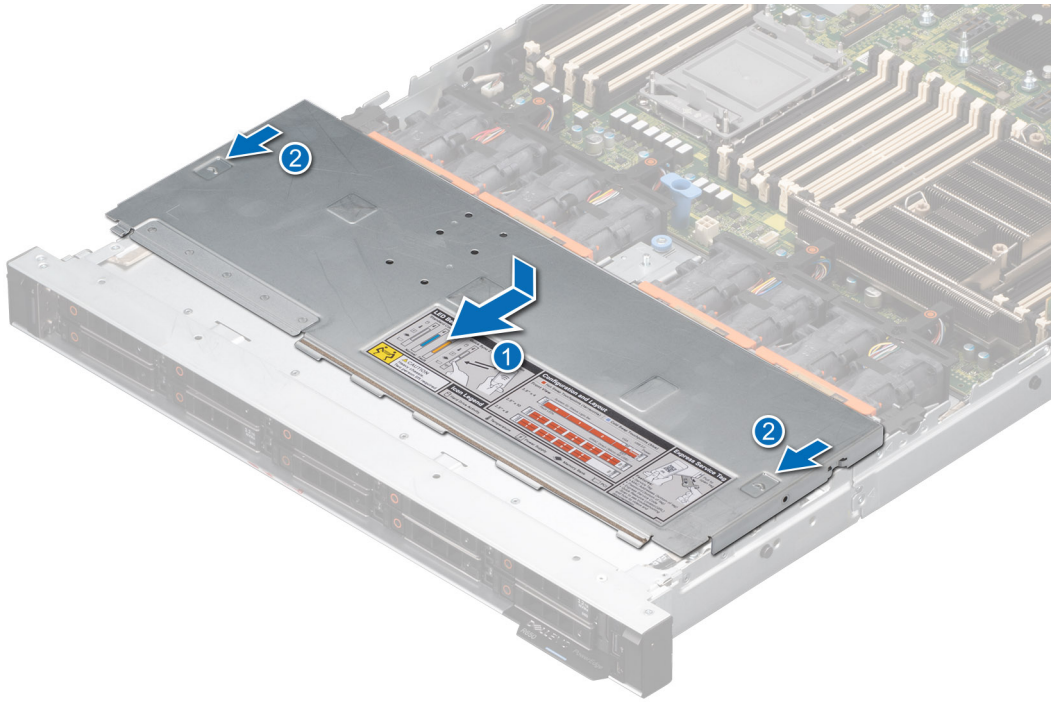


Figure 17. Installing the drive backplane cover

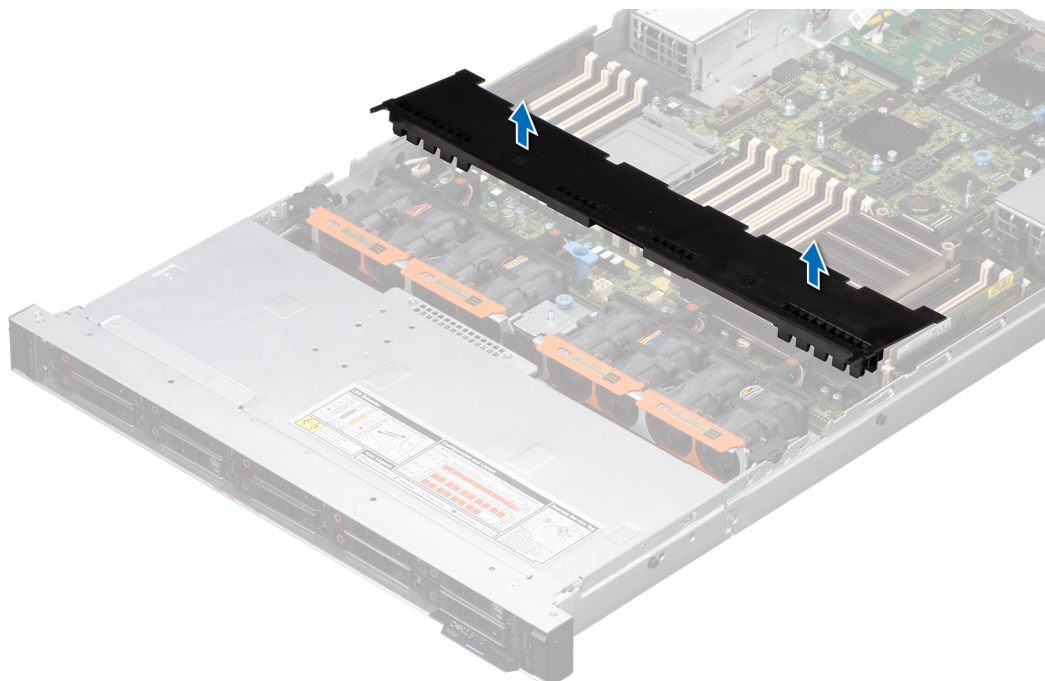


Figure 18. Removing the air shroud

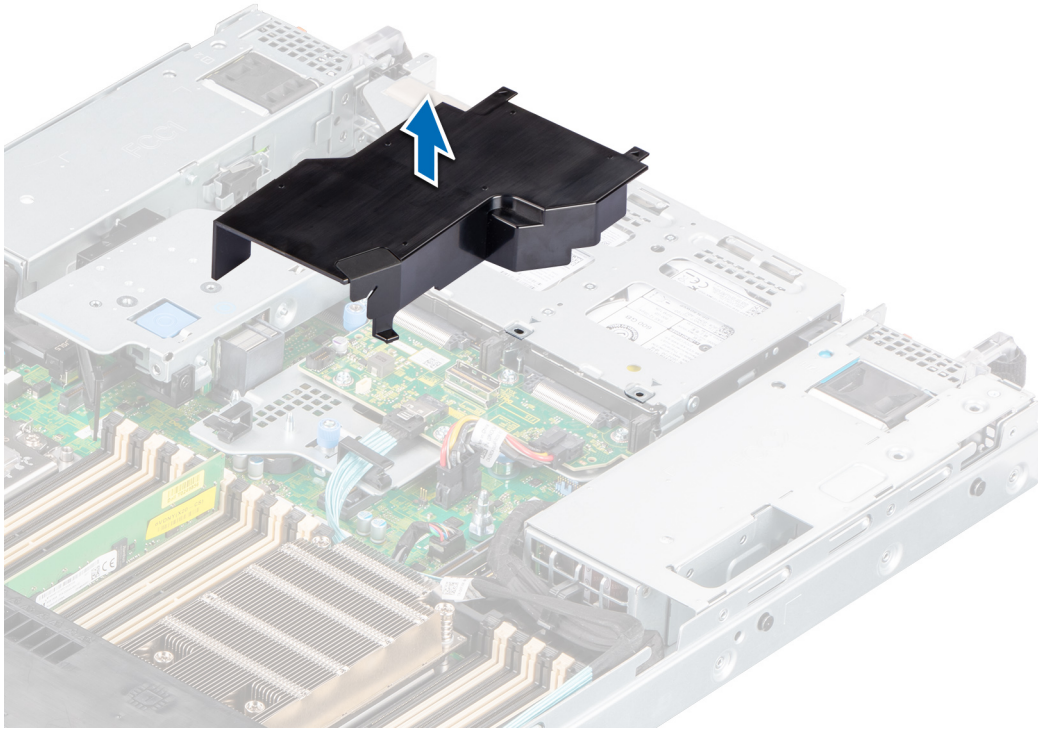


Figure 19. Removing the air shroud from the rear drive module

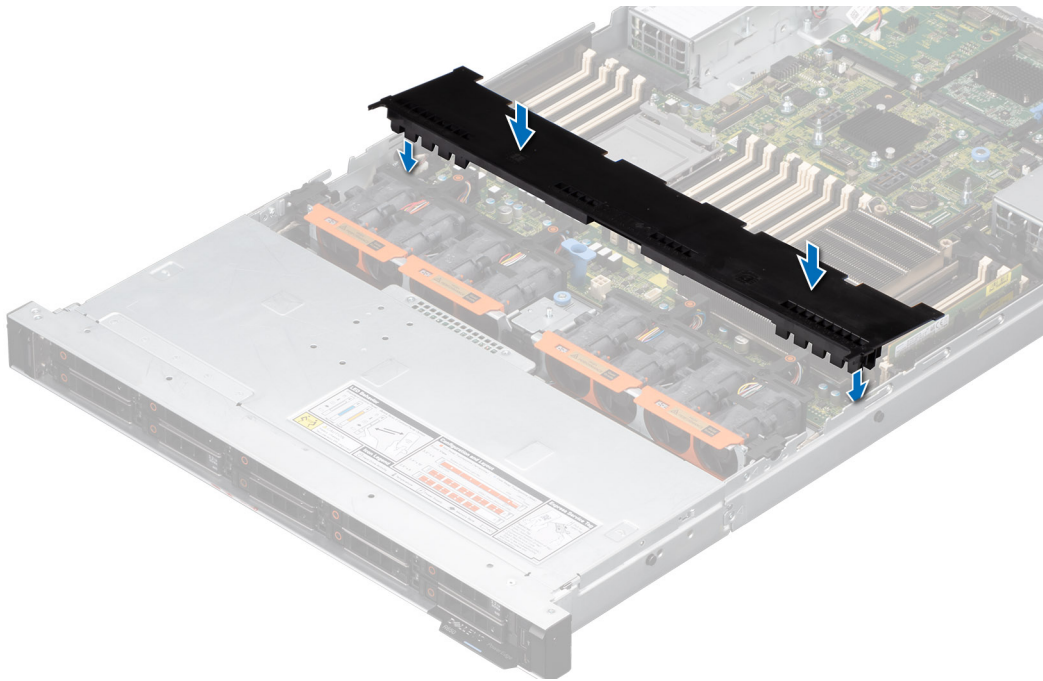


Figure 20. Installing the air shroud

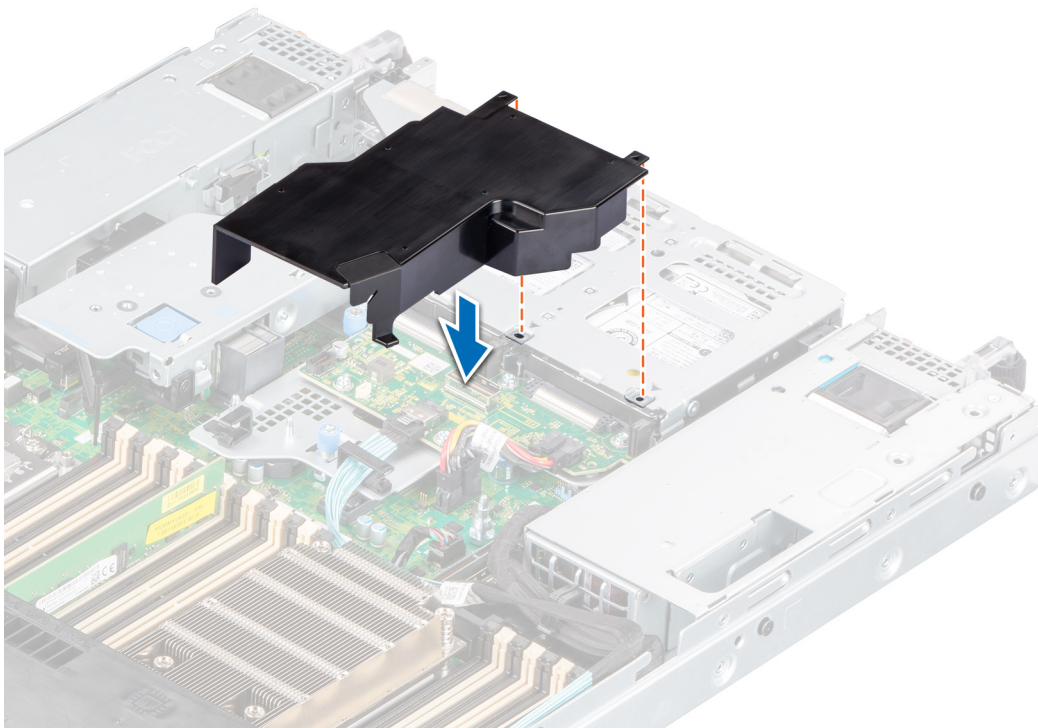


Figure 21. Installing the air shroud on the rear drive module

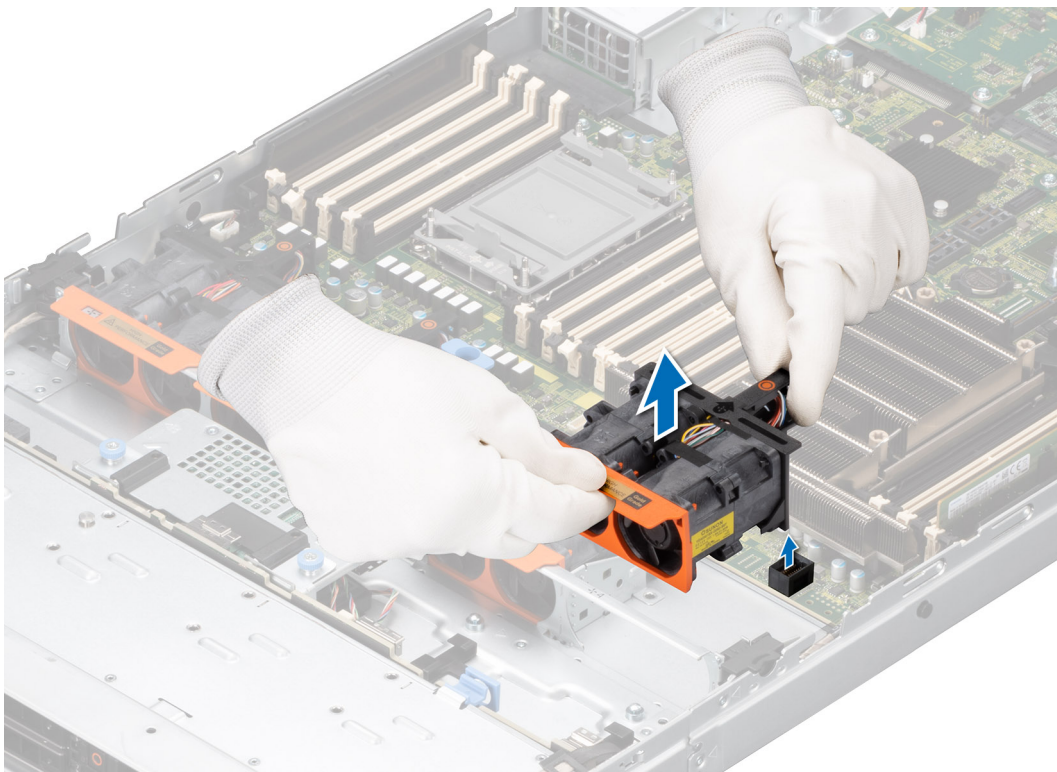


Figure 22. Removing a cooling fan module

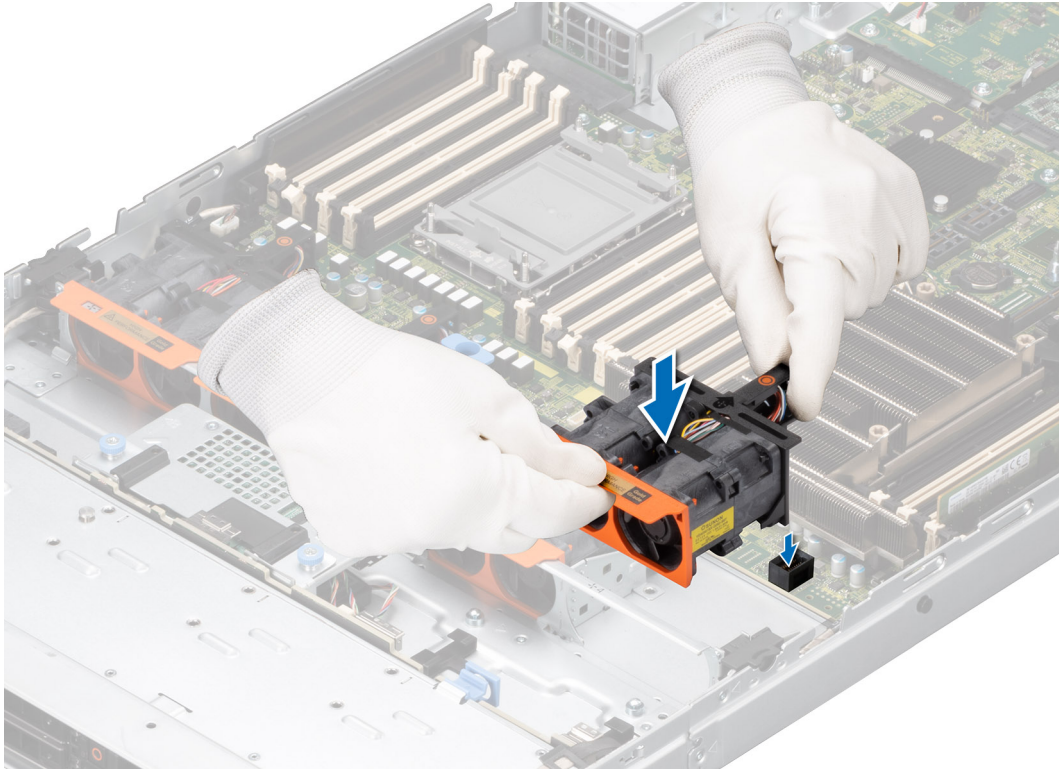


Figure 23. Installing a cooling fan module

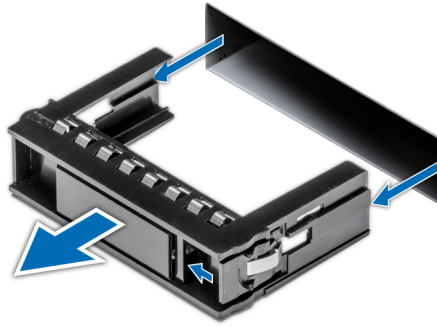


Figure 24. Removing a drive blank

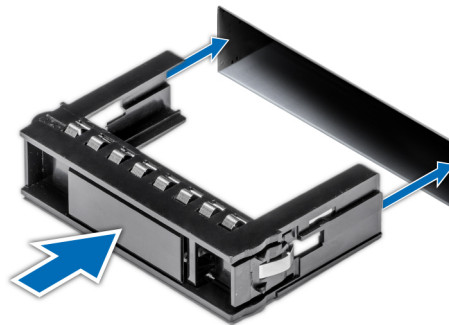


Figure 25. Installing a drive blank

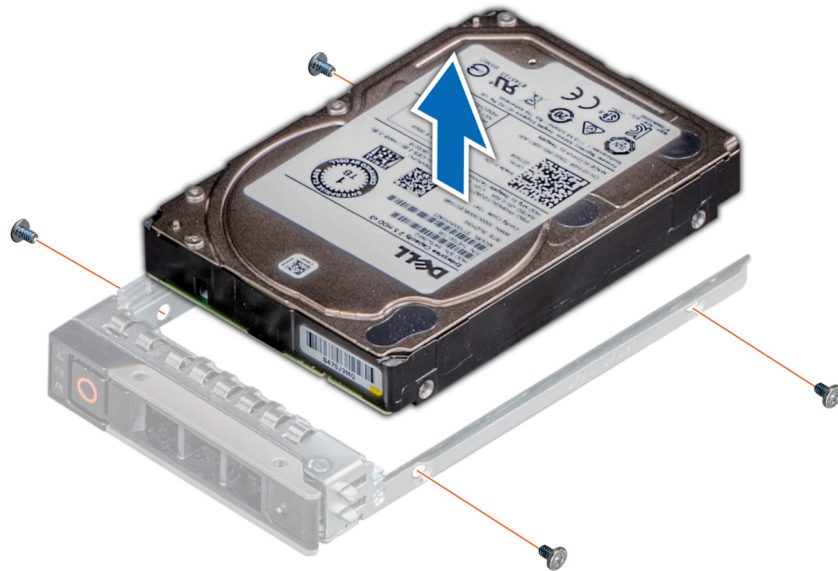


Figure 28. Removing the drive from the drive carrier

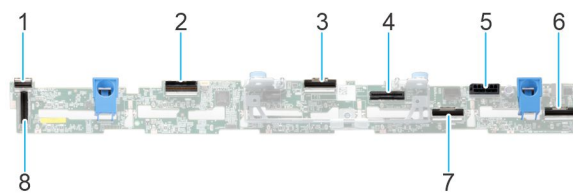


Figure 30. 10 x 2.5-inch drive backplane

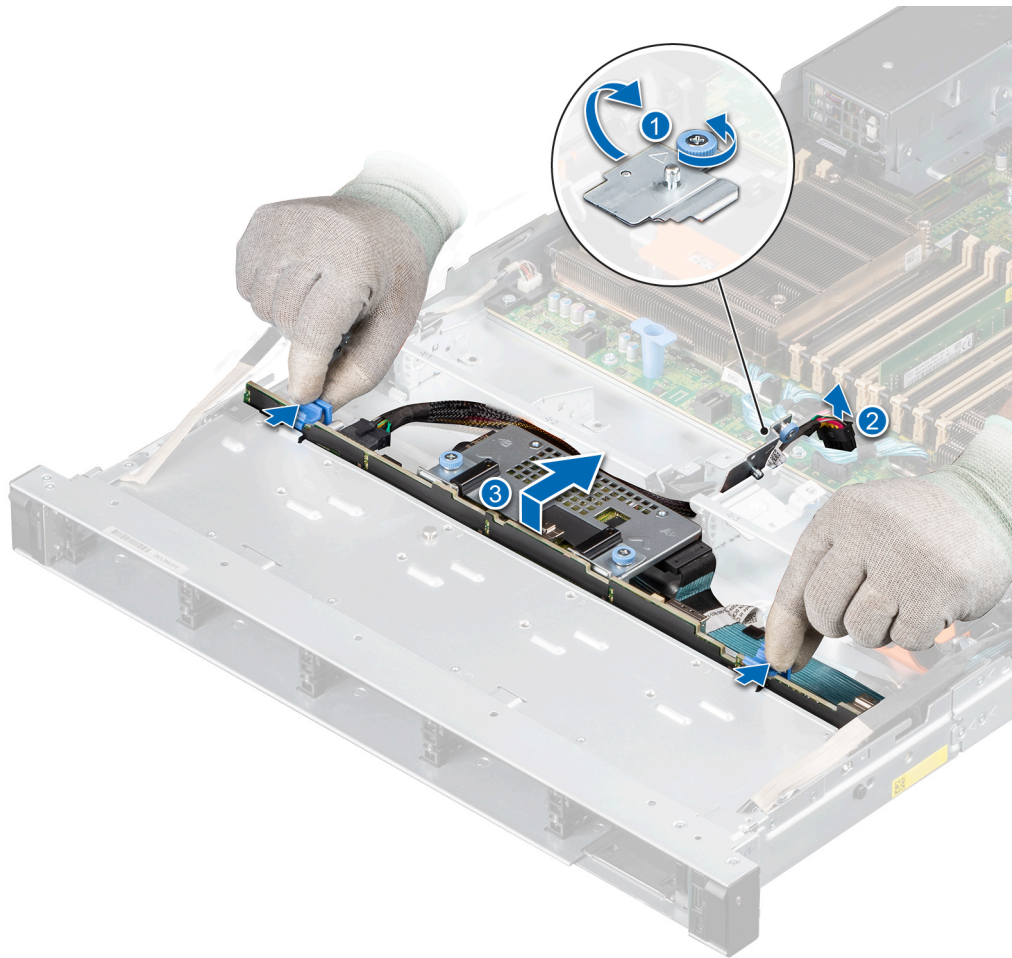


Figure 31. Removing the drive backplane

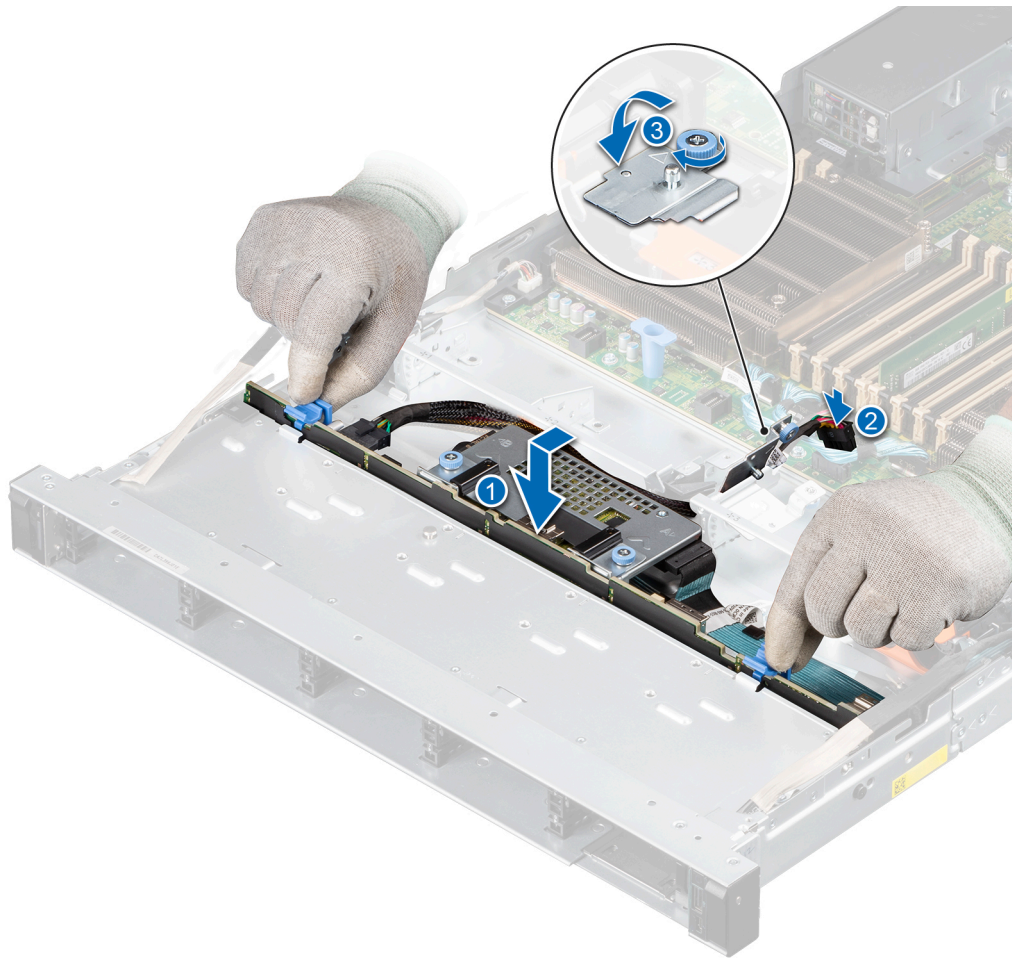


Figure 32. Installing the drive backplane

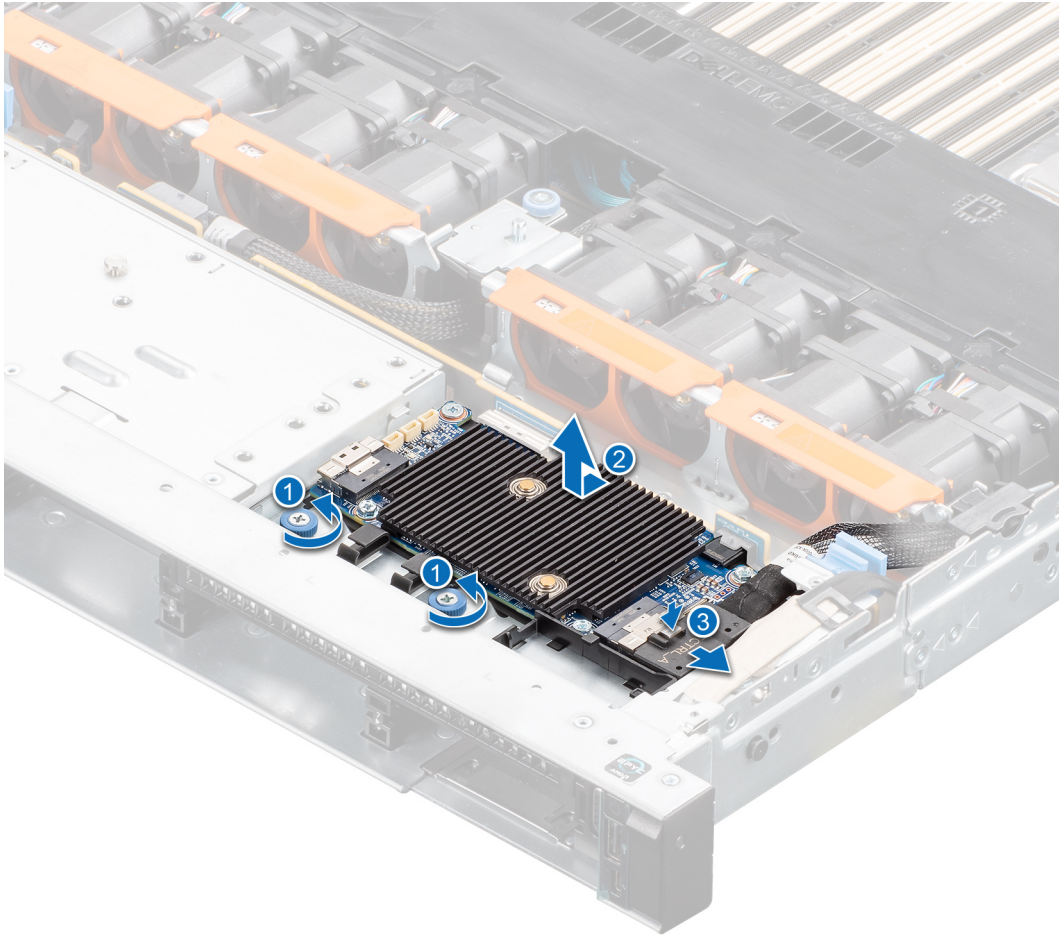


Figure 33. Removing the front mounting front PERC module

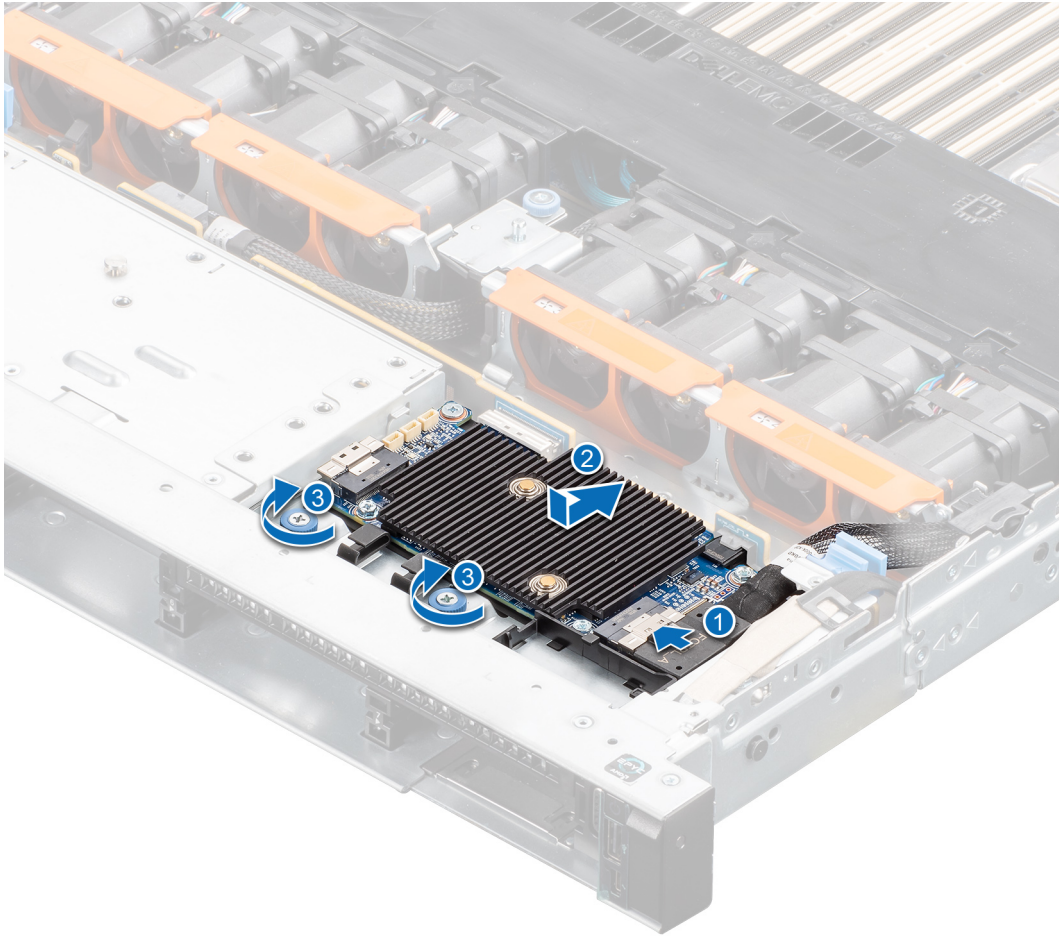


Figure 34. Installing the front mounting front PERC module

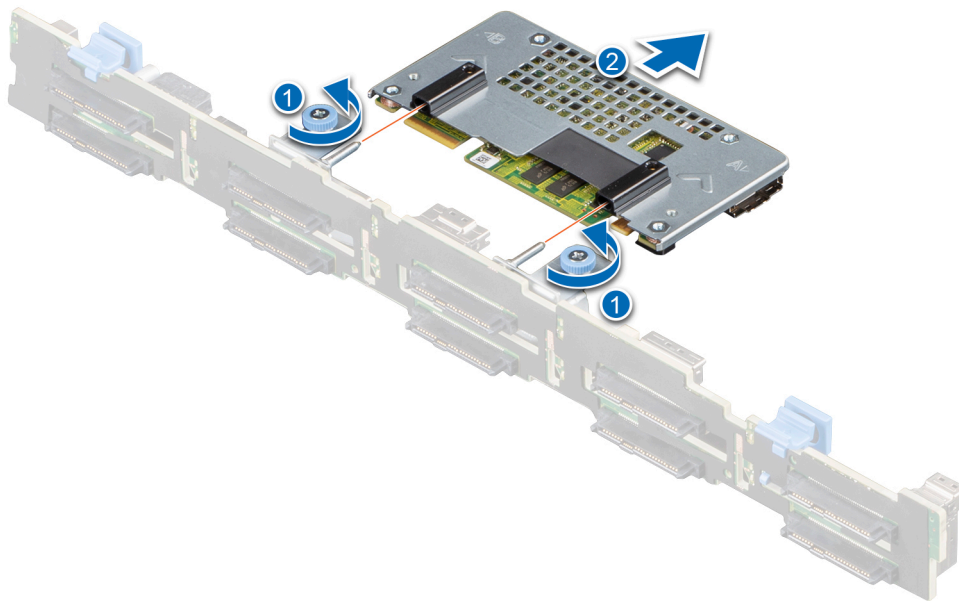


Figure 35. Removing the rear mounting front PERC module

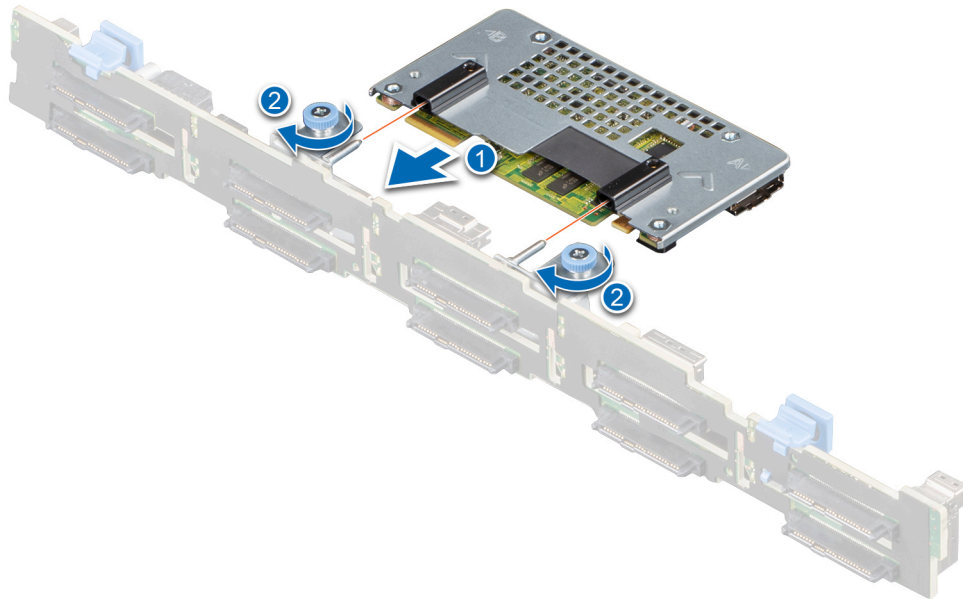


Figure 36. Installing the rear mounting front PERC module

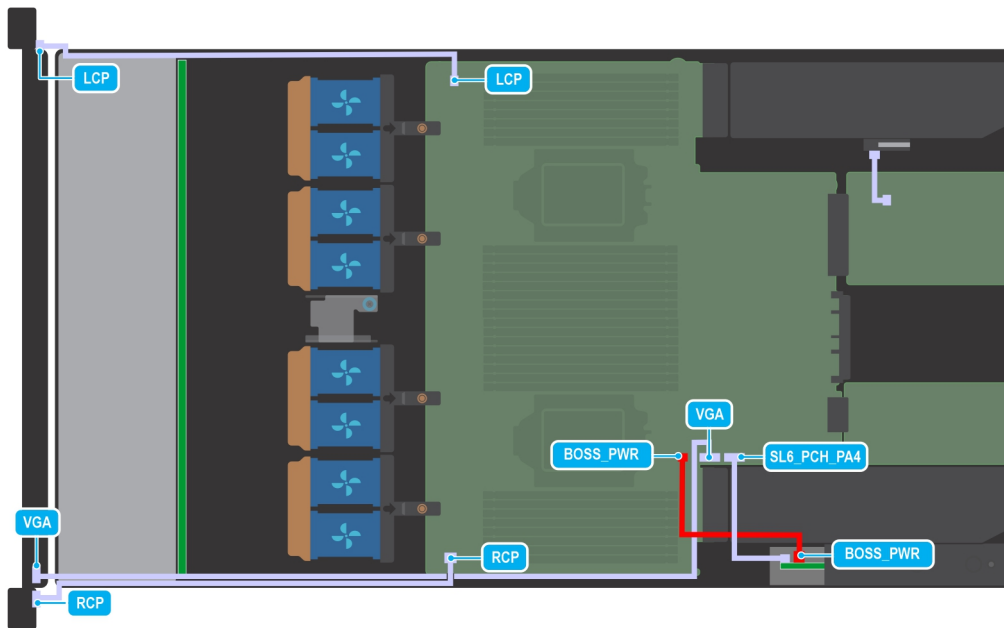


Figure 37. Control panels and intrusion switch

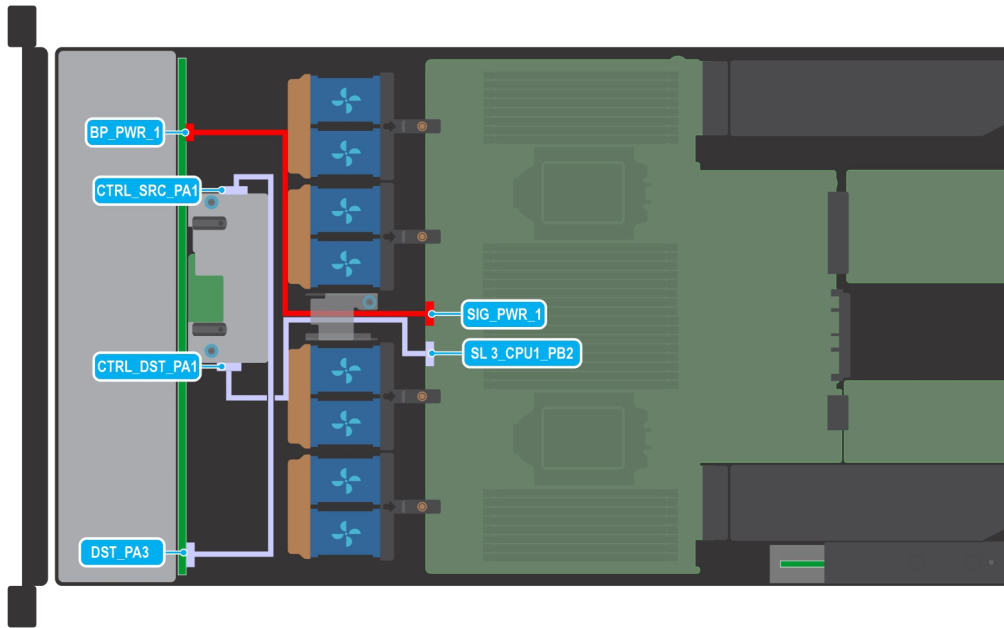


Figure 38. 10 x 2.5-inch SAS with fPERC

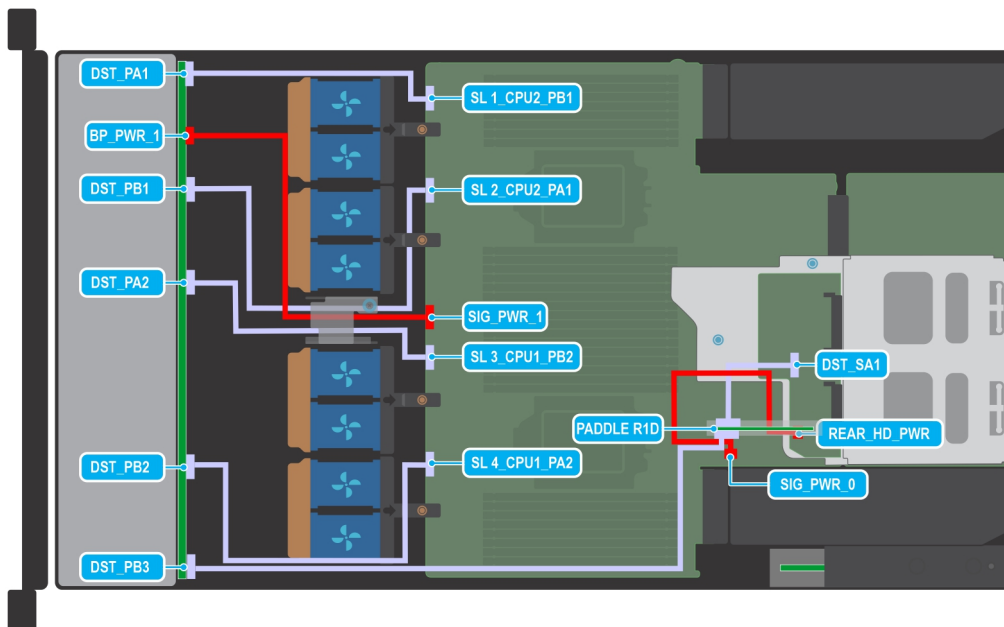


Figure 39. 10 x 2.5-inch NVMe and 2 x 2.5-inch NVMe

Your system memory is organized into eight channels per processor (two memory sockets per channel), 16 memory sockets per processor and 32 memory sockets per system.

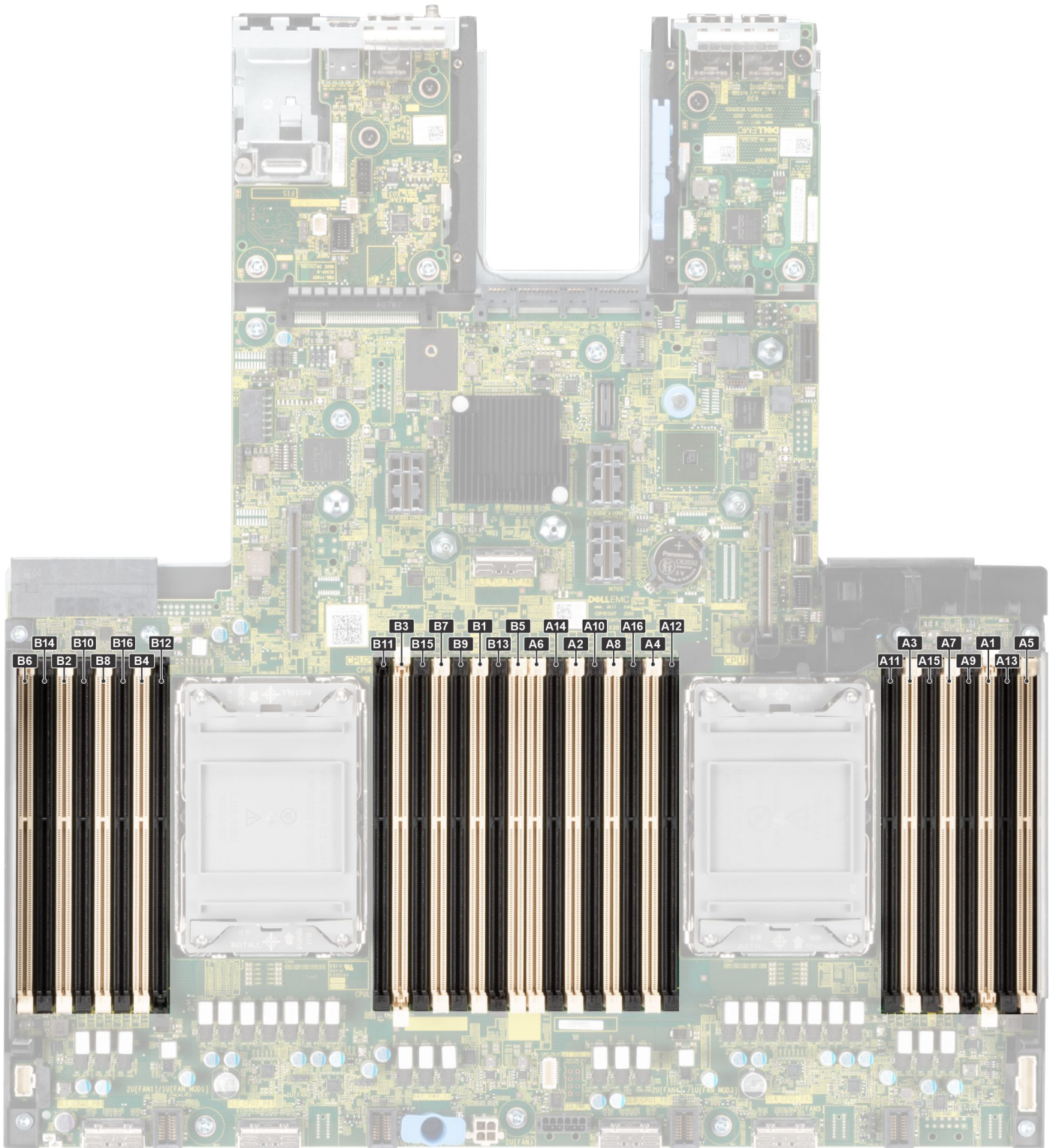


Figure 40. Memory channels

General memory module installation guidelines

To ensure optimal performance of your system, observe the following general guidelines when configuring your system memory. If your system's memory configurations fail to observe these guidelines, your system might not boot, stop responding during memory configuration, or operate with reduced memory.

The memory bus may operate at speeds of 3200 MT/s or 2933 MT/s depending on the following factors:

- System profile selected (for example, Performance Optimized, or Custom [can be run at high speed or lower])
- Maximum supported DIMM speed of the processors
- Maximum supported speed of the DIMMs

i **NOTE:** MT/s indicates DIMM speed in MegaTransfers per second.

i **NOTE:** Fault Resilient Memory-Non Uniform Memory Access is supported.

The system supports Flexible Memory Configuration, enabling the system to be configured and run in any valid chipset architectural configuration. The following are the recommended guidelines for installing memory modules:

- All DIMMs must be DDR4.
- x4 and x8 DRAM based memory modules can be mixed.
- If memory modules with different speeds are installed, they operate at the speed of the slowest installed memory module(s).
- Populate memory module sockets only if a processor is installed.
 - For single-processor systems, sockets A1 to A16 are available.
 - For dual-processor systems, sockets A1 to A16 and sockets B1 to B16 are available.
- In Optimizer Mode, the DRAM controllers operate independently in the 64-bit mode and provide optimized memory performance.

- Mixing of DDR4 DIMM types (RDIMM, LRDIMM, and 3DS LRDIMM), within channels, for Integrated Memory Controller (iMC), or across sockets are not supported.
- Mixing of Intel Persistent Memory 200 series (BPS) operating modes (App Direct Mode, Memory Mode) is not supported.
- If only one DIMM is populated on a channel, then the DIMM should always be populated in the first slot in that channel (white slot).
- If a Intel Persistent Memory 200 series (BPS) and a DDR4 DIMM are populated on the same channel, always plug Intel Persistent Memory 200 series (BPS) on second slot (black slot).

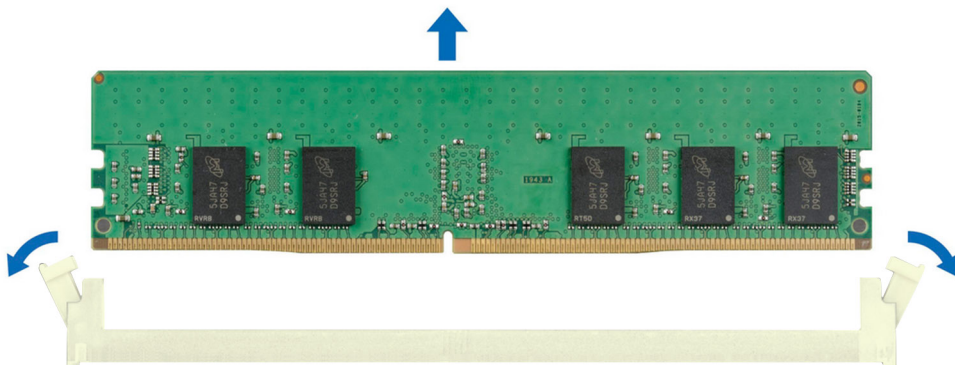


Figure 41. Removing a memory module

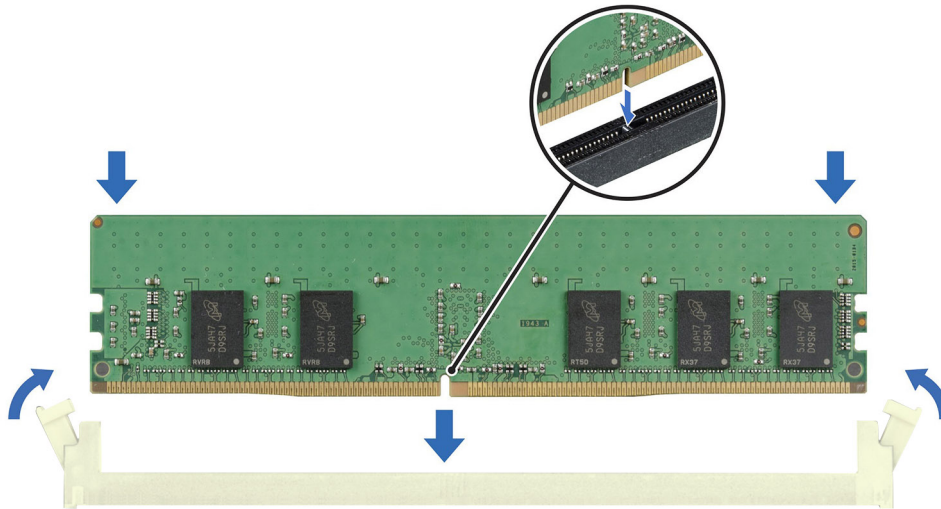


Figure 42. Installing a memory module

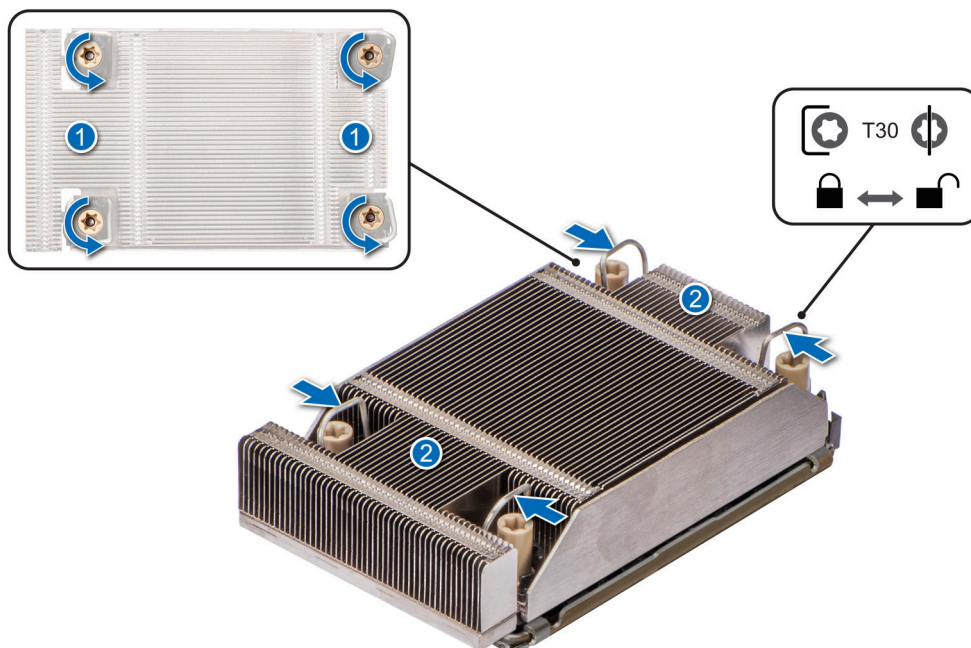


Figure 43. Loosening the screws and set the anti-tilt wires to the unlocked position

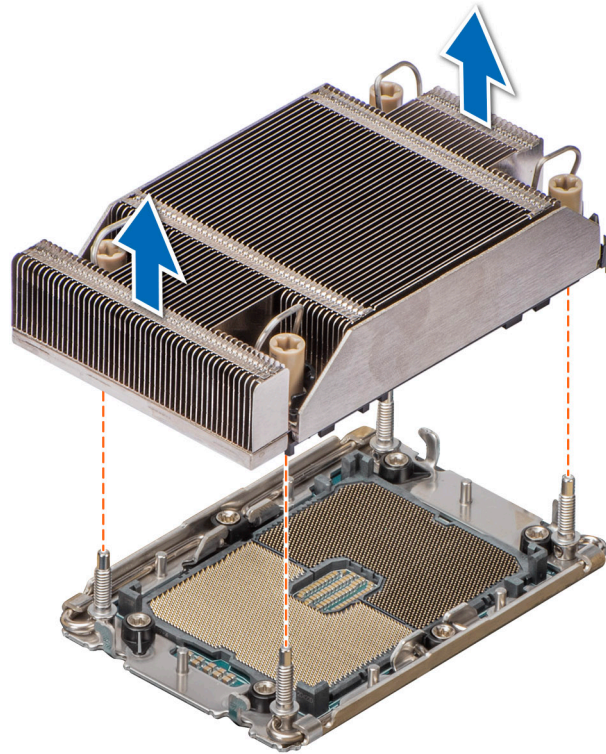


Figure 44. Removing a processor and heat sink module

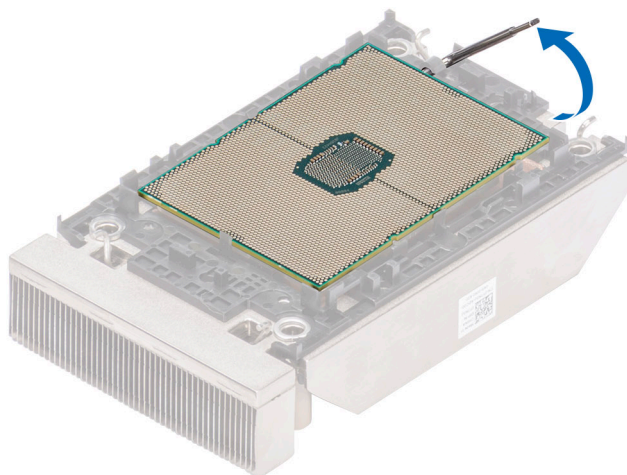


Figure 45. Lift up the TIM break lever

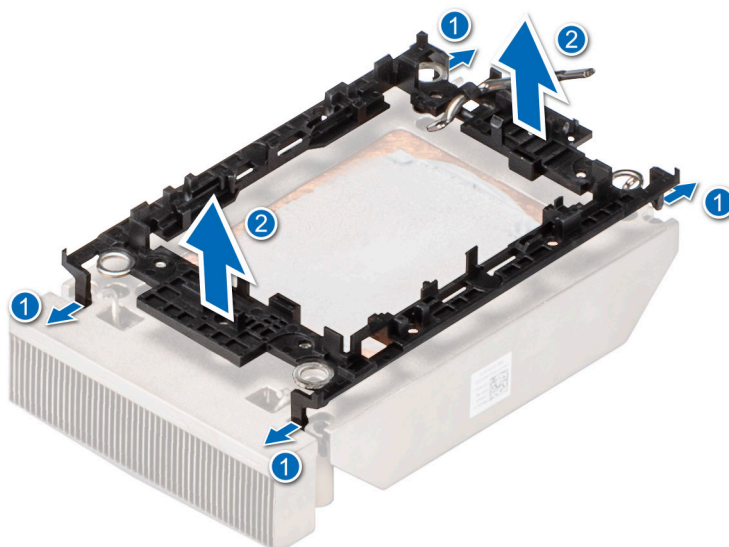


Figure 46. Removing the processor carrier

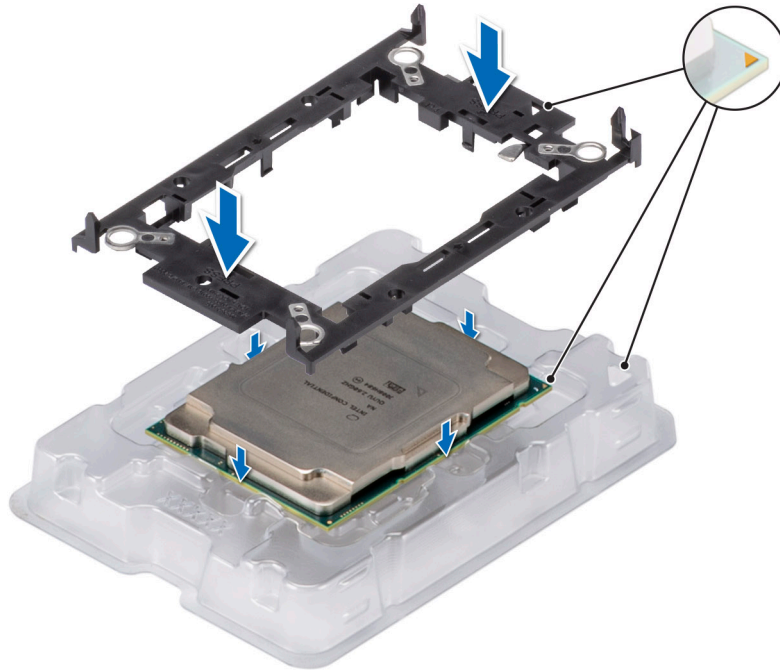


Figure 47. Installing the processor carrier

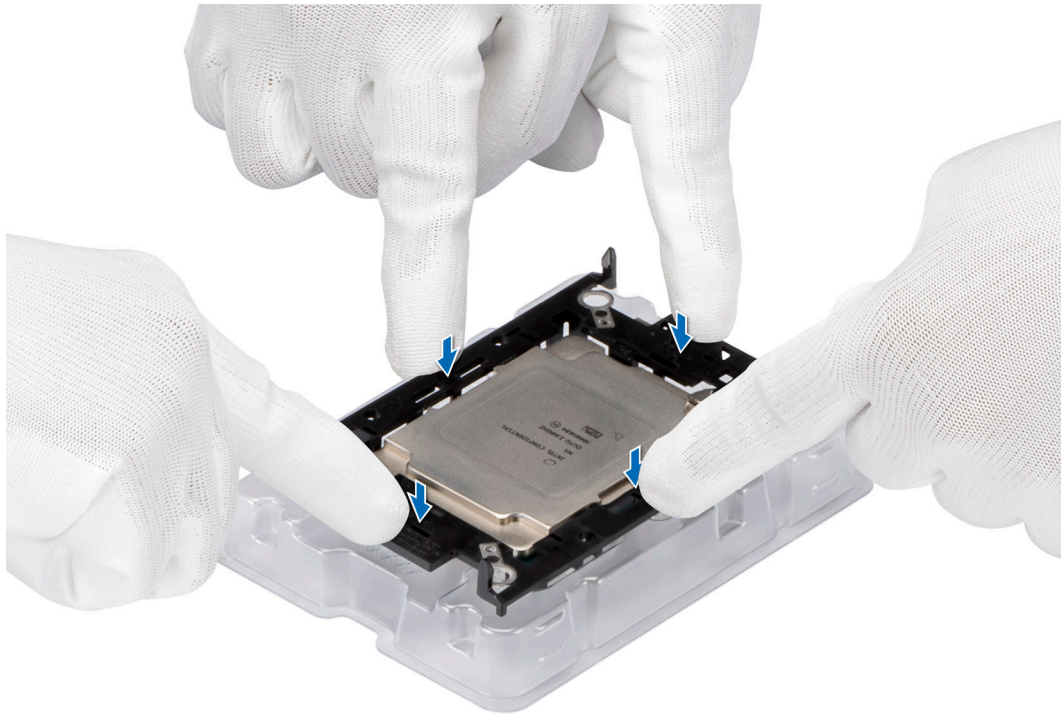


Figure 48. Press the carrier on the four sides

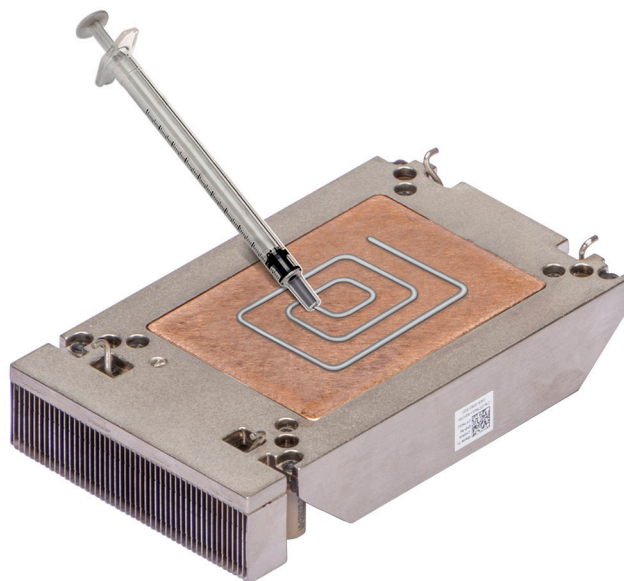


Figure 49. Applying thermal grease

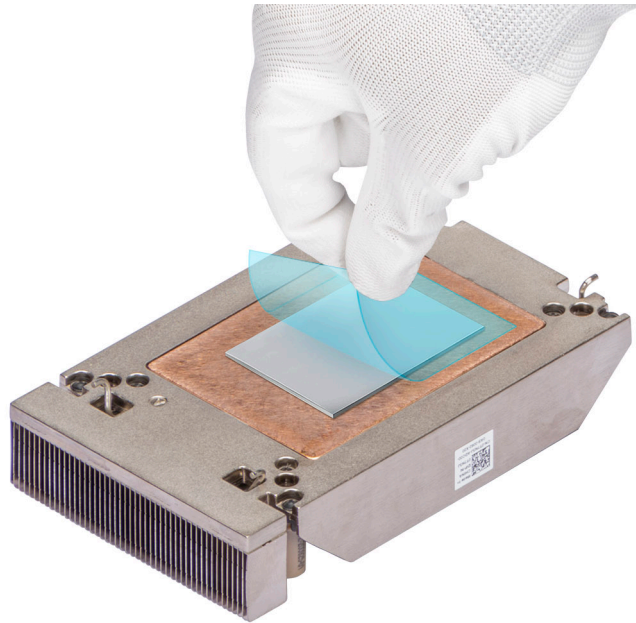


Figure 50. Remove the Thermal Interface Material (TIM) protective film

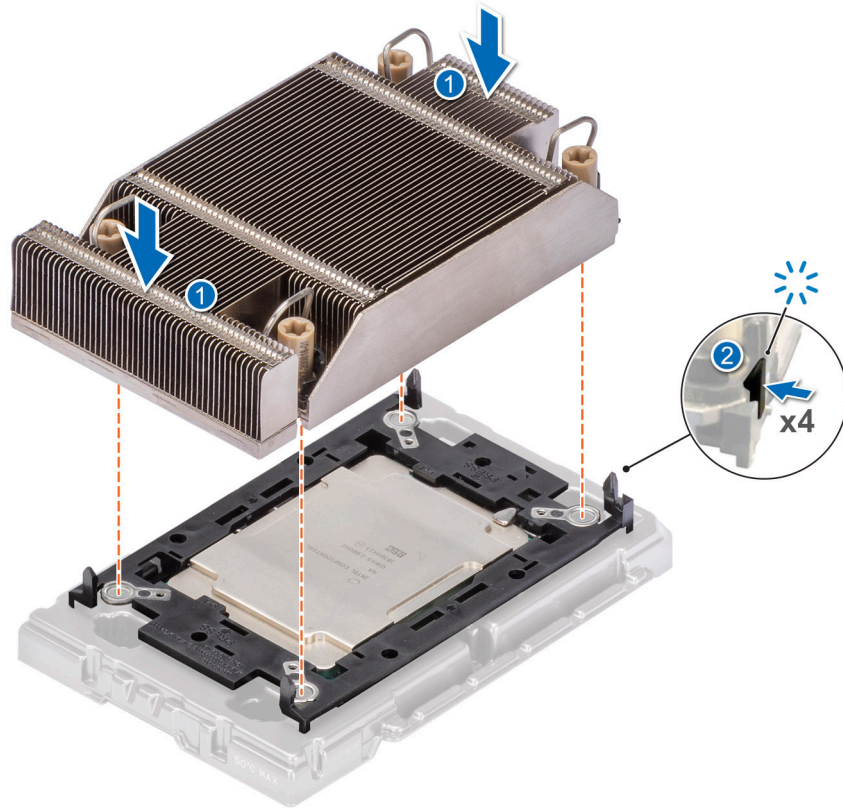


Figure 51. Installing the heat sink onto the processor

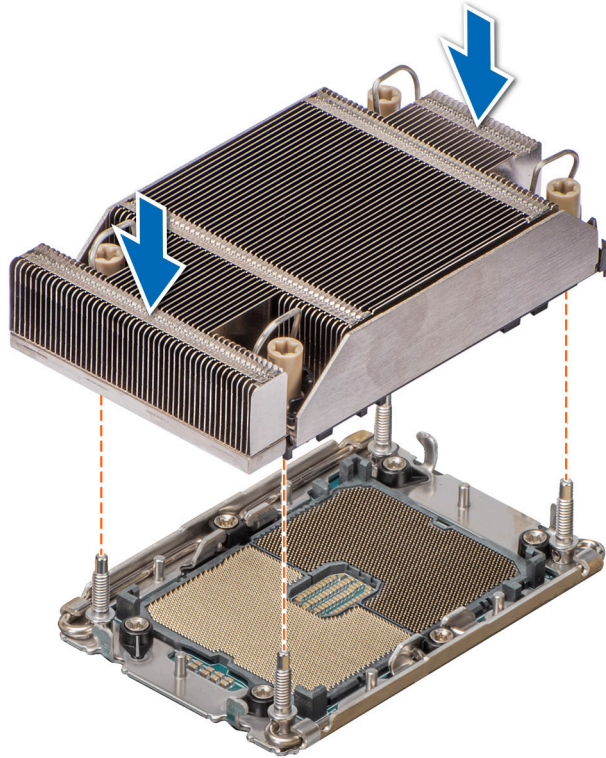


Figure 52. Installing the processor and heat sink (PHM)

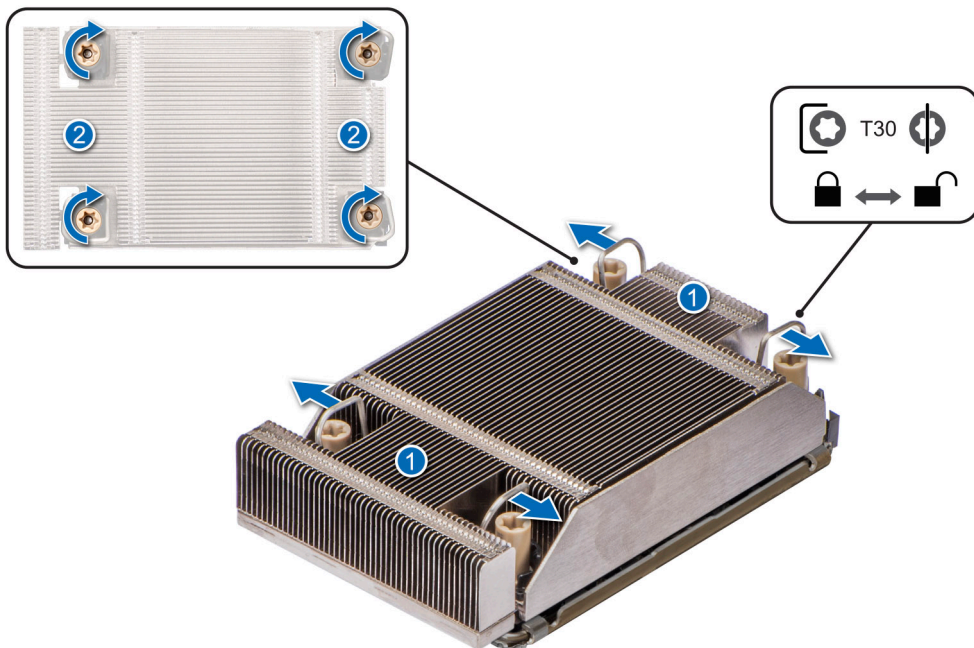


Figure 53. Set the anti-tilt wires to the locked position and tightening the screws

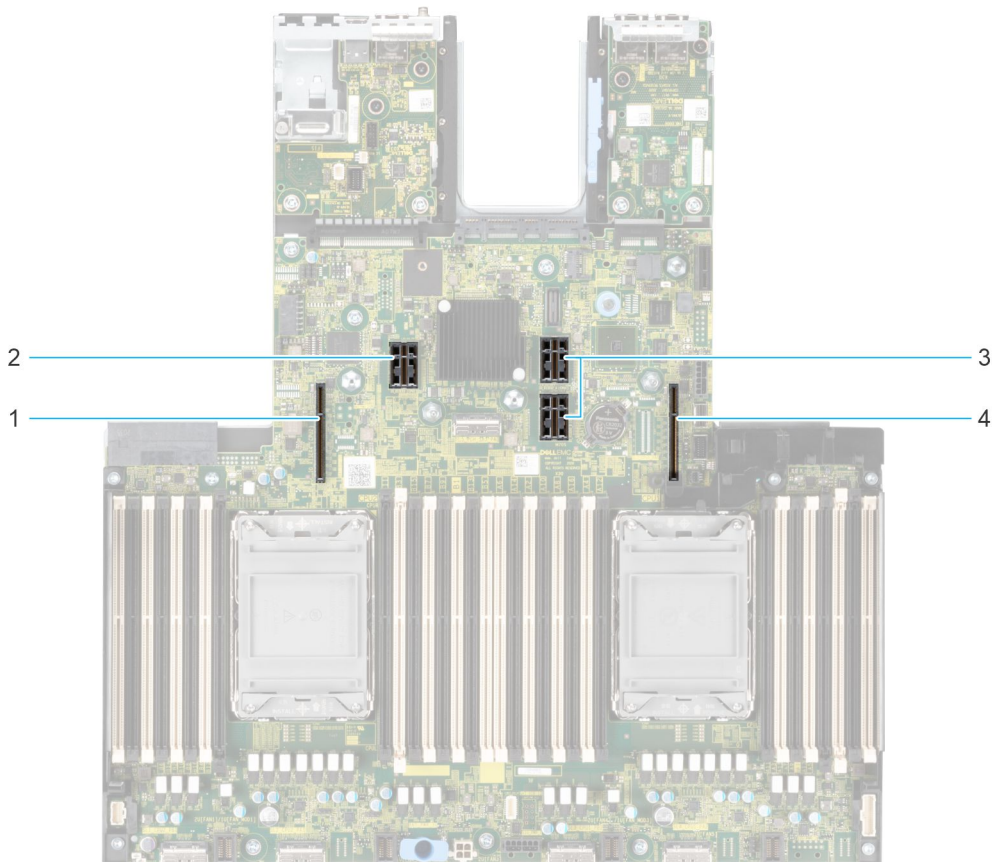


Figure 54. Expansion card slot connectors

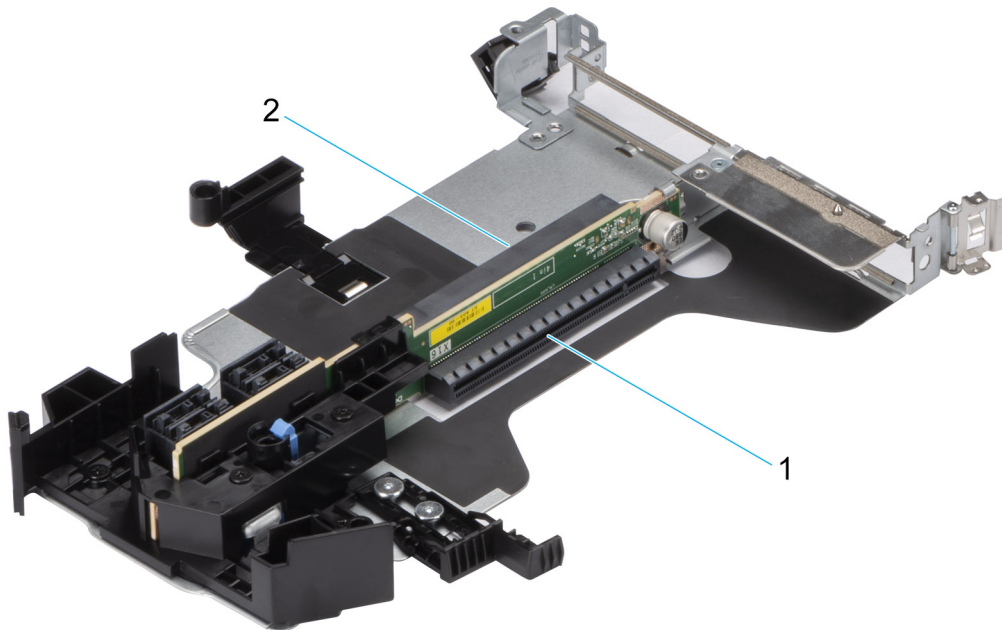


Figure 55. Riser 2 - Low profile

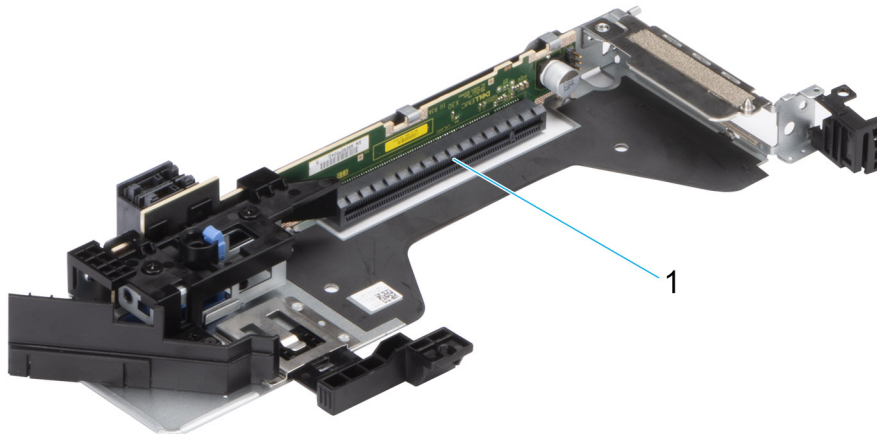


Figure 56. Riser 3 - Low profile

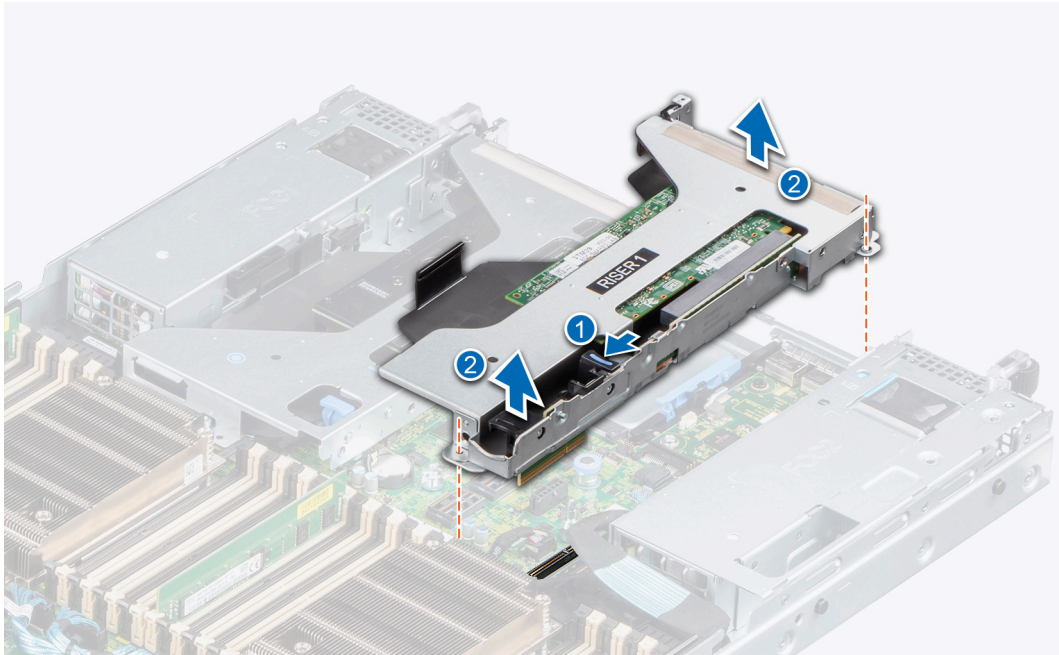


Figure 57. Removing the expansion card riser (Riser 1)

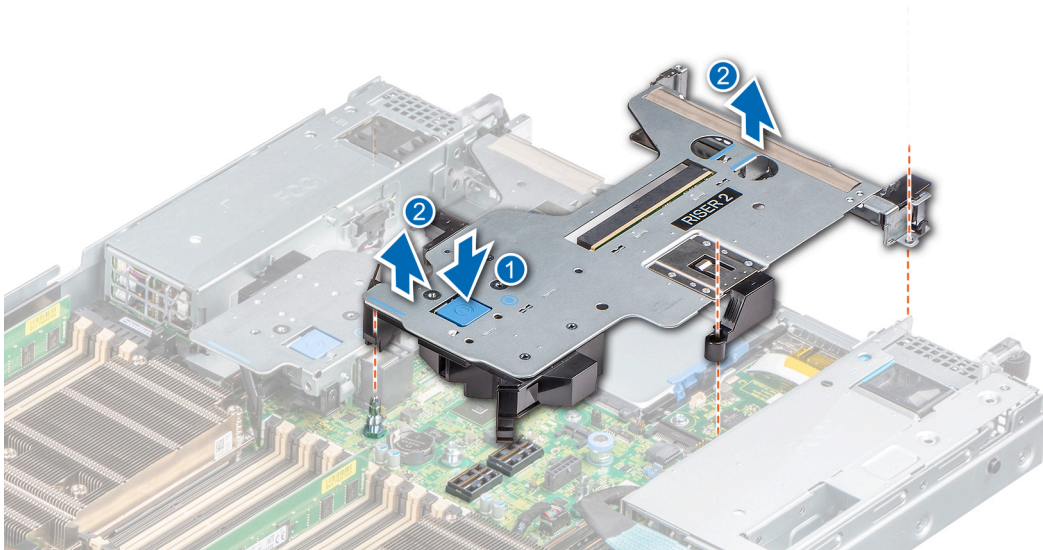


Figure 58. Removing the expansion card riser (Riser 2)

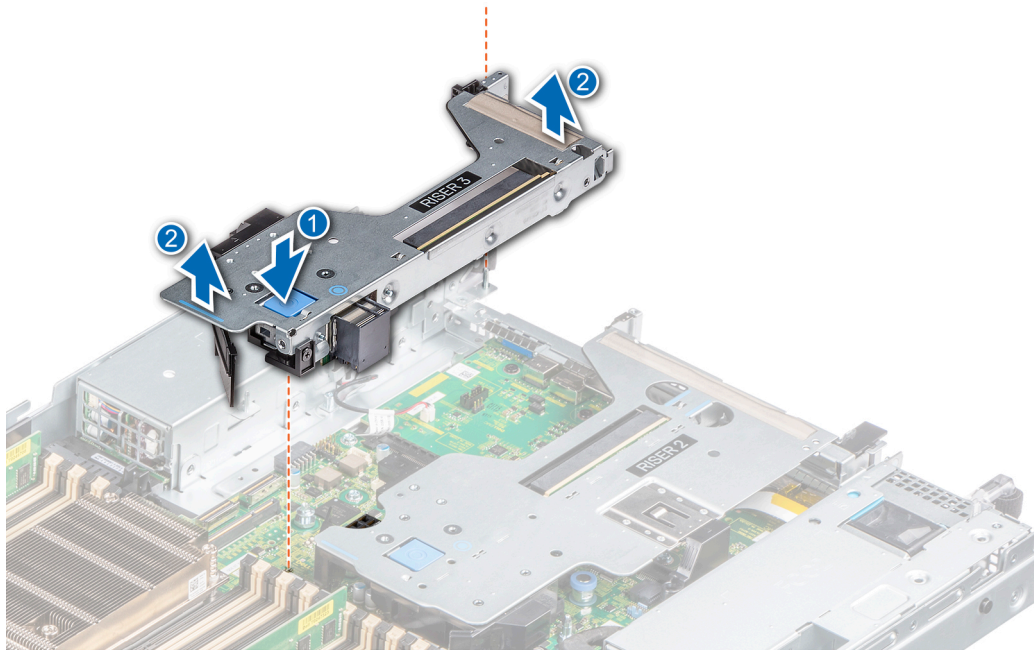


Figure 59. Removing the expansion card riser (Riser 3)

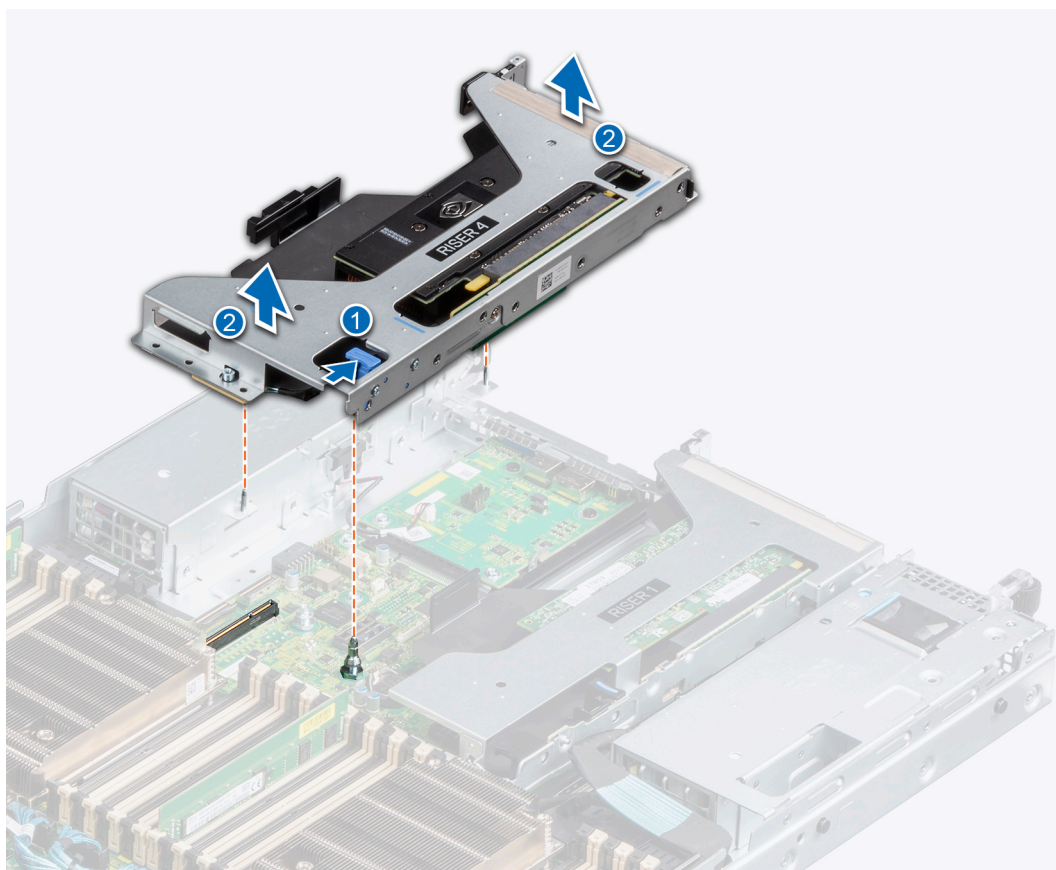


Figure 60. Removing the expansion card riser (Riser 4)

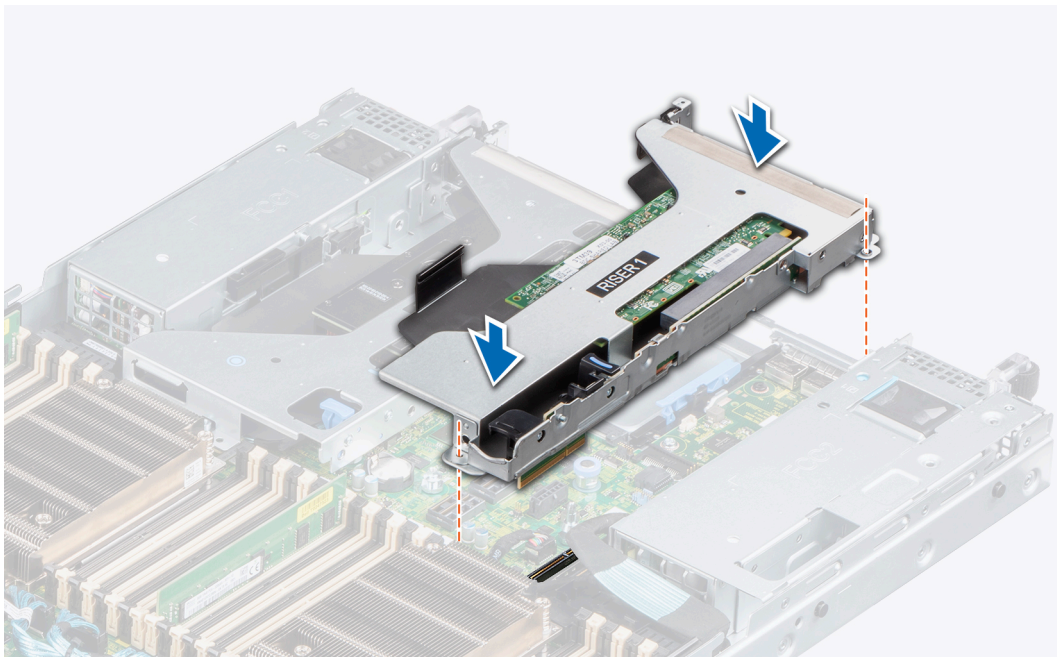


Figure 61. Installing the expansion card riser (Riser 1)

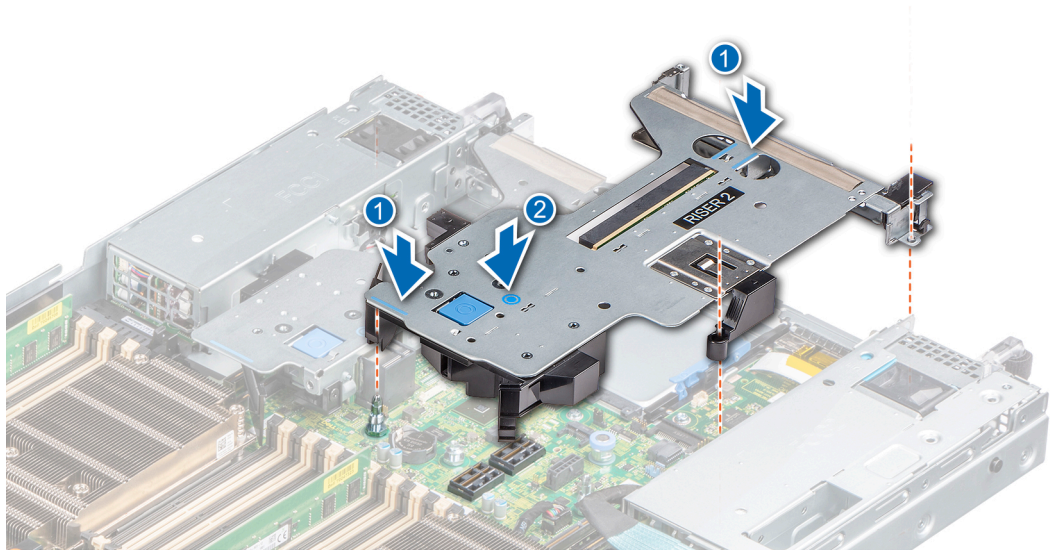


Figure 62. Installing the expansion card riser (Riser 2)

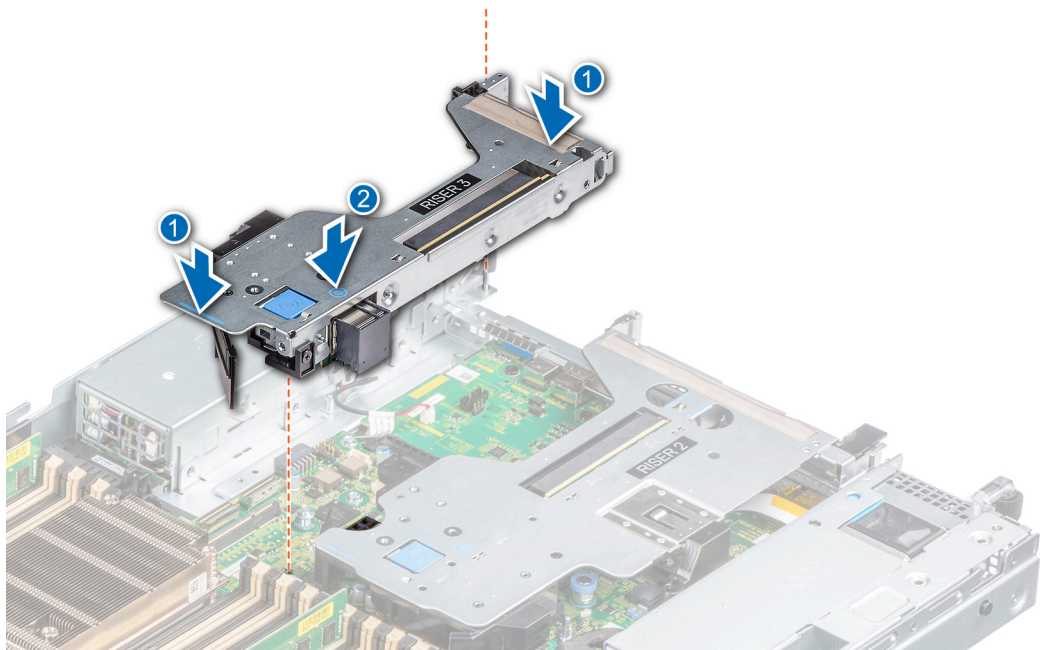


Figure 63. Installing the expansion card riser (Riser 3)

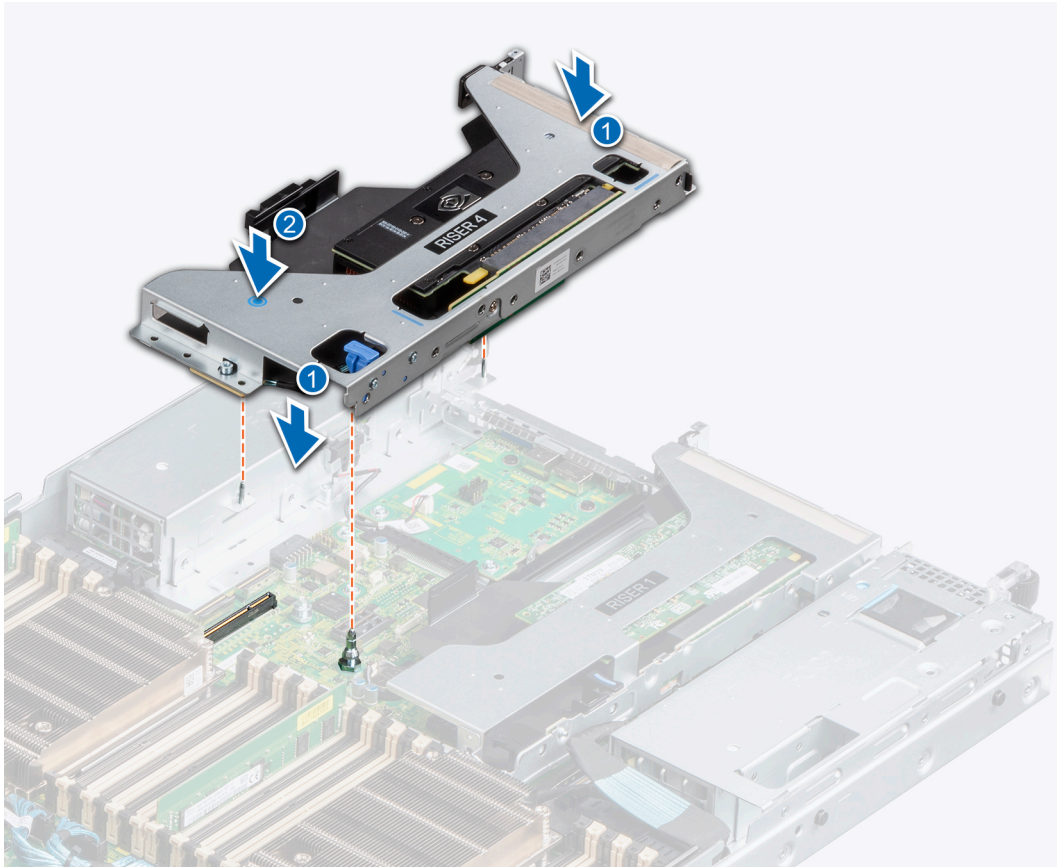


Figure 64. Installing the expansion card riser (Riser 4)

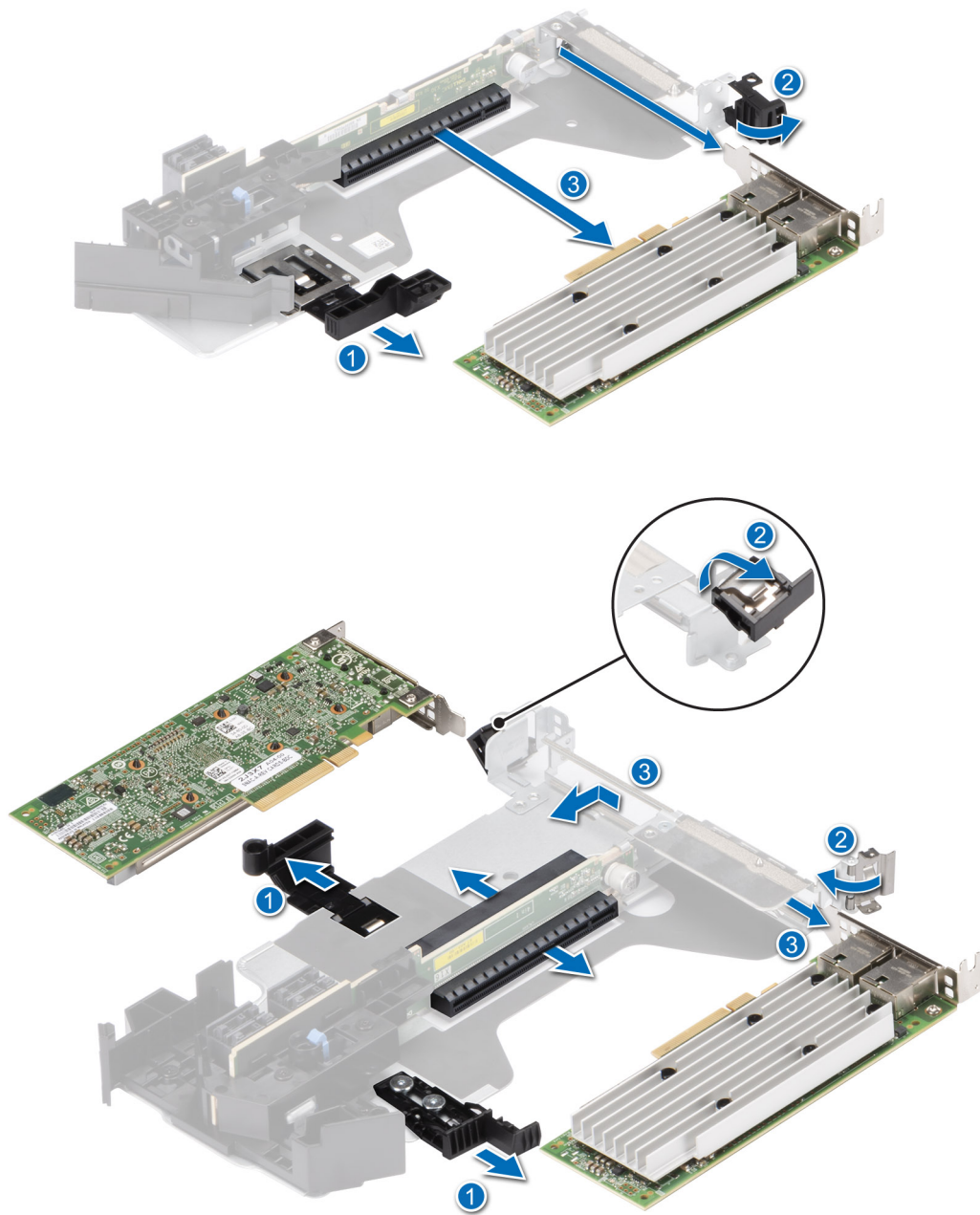


Figure 65. Removing expansion card from the expansion card riser

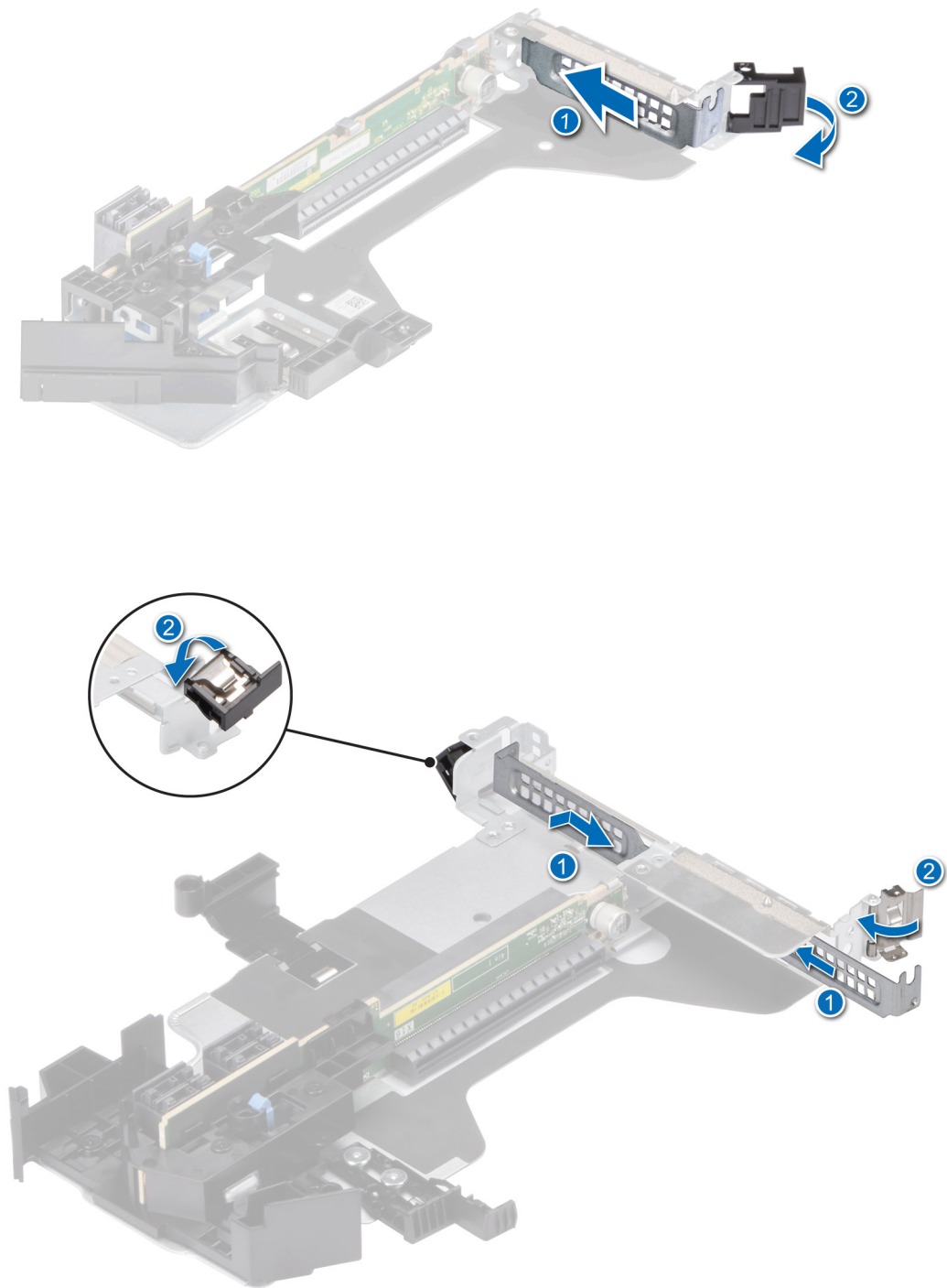


Figure 66. Installing the filler bracket

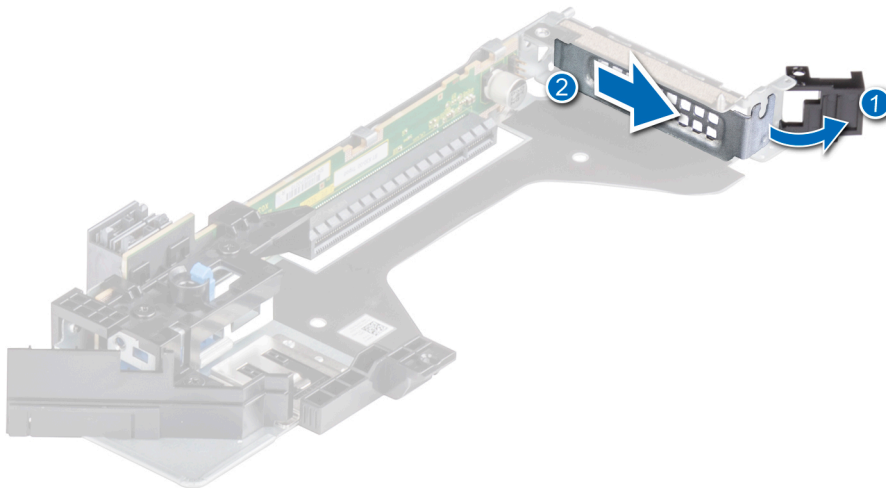

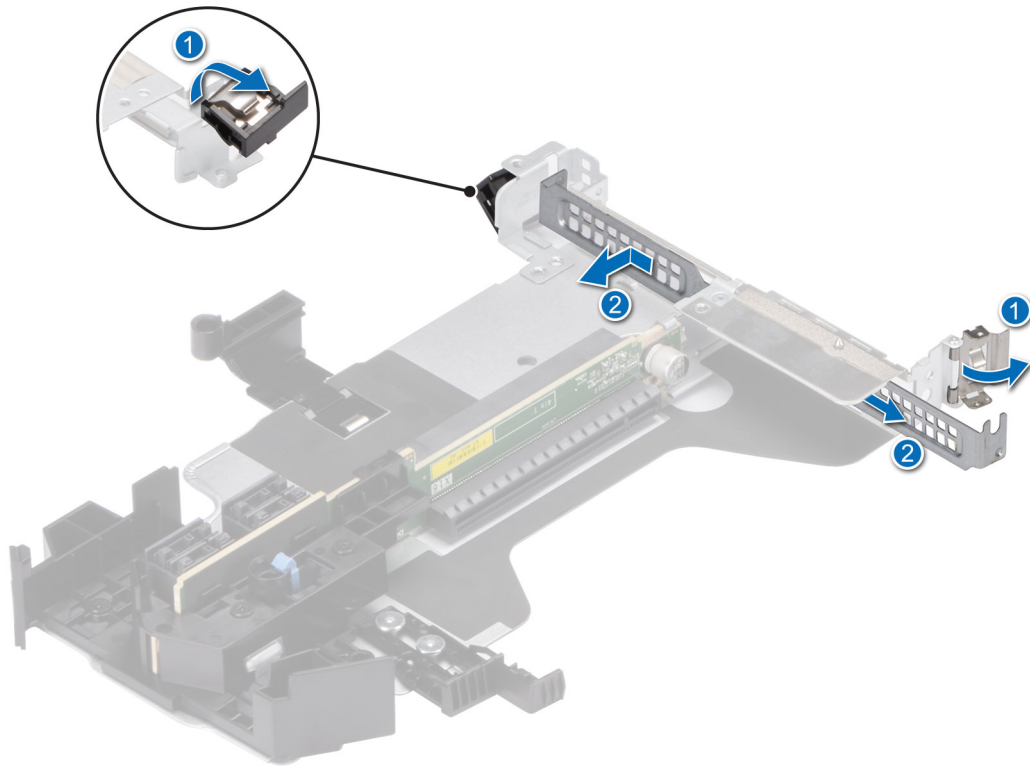
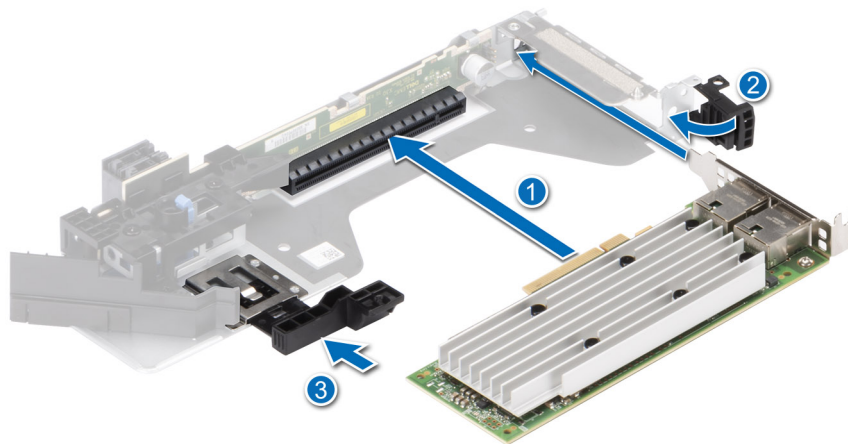


Figure 67. Removing the filler bracket

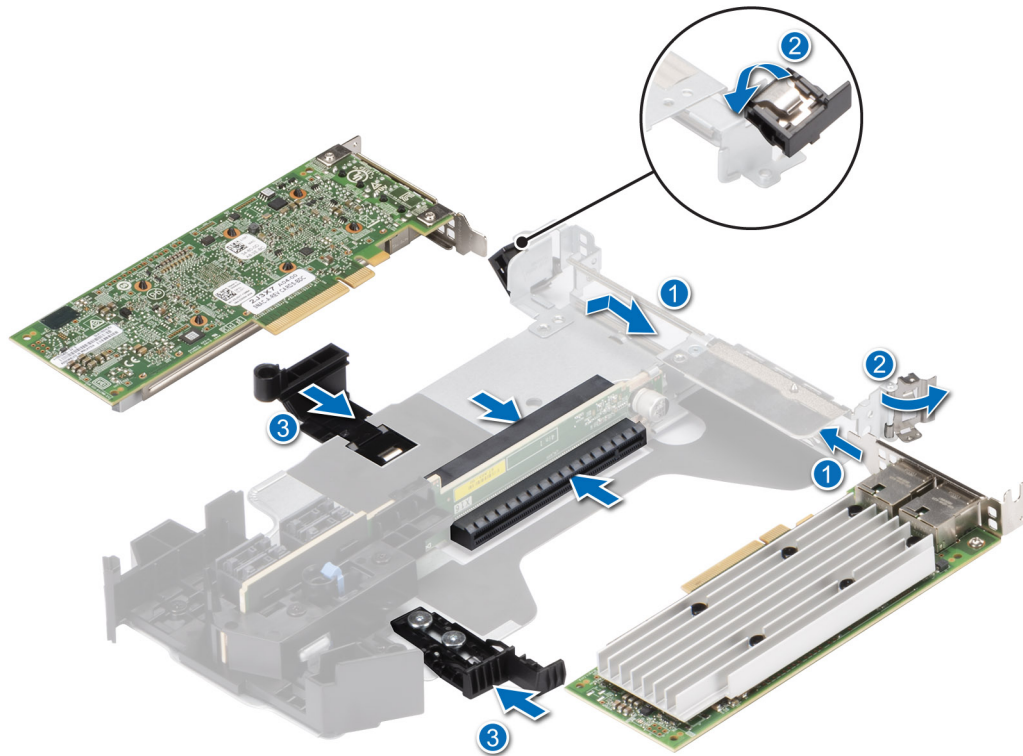


Figure 68. Installing expansion card into the expansion card riser

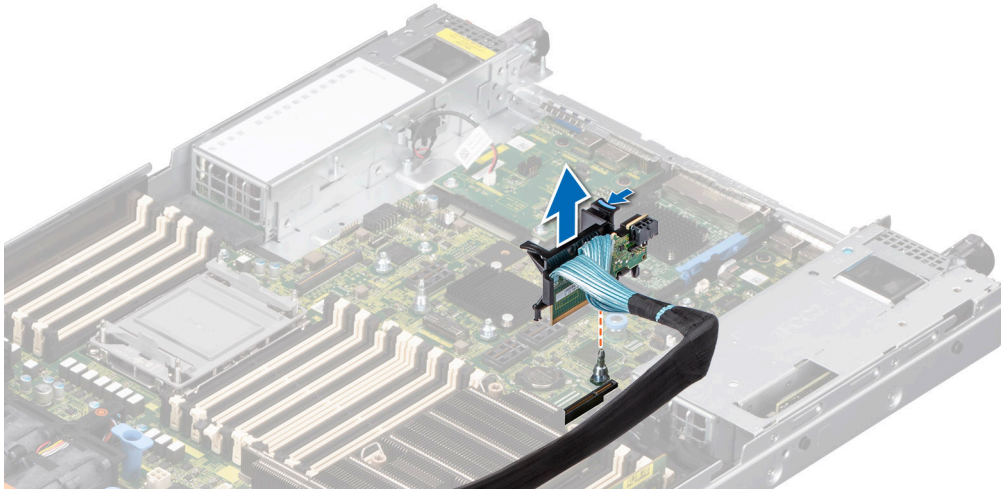


Figure 69. Removing the R1 paddle card

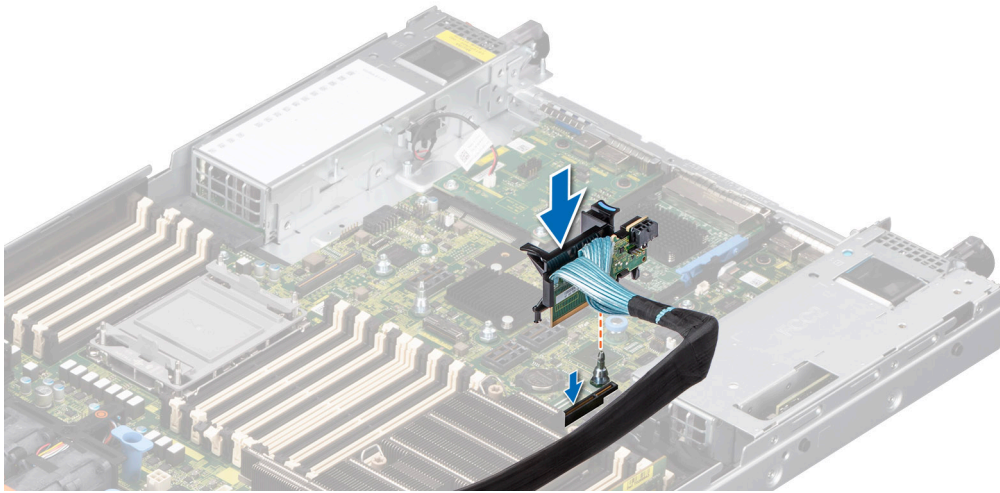


Figure 70. Installing the R1 paddle card

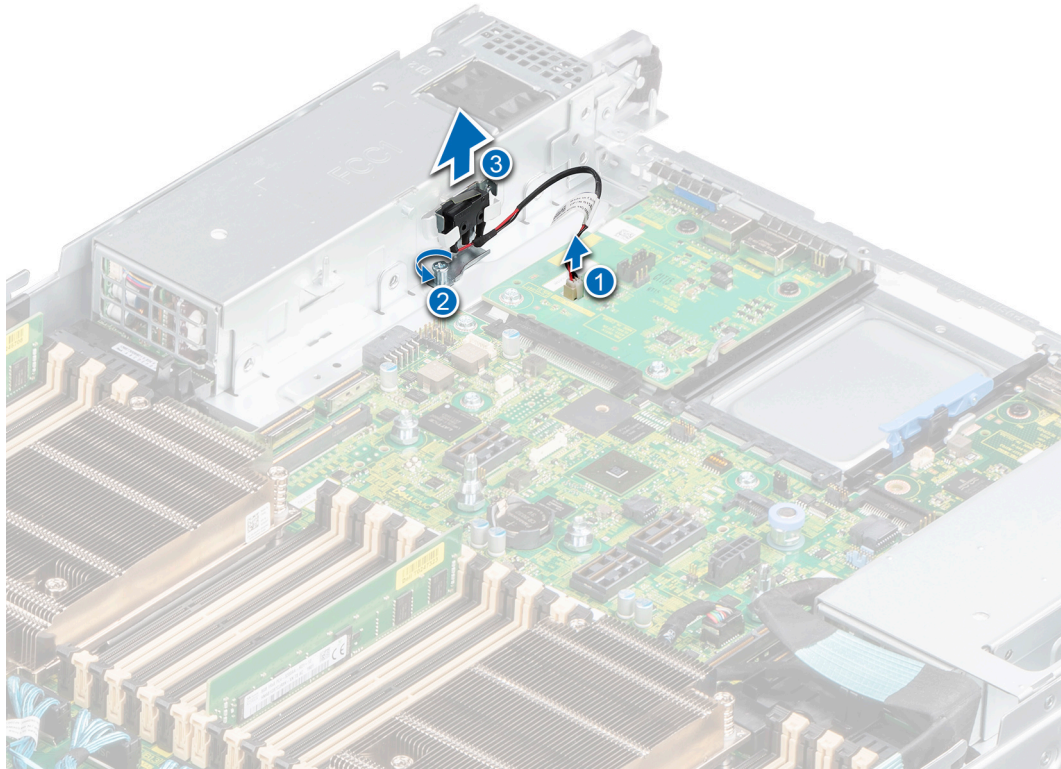


Figure 71. Removing the intrusion switch module

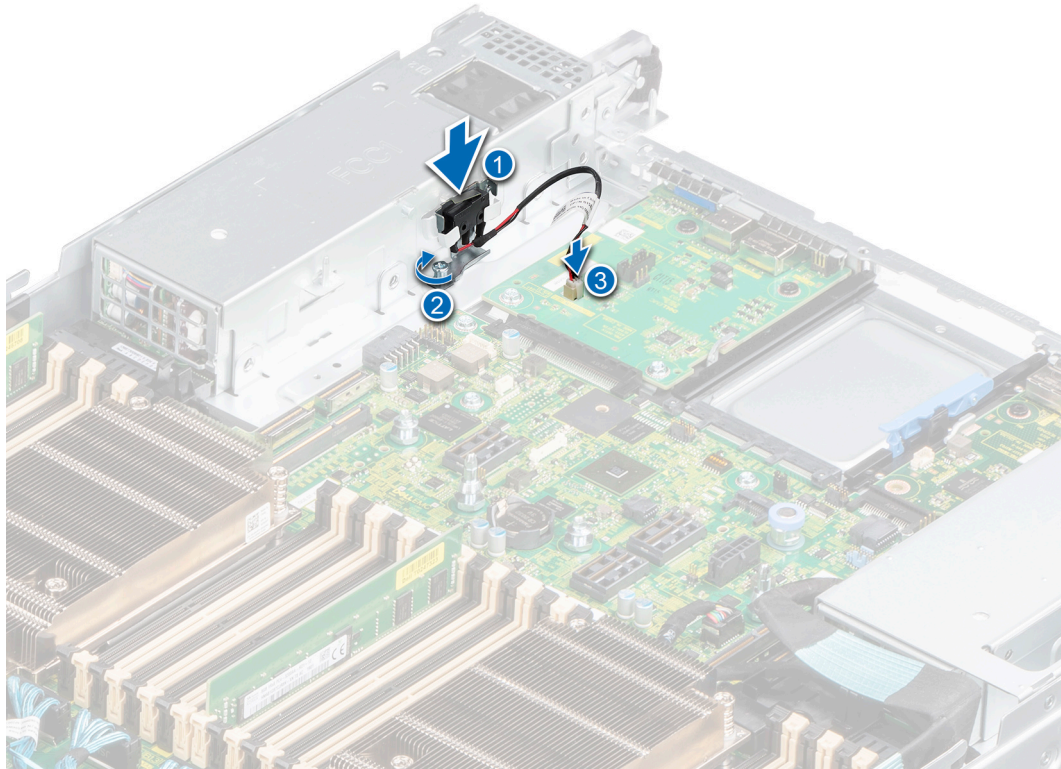


Figure 72. Installing the intrusion switch module

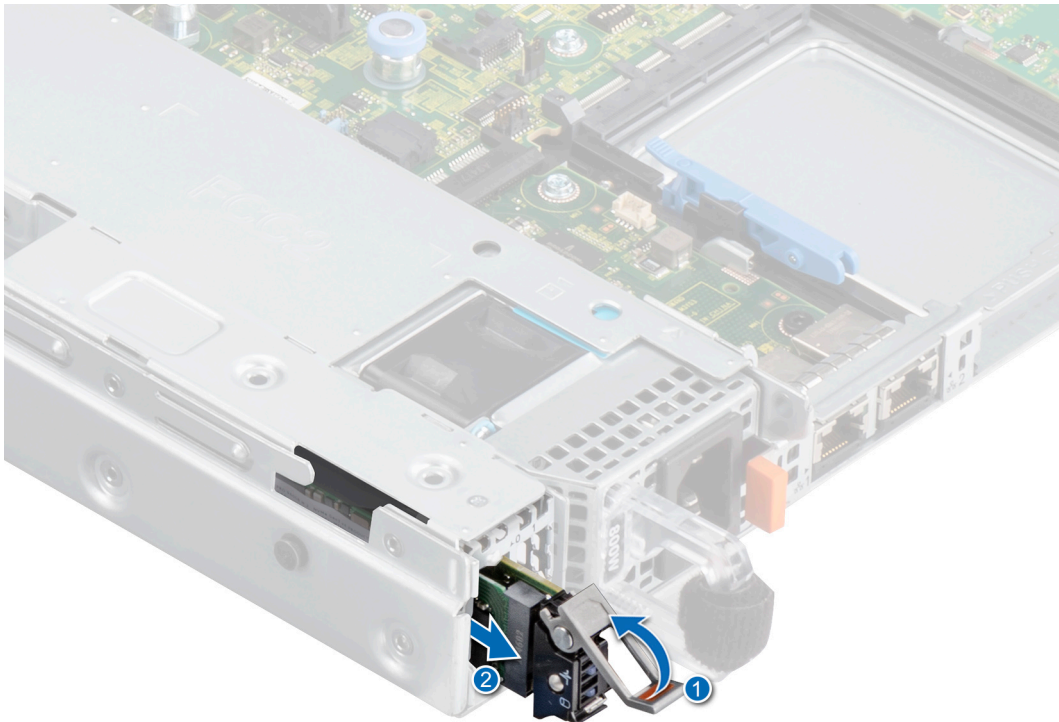


Figure 73. Removing the BOSS S2 card carrier

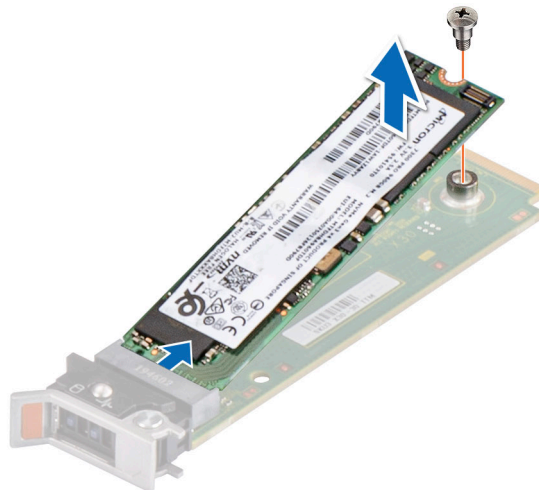


Figure 74. Removing the M.2 SSD

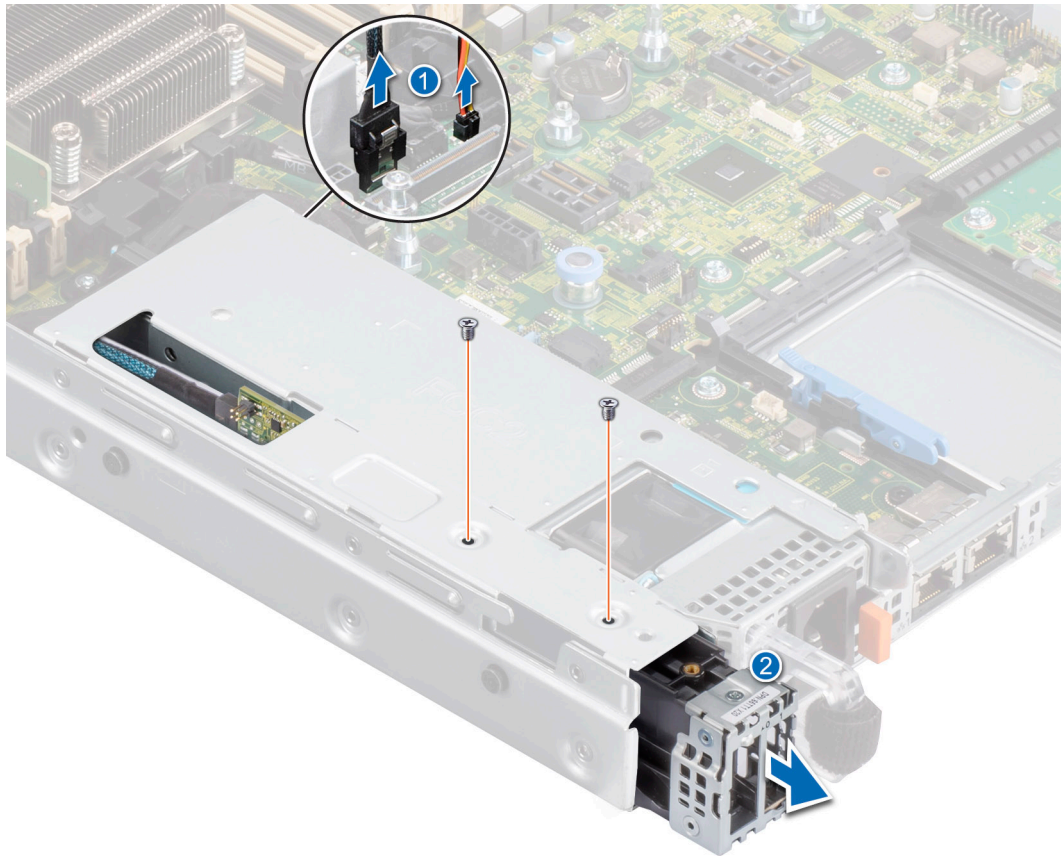


Figure 75. Removing the BOSS S2 module

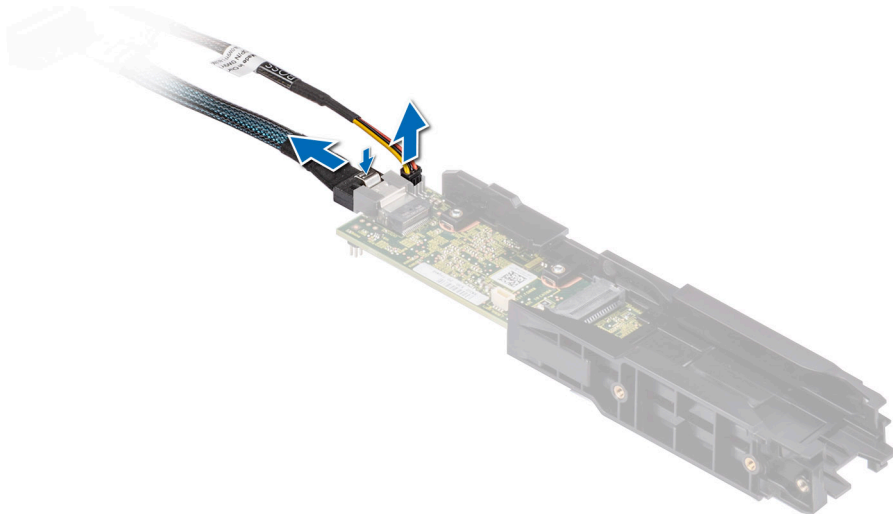


Figure 76. Removing the BOSS power cable and BOSS signal cable

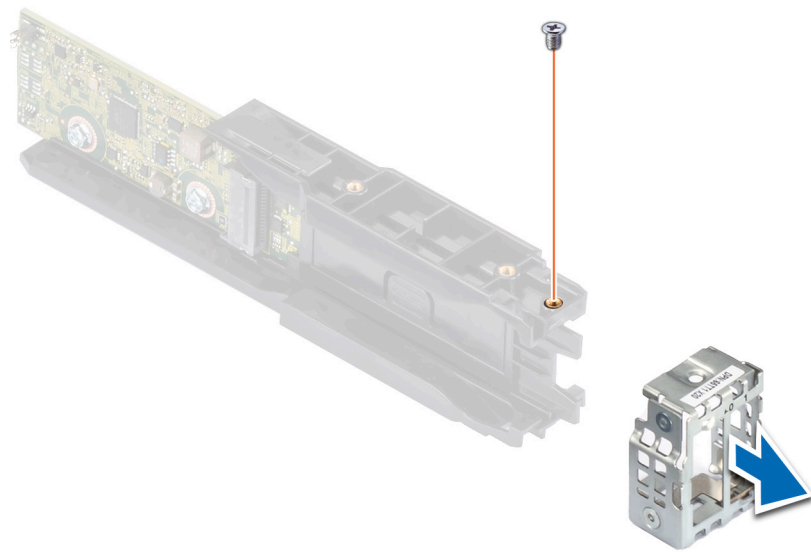


Figure 77. Removing the BOSS cover

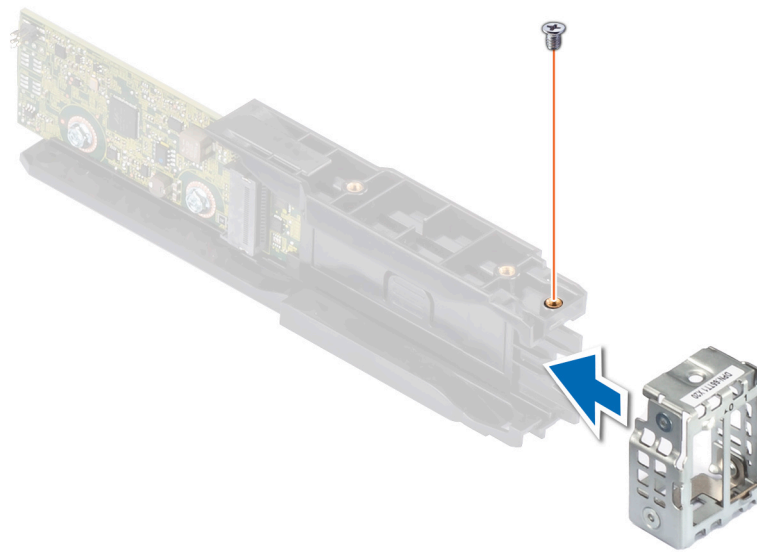


Figure 78. Installing the BOSS cover

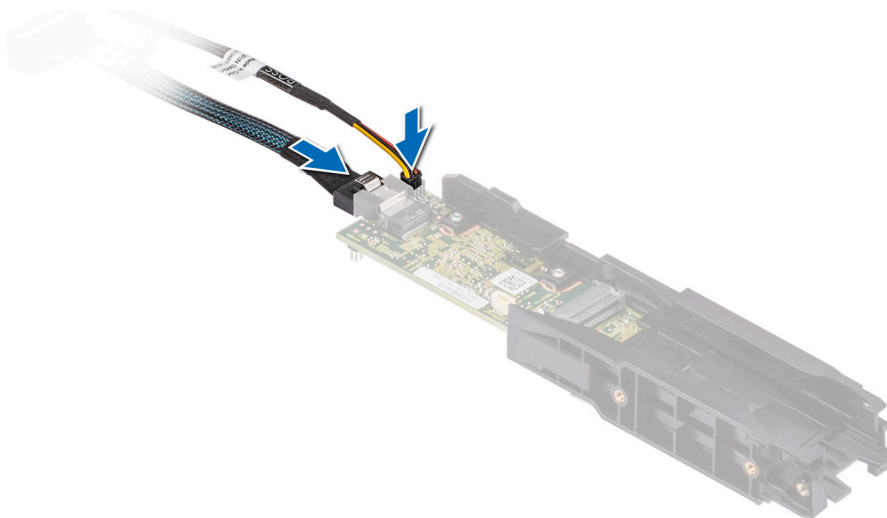


Figure 79. Connecting the BOSS power cable and BOSS Signal cable to the BOSS S2 module

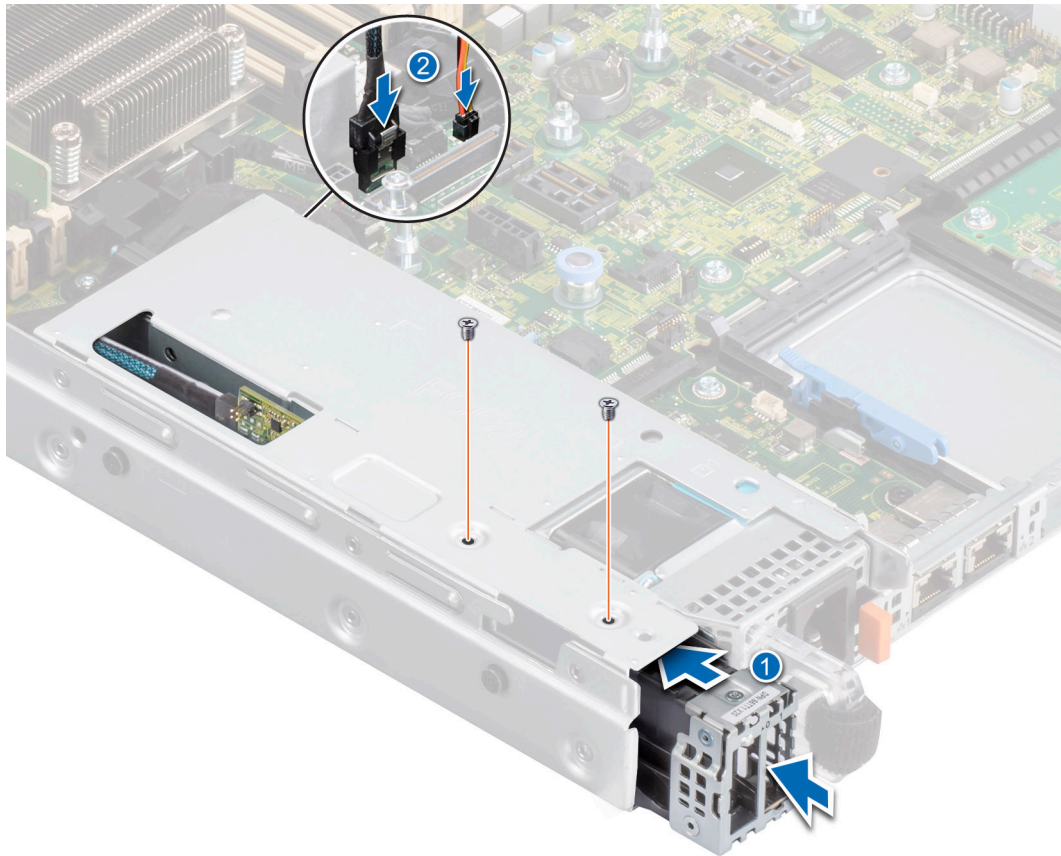


Figure 80. Installing the BOSS S2 module

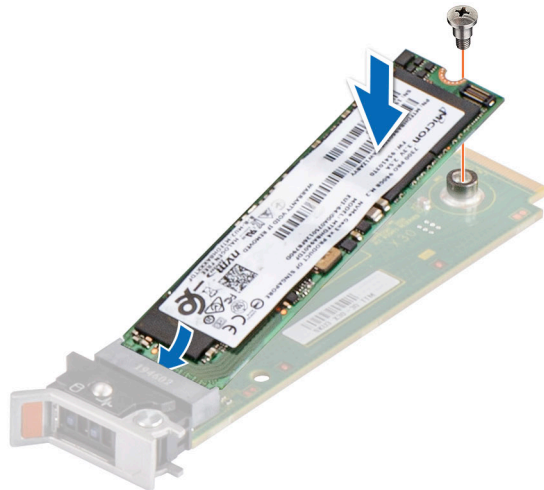


Figure 81. Installing the M.2 SSD

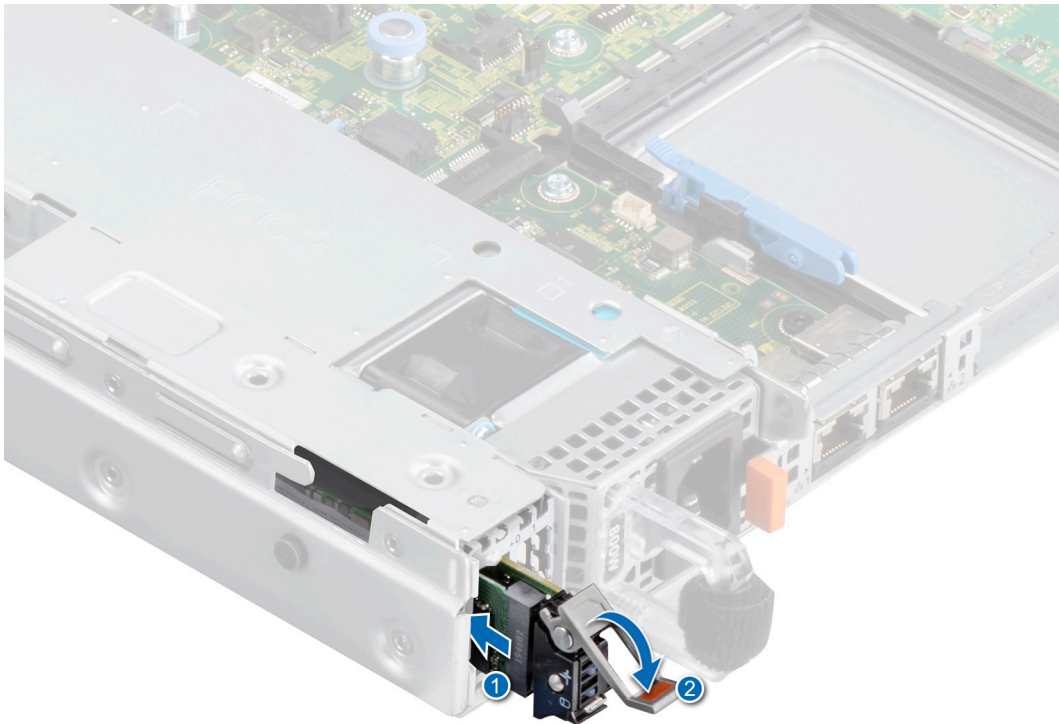


Figure 82. Installing the BOSS S2 card carrier

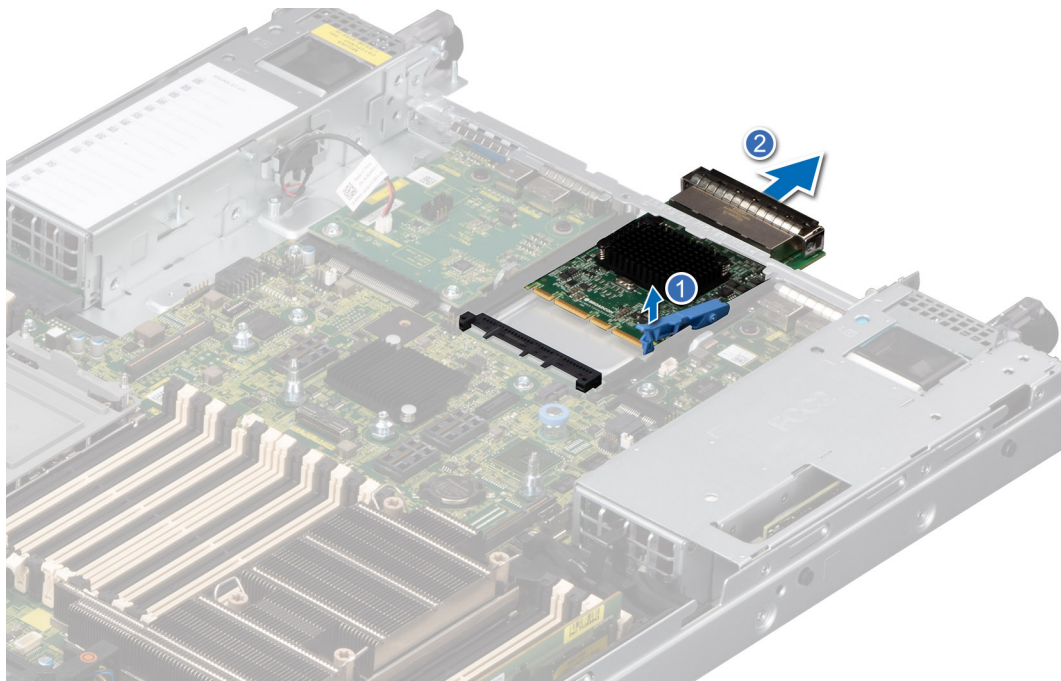


Figure 83. Removing the OCP card

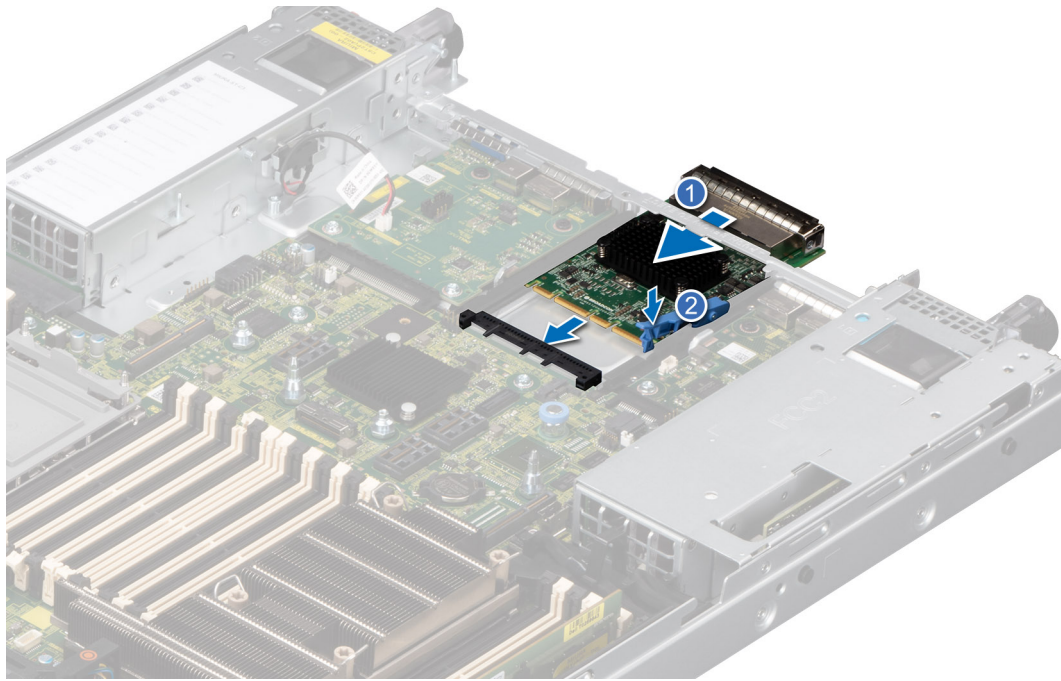


Figure 84. Installing the OCP card

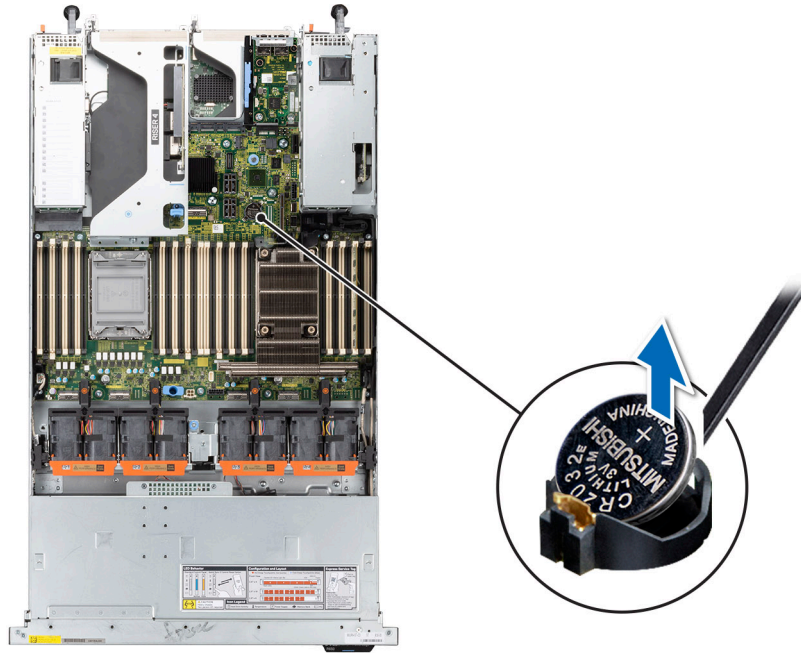


Figure 85. Removing the system battery

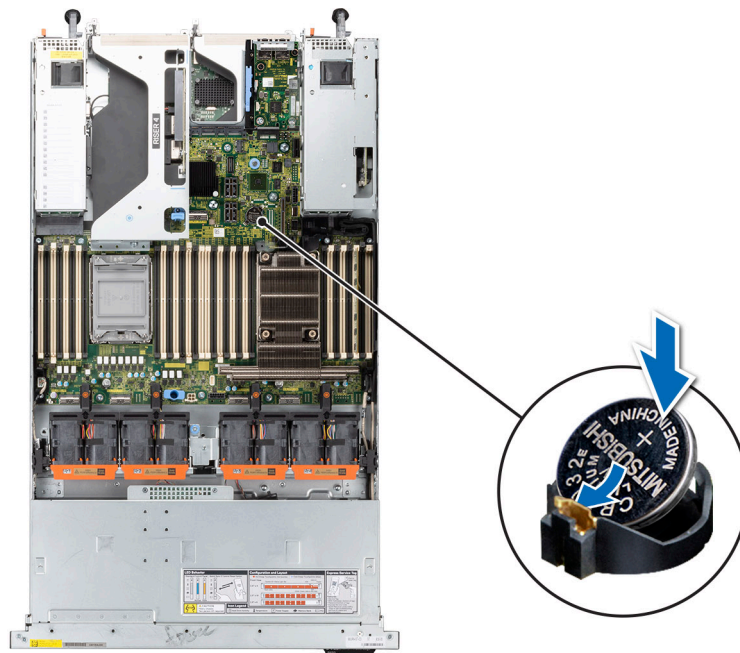



Figure 86. Installing the system battery

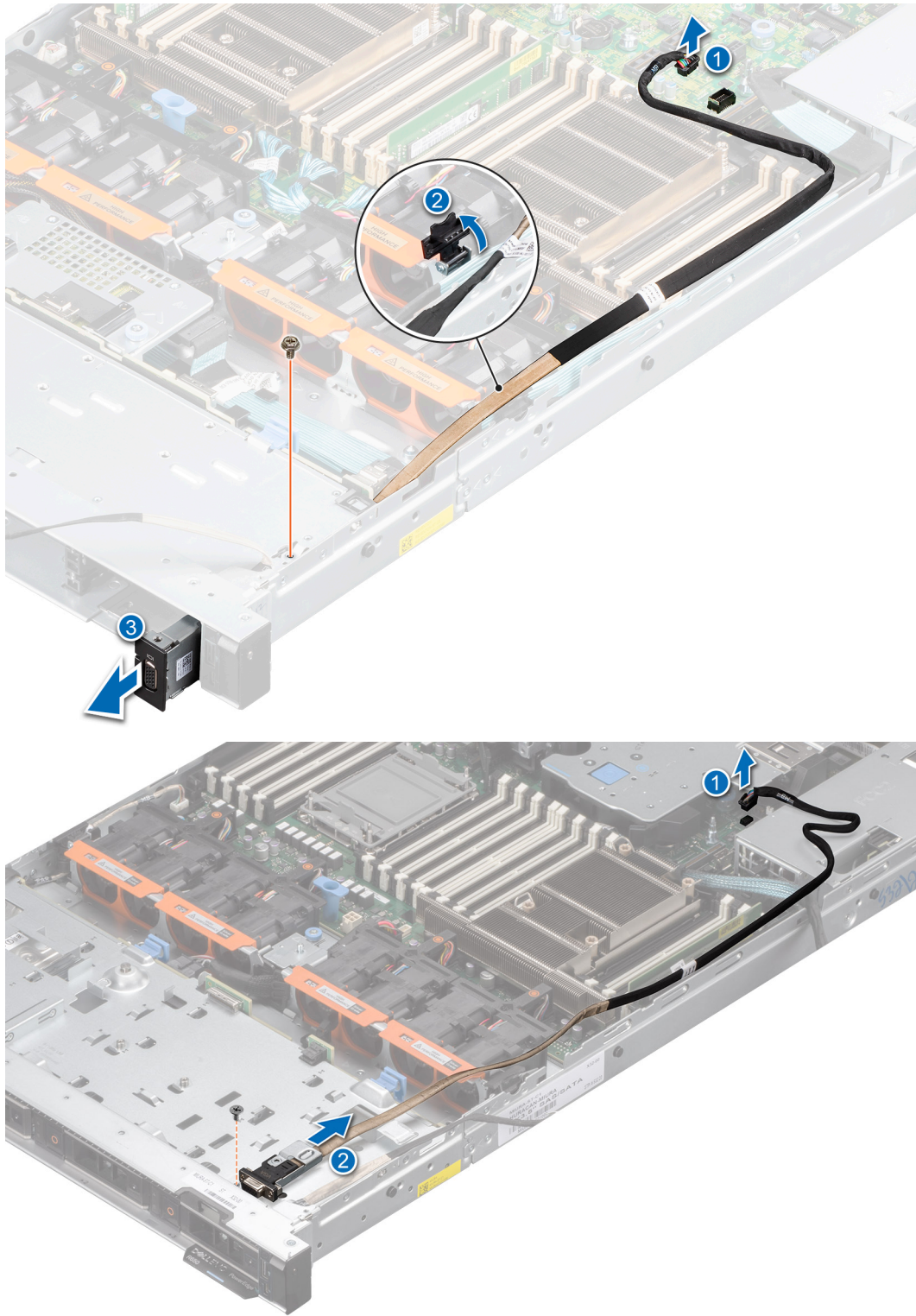


Figure 87. Removing the VGA module

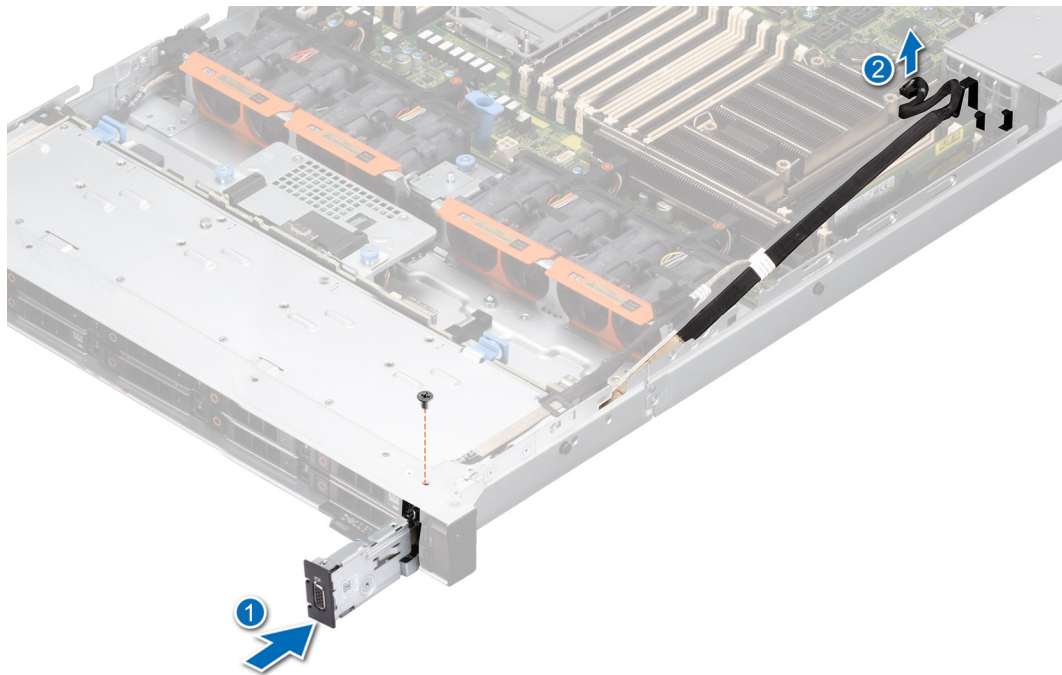

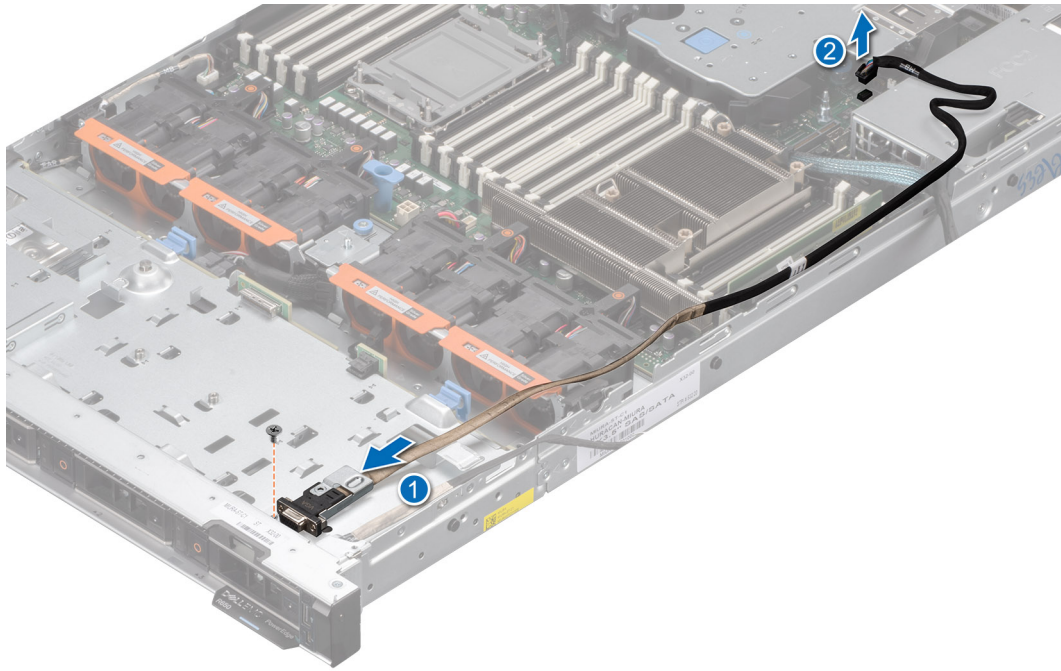


Figure 88. Installing the VGA module

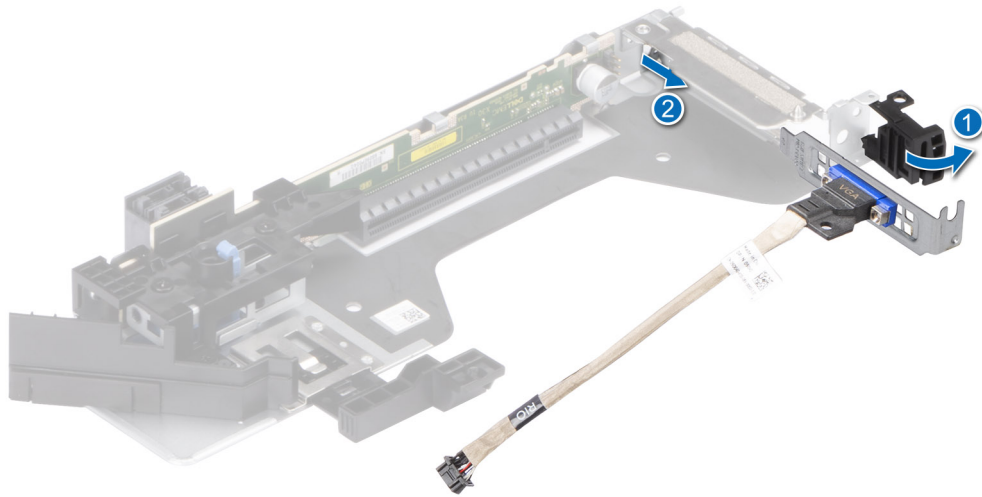


Figure 89. Removing the VGA port

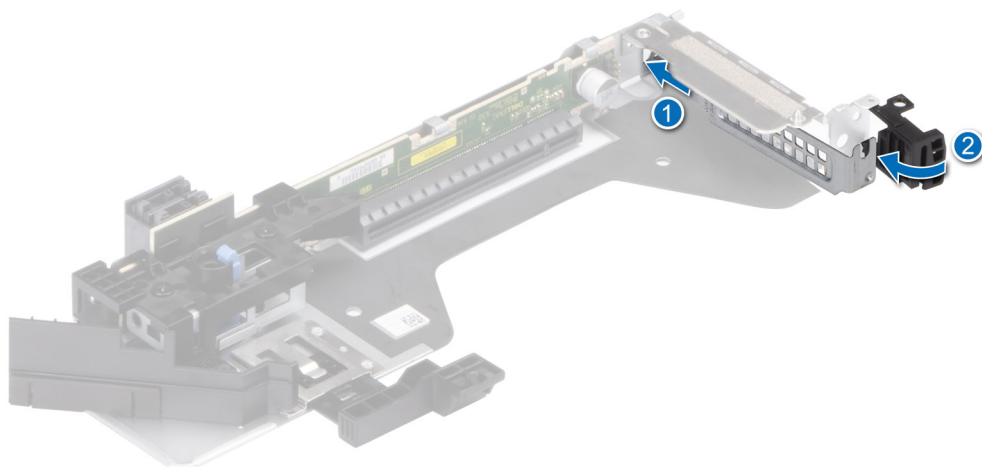


Figure 90. Installing the filler bracket

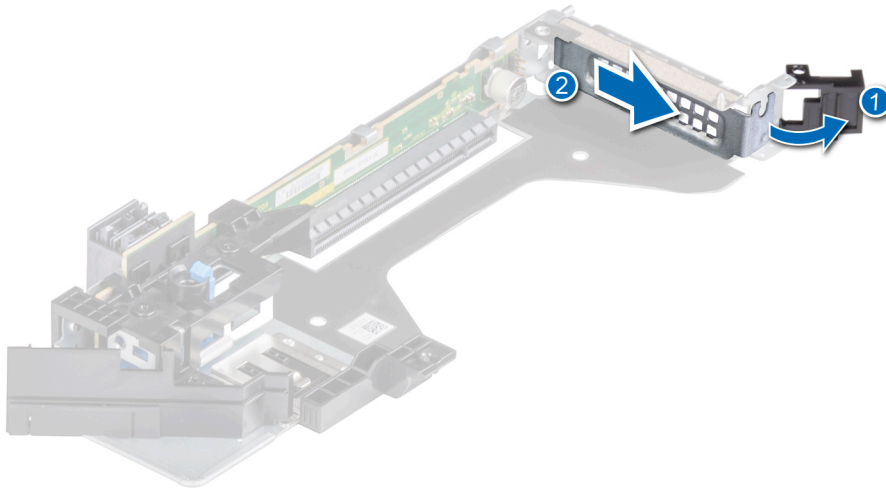


Figure 91. Removing the filler bracket

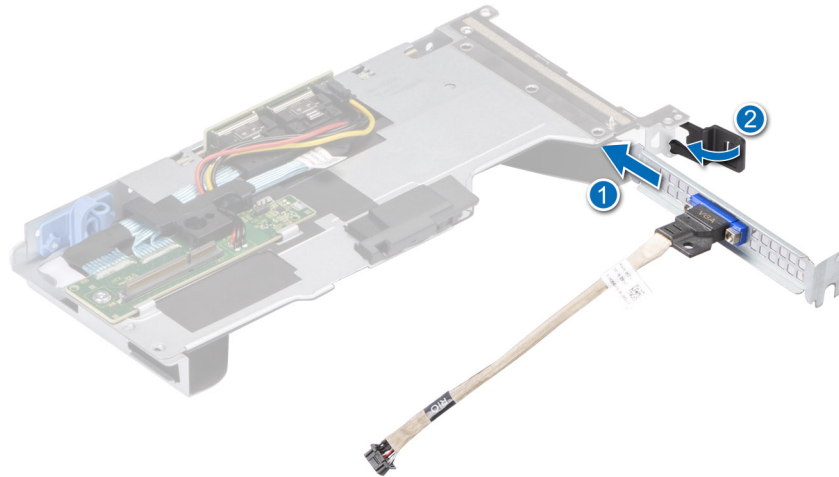


Figure 92. Installing the rear VGA port

Hot spare feature

Your system supports the hot spare feature that significantly reduces the power overhead associated with power supply unit (PSU) redundancy.

When the hot spare feature is enabled, one of the redundant PSUs is switched to the sleep state. The active PSU supports 100 percent of the system load, thus operating at higher efficiency. The PSU in the sleep state monitors output voltage of the active PSU. If the output voltage of the active PSU drops, the PSU in the sleep state returns to an active output state.

If having both PSUs active is more efficient than having one PSU in the sleep state, the active PSU can also activate the sleeping PSU.

The default PSU settings are as follows:

- If the load on the active PSU is more than 50 percent of PSU rated power wattage, then the redundant PSU is switched to the active state.
- If the load on the active PSU falls below 20 percent of PSU rated power wattage, then the redundant PSU is switched to the sleep state.

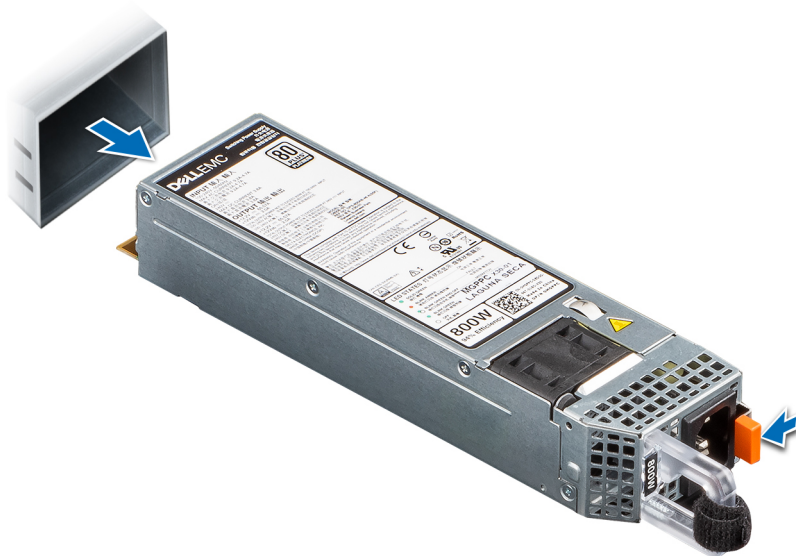


Figure 94. Installing a power supply unit

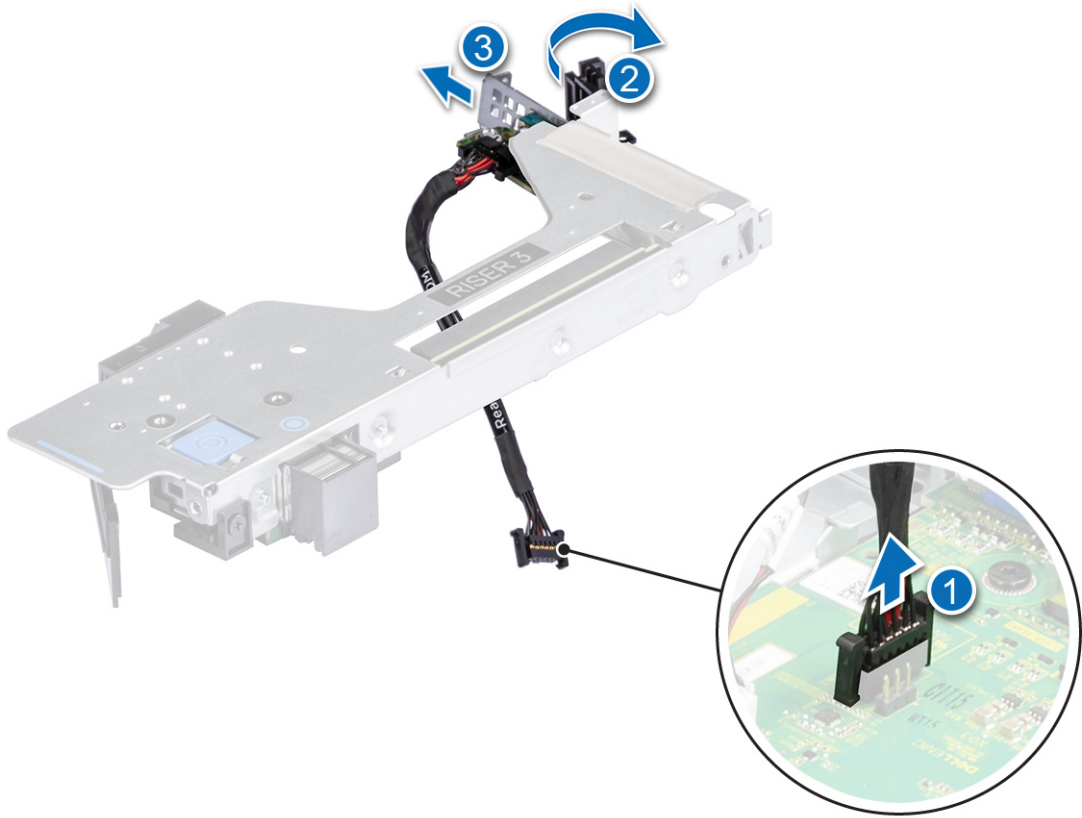


Figure 95. Removing the serial COM port

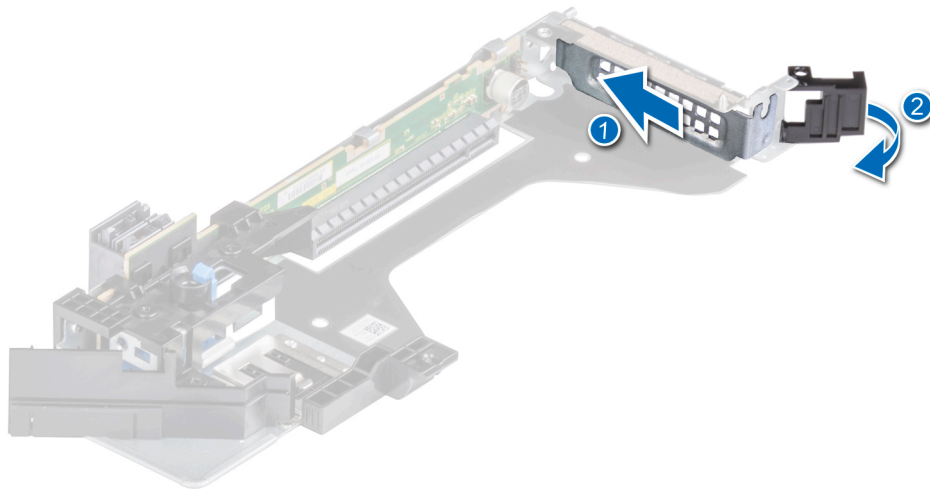


Figure 96. Installing the filler bracket

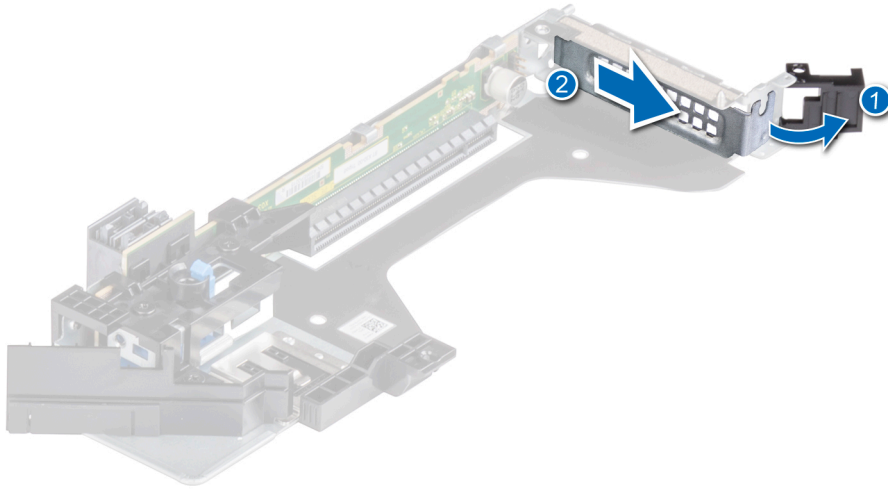


Figure 97. Removing the filler bracket

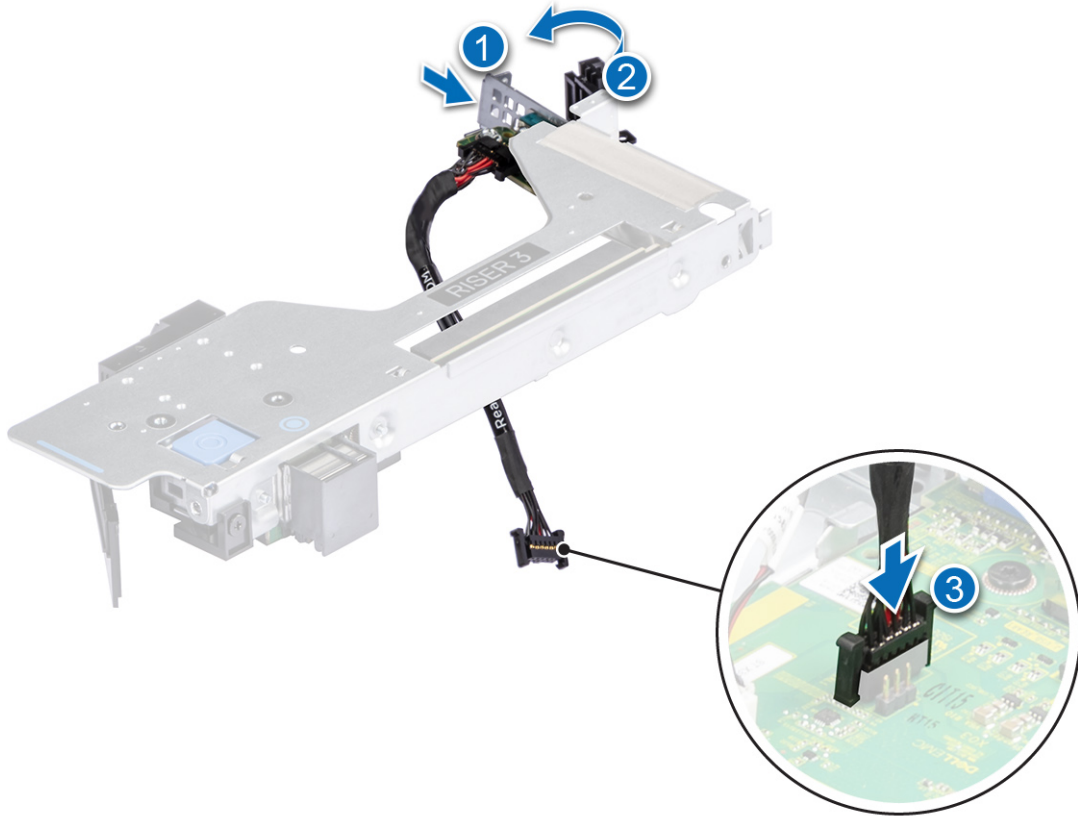


Figure 98. Installing the serial COM port

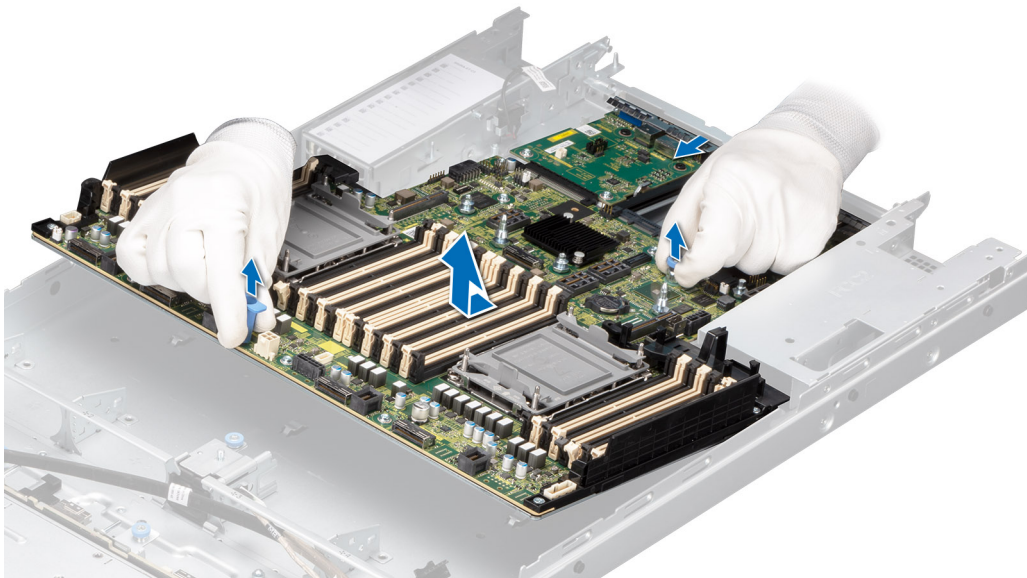


Figure 99. Removing the system board

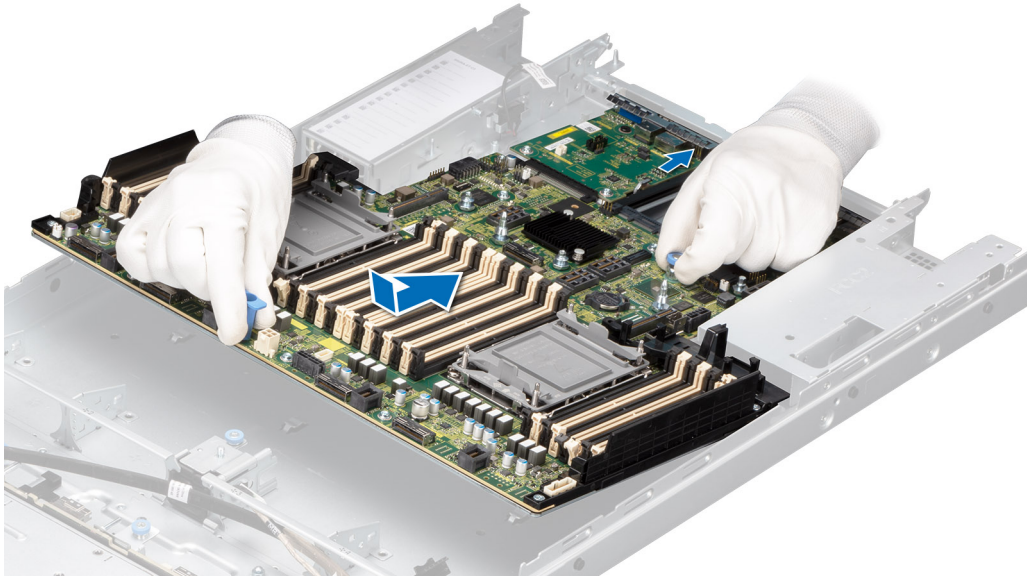


Figure 100. Installing the system board

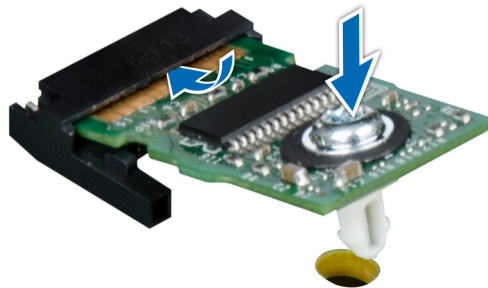


Figure 101. Installing the TPM

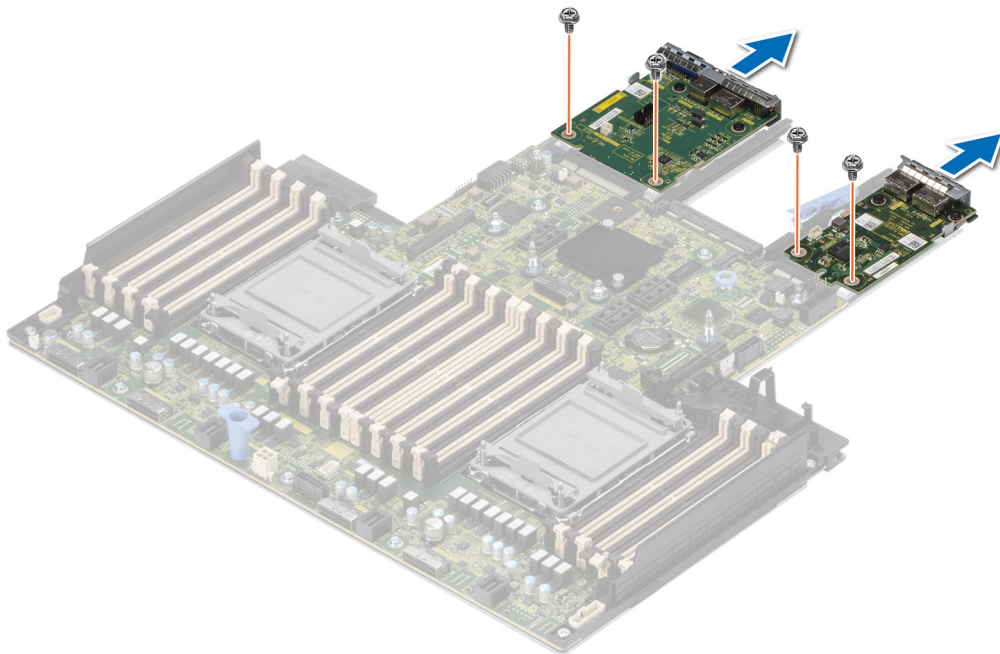


Figure 102. Removing the RIO card

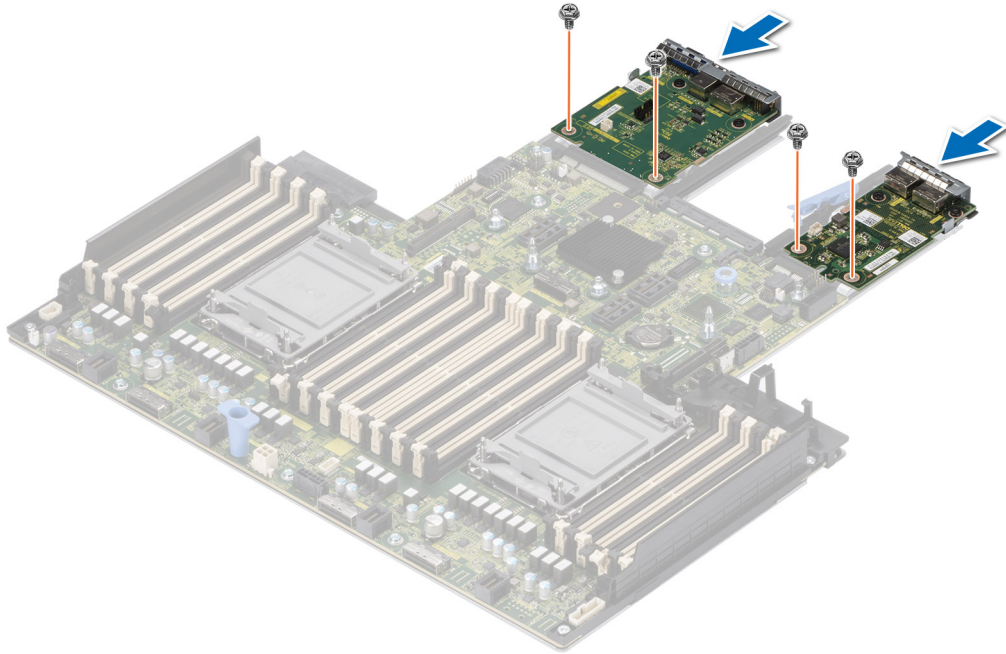


Figure 103. Installing the RIO card

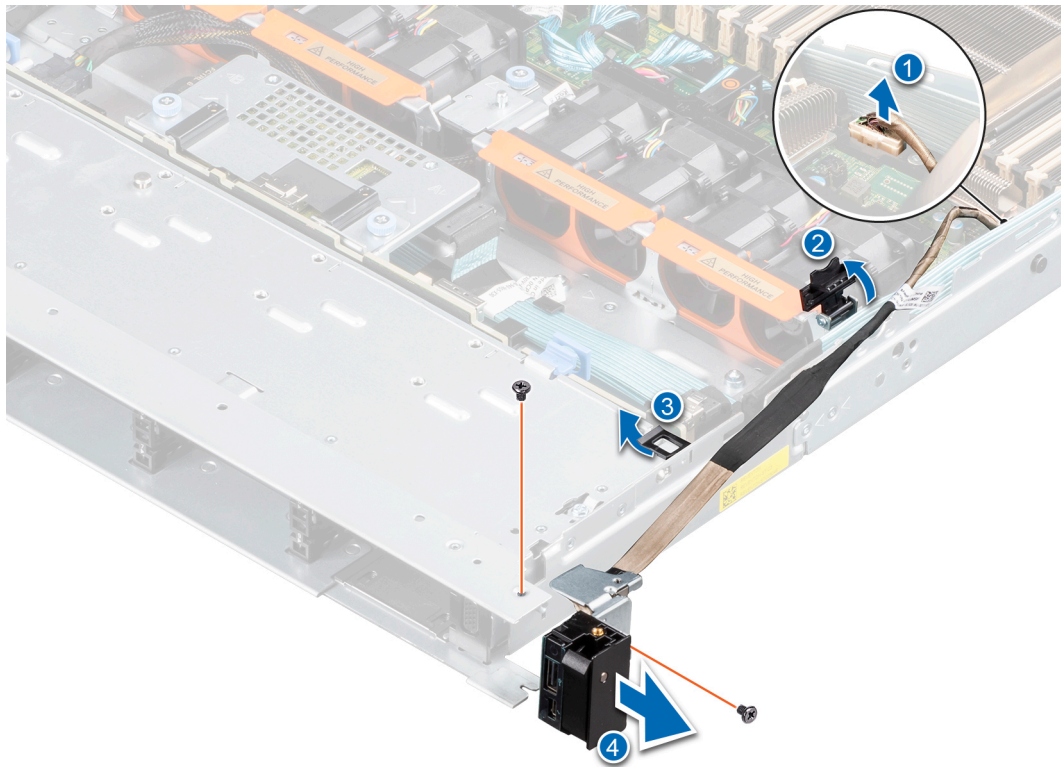


Figure 104. Removing the right control panel

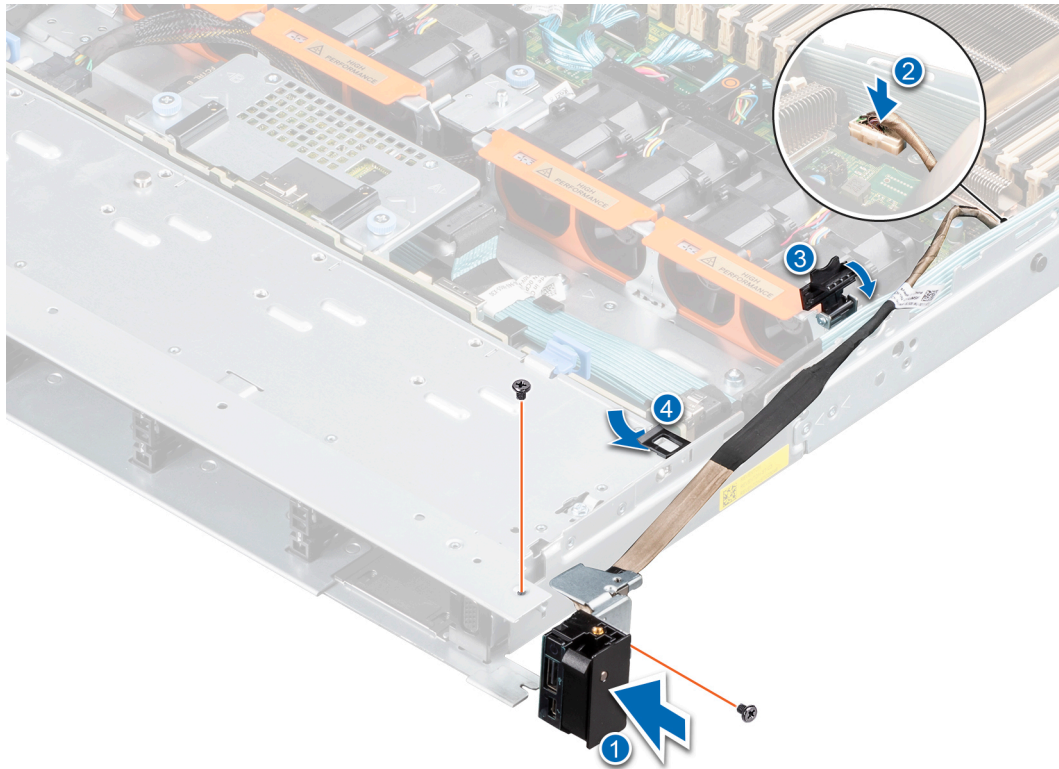


Figure 105. Installing the right control panel

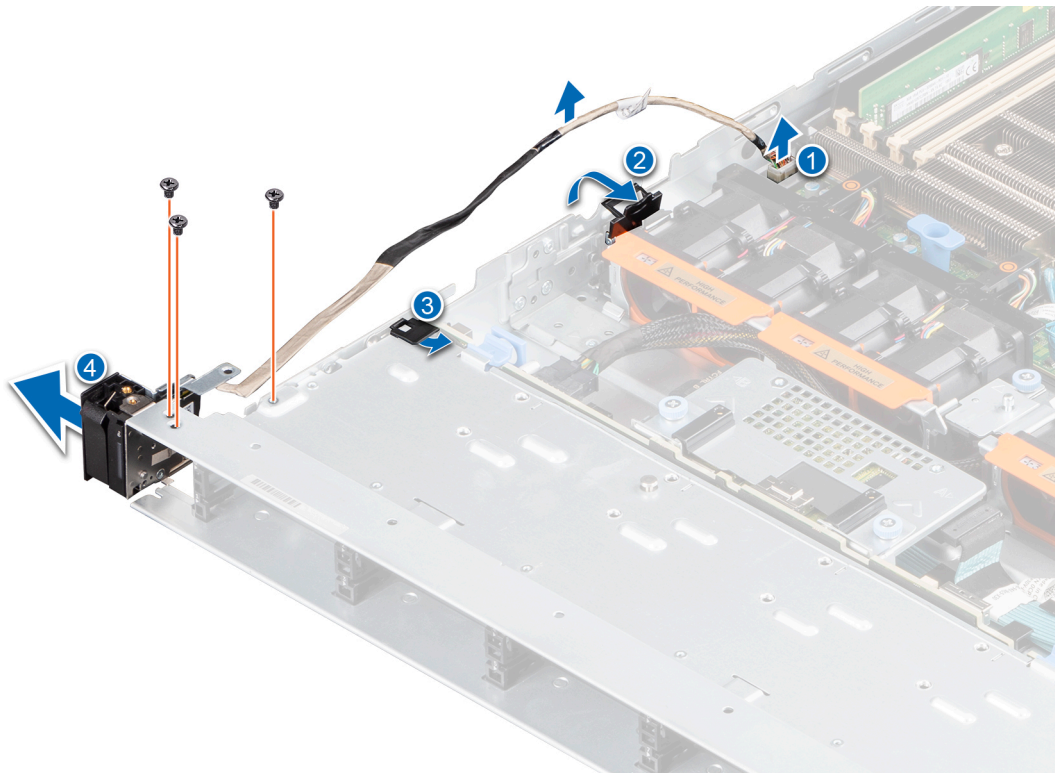


Figure 106. Removing the left control panel

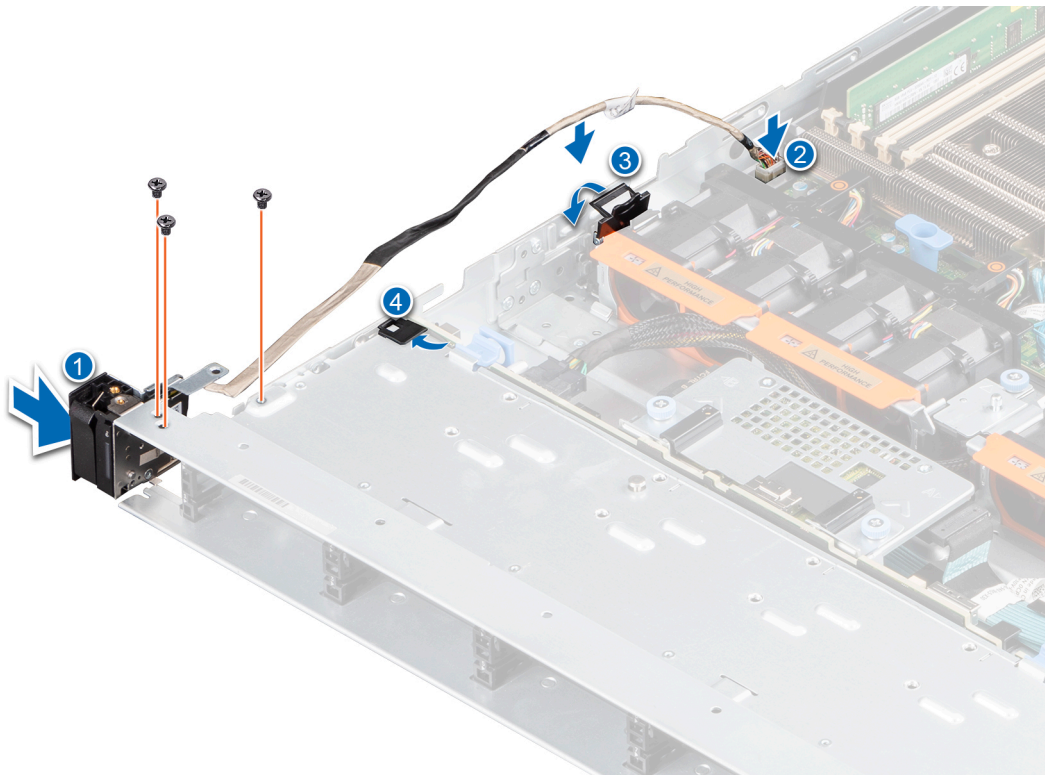


Figure 107. Installing the left control panel

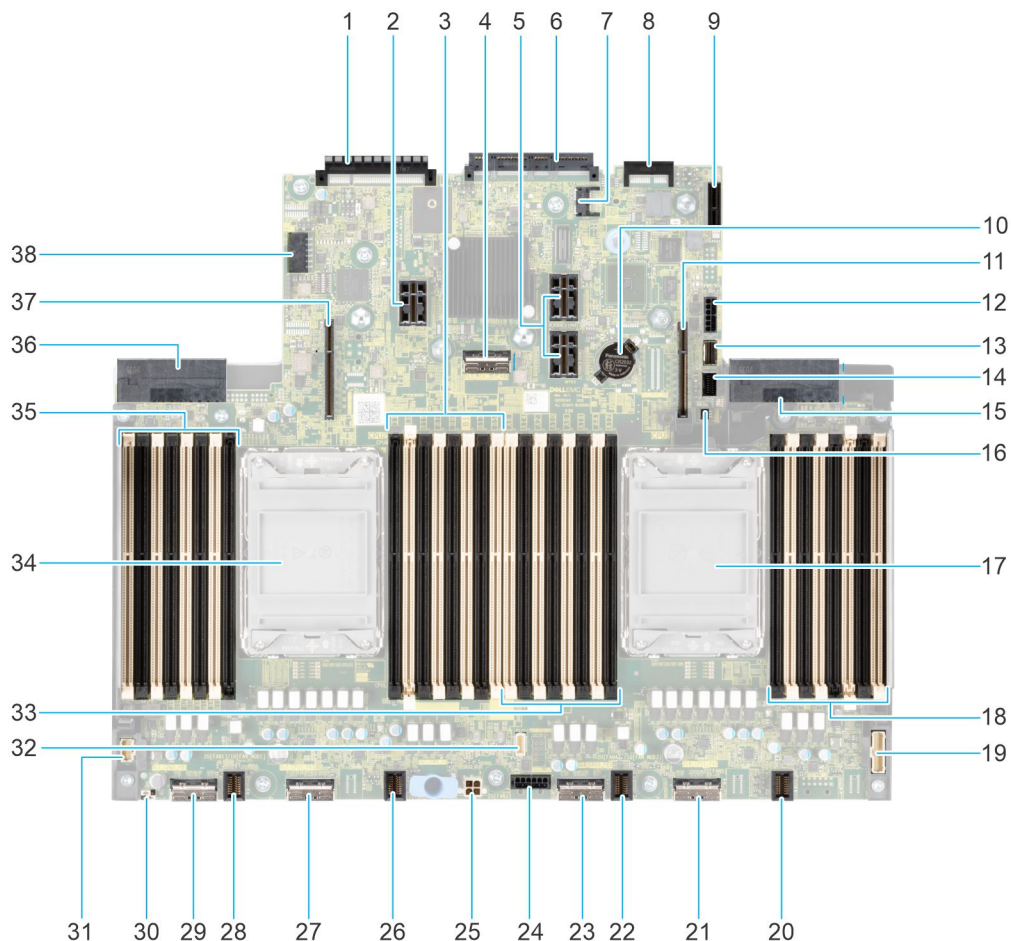


Figure 108. System board jumpers and connectors

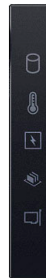


Figure 109. Status LED indicators

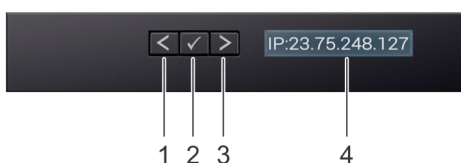


Figure 111. LCD panel features

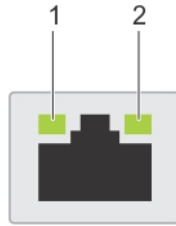


Figure 112. NIC indicator codes

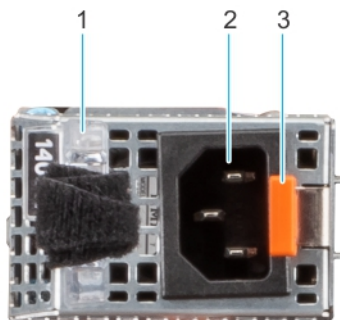


Figure 113. AC PSU status indicator
